

ALBANY WORKS DEAL IS STILL UNDER WAY

Captain Tristain Makes Second Inspection of Plant.

GOOD REPORT EXPECTED

Contracts for Ten Vessels Looked For as Result of French Needs for Tonnage.

Arrival of Captain Tristain of the French high commission, who was at San Francisco to inspect the plant of the Albina Engine & Machine works, where it is hoped to build ten steamers of the 300-ton class for the land of the tricolor, added greater interest Friday to negotiations between Harry Hopkins, Portland coast manager of the Foundation company, and the Albina Engine & Machine works, through which Mr. Hopkins and associates expect to acquire the stock of the company and company in the plant.

The Foundation company is not to be concerned in the transaction, according to latest information. Mr. Hopkins is to have associated with him Martin Schacht of this city, for the past year consulting engineer for the Foundation company, and Willis Corbett, president of the plant, is to continue his interest.

Options Still Stand. "There has been no agreement, other than the option given recently, or any positive understanding, reached as regards the sale," said Mr. Corbett. The plant was inspected Friday for the second time by Captain Tristain, having been here several months ago. He is expected to recommend to the French high commission that a contract for ten vessels be awarded and his recommendation is said to be in final approval by the commission. The French are in the market for 500,000 tons of steel ships. They are said to favor smaller vessels than the United States shipping board is assembling, believing that carriers of 600 tons and less will be more profitable in a few years than the carrier of 800 tons and more.

Woods Construction May End. Mr. Hopkins was in the city Friday from Seattle, returning that night so he could continue to the trial trip of the first wood steamer completed at the Foundation company's plant for the French. There were 29 of the steamers ordered there and several have been launched. If the French obtain full permission from the shipping board to contract for all the steel tonnage they desire, it may be a part of the wood ship contracts will be canceled and steel steamers ordered in their stead. The Albina Engine & Machine works has in ways clear and only two vessels remain at the plant fitting out, so with one expected to be delivered next week and the other the latter part of the month, ships for the French could be started in a short time if the deal is consummated soon. Five ways are available there, though only four have been used.

ALASKANS LOOK TO SIBERIA

COUNTRY RICH IN MINERALS IS MECCA FOR MINERS.

Twelve Residents of Far North Take Stock in Siberian Commercial Company.

COROVIA, Alaska, July 5.—Alaska "hardheads" living up to their old slogan of "rush on," are looking across the Bering sea to Siberia with a view of going into that country in numbers and washing Siberian sands for gold and trading with Siberian natives for profit. "Siberia is a second Alaska, rich in minerals, timber and the reward of the Bering sea," said the Alaska bureau of the Seattle chamber of commerce, has been quoted as saying, "There is a big country lying across the Bering sea awaiting American men and money."

Reports from Nome, Alaska, say a number of old timers of the Bering peninsula are thinking of crossing to Siberia. Until the allies restored order and government at Vladivostok, however, the unsettled state of affairs in Siberia kept the Americans out. Twelve pioneer Alaskans are numbered among the stockholders of the recently-organized Siberian Commercial company which last month bought the steamship Godney and started it for St. Lawrence bay, Siberia, to establish a trade route.

Aboard the Godney when it left Seattle for Siberia were 25 stockholders who intended trying their luck washing the sands of St. Lawrence bay for gold. Next fall the new company plans to send a representative to Vladivostok as the first step in enlarging its sphere of operations.

MOONEY STRIKE FAILURE

SPOKANE WAITERS OUT FOR BUT TWO SHORT HOURS.

Butte and Chicago Report No Signs of Walkout, Though Leaders Predicted Tieup.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 5.—No reports had been received yesterday at headquarters of the International Workers' Order of America here of developments in the nation-wide strike called in protest against the action of California courts in refusing a new trial to Thomas J. Mooney, convicted of murder in connection with the "preparation day" bomb explosion here. There will be no attempt at general leadership of the strike, each union directing its own action.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 5.—Waiters in practically every restaurant in the part of the downtown district frequented customarily by lumber workers went on strike for two hours at 11 A. M. yesterday on what was called a "Mooney sympathy strike." Union waiters in restaurants in other parts of the city did not strike.

BUTTE, Mont., July 5.—The effect of the Mooney protest strike in the Butte district was not discernible yesterday. Eight unions had voted to start their five-day strike today and claims were made that about 500 men employed outside of the mines had heeded the call.

WASHINGTON FOURTH IS SPECTACULAR ONE

Return of Peace Is Dominating Celebration Theme.

MONSTER PAGEANTS GIVEN

Embassies of Many Nations Participate in Event, New States Also Being in Evidence.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Return of world peace was the dominating spirit of Washington's celebration of Independence day. Pageantry in which the calls of industry and other civilian occupations, to returning soldiers and sailors were displayed and a parade in which all the nations arrayed against Germany and Austria were represented were features of the observance.

Seven pageants, showing the calls of art, of the land, of commerce, business and professions, of the children, of labor, of liberty and to world service were given late in the day on the lawns of department and other public buildings. These pageants were merged into a great pageant entitled "The Offering of Peace," which showed the peoples of the world having passed through the horrors of war, returning with courage and anticipation to the pursuits of peace.

New Nations in Evidence. Embassies and legations of all the allied and associated governments had floats in the parade which moved down Pennsylvania avenue from the White House to the capitol. The newly formed nations of Czechoslovakia, Poland, Lithuania and of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes were represented. The South American republics especially were prominent in the procession.

Members of the cabinet, other high government officials and thousands of artisans tonight heard a chorus of several thousand voices sing national and patriotic songs to the accompaniment of the United States Marine band from the steps of the capitol.

Scenes in "Victory and Peace" portrayed in pantomime on the capitol plaza.

Service Medals Presented. Fireworks on the Washington monument grounds closed the day's celebration, which was held under the auspices of the War Camp Community Service. Early in the day Secretary Baker and Admiral William Benson, chief of naval operations, acting for Secretary Daniels, presented service medals on behalf of the district of Columbia to residents of the district who served with the colors during the war. Besides soldiers, sailors and marines, those receiving the medals included the battalion of yeomen and the battalion of "marinettes."

Presentation of the medals was followed by the administration of the oath of service and citizenship to 51 young men and 51 young women representing the states of the union and three territories.

New Oath Administered. AMERICANISM HELD ISSUE

SENATOR JOHNSON DECLARES NATION FACES CRISIS.

California Holds Russian Policy Wrongly Handled—Big Welcome Is Given Troops.

DETROIT, Mich., July 5.—Senator Hiram Johnson of California denounced bolshevism and all radical activities in this country in an address at exercises celebrating Independence day and the return of the 33rd regiment from the battlefields of north Russia. The senator also criticized the government's Russian policy.

"The time has come," he declared, "when good Americans must act to keep the affairs of this country within the law. There is no room here for bolshevism or anything reasonable. There is the privilege for every man to have and speak his opinions, but they must be within the constitution."

"America today faces one of the greatest crises in its history," the senator said. "It is a crisis at the crossroads. One leads to imperialistic control, the other is the straight and narrow path of Americanism."

Americanism alone, he declared, should govern this country's foreign as well as internal affairs.

AMERICAN SUPPORTS ARMY

Crack Estonian Regiment Financed by Yankee.

REVAL, Estonia, July 5.—The crack regiment of the new Estonian army is one organized and financed by an American citizen, H. C. Reiser. It is composed of cavalry, infantry and artillery units, numbers 1000 men, and has been fighting for several months. This discovery was made by the American Red Cross mission which arrived here a few days ago with a shipload of supplies for the relief of the country.

Mr. Reiser had already organized a small Red Cross hospital of 50 beds. The first articles which this hospital requested of the American relief workers were an American flag and a Red Cross flag. When both of these were supplied they flung the two banners to the breeze from flagpoles in the hospital yard.

MINE MANAGER IS DEAD

Sampson W. Hall of Butte Has Brother Living Here.

BUTTE, Mont., July 5.—Sampson W. Hall, former superintendent of the Elkhorn mine of the Boston & Montana Development company, died at the Crohn camp on the east fork of the Snake river recently. It was learned here yesterday. The remains will be brought to Butte for burial.

He was a pioneer miner in the Butte camp and once was a foreman for Marcus Daly. He was also a superintendent of mines in British Columbia. His brothers live in Portland. Or, a sister in San Francisco and another in Detroit.

ARMY AVIATOR IS MISSING

Sergeant A. S. Marquard Believed Drowned in Lake Erie.

TOLEDO, O., July 5.—Sergeant A. S. Marquard of the 1st United States balloon company, is missing and is believed to have been drowned in Lake Erie yesterday afternoon, when a captive balloon in which he and Fred Deleva, a New York motion picture man, were making a flight over the Willard-Dempsey arena, broke from its moorings and was carried out five miles by the wind.

Deleva was rescued by a motorboat party.

DE VALERA TO GIVE TALK

NEW YORK, July 5.—Eamon de Valera, president of the "Irish republic," will deliver his first public address in this city July 10 at Madison Square Garden at a meeting being arranged by the United Irish societies. It was announced tonight.

FOURTH IS QUIET DAY FOR TROOP ARRIVALS

BUT 11 MEN SPEND FOUR SHORT HOURS IN CITY.

SOLDIER PICNIC SUCCESS

150 Victory Chorus Girls Entertain Boys From Barracks With Tasty Basket Luncheon.

The Fourth was a quiet day for those having charge of entertaining visiting troops, but a handful of men passing through the city. The only contingent to arrive was one of 11 men reaching Portland at 7 P. M. and leaving at 11 o'clock for Camp Lewis for mustering out.

The 7 o'clock contingent consisted of men of the 12th and 14th companies, air service, practically all of whom live in Spokane or vicinity. They had just returned from France after a long period of service with the expeditionary force and the army of occupation. The men were under the charge of Corporal Wallace of Spokane. Secretary Walker of the American Legion met the men at the depot and took them to the Benson, where dinner was served. Theater tickets were then distributed and the men visited the shows until 11 o'clock, when they caught their train for the north.

Vancouver Picnic Was Big Event. The big event of the Fourth of July for ex-service men was the picnic and dance at Vancouver. The Portland victory chorus, consisting of 150 girls, gathered at the liberty temple at 10:30 o'clock and were driven to Vancouver where they took part in a victory parade. The girls had taken lunch, each girl bringing enough for two soldiers and at noon the ex-service men and the men in active service at Vancouver gathered for luncheon as guests of the girls.

The afternoon programme consisted of races and sports of various kinds under the direction of the War Camp Community Service and the American Legion. General Martin of the Portland army recruiting office made a short address and popular patriotic songs were sung by the crowd under the direction of Walter Jenkins of the Y. M. C. A. A dance was the feature last night, with a boxing match arranged for the benefit of two soldiers who did not care to attend the dance.

Troops Expected This Week. Troop arrivals have slackened perceptibly this week but every group that does arrive is being given the Portland welcome. No contingents are definitely scheduled for today, but the group of 114 soldiers from Charleston, South Carolina, which left for the west the last week, is expected at any time. Two other groups of men have left the east, 52 from Camp Mills and 79 from Newport News, and should arrive in Portland early next week.

WILSON ARRIVAL PLANNED

PRESIDENT TO BE WELCOMED AT NEW YORK MEETING.

King Albert Sends Fourth Message to Executive at Sea by Way of Wireless.

NEW YORK, July 5.—Final plans have been arranged for the arrival of the presidential fleet. The George Washington will dock at Hoboken at 2 o'clock Tuesday, and the presidential party will board automobiles and cross the Twenty-third street ferry. Then they will proceed to Carnegie hall, where Governor Smith and the reception committee will extend a welcome, to which President Wilson will make a brief response.

The party will proceed to the Pennsylvania station, which they leave at 5 P. M. for Washington, arriving at the capitol at about 10 o'clock. At noon today the George Washington and the Oklahoma exchanged presidential salutes of 21 guns, wireless respectively.

President Wilson and King Albert of Belgium exchanged wireless salutations today as a symbol of independence. King Albert's message follows: "I cannot let the Fourth of July pass without conveying to your excellency my warmest wishes for the welfare of your country and the prosperity of the United States."

President Wilson said in reply: "Your Fourth of July message is most warmly appreciated, and I beg on this anniversary of Independence of the United States to convey to you, not only my personal good wishes, but also the hope that a new era of independence and lasting prosperity has opened for Belgium."

RECRUITS FOR REBEL ARMY

2000 Indians Join Felix Diaz Mexican Forces.

HAVANA, Cuba, July 5.—Passengers arriving here from Mexican ports state that in the Petio district of Yucatan 2000 Mayo Indians have joined the ranks of Felix Diaz' rebel army. 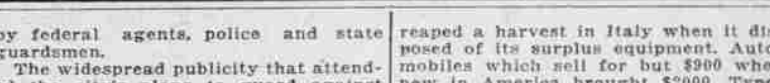

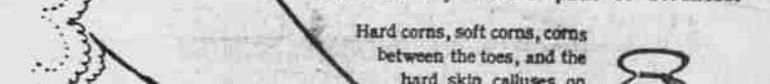
