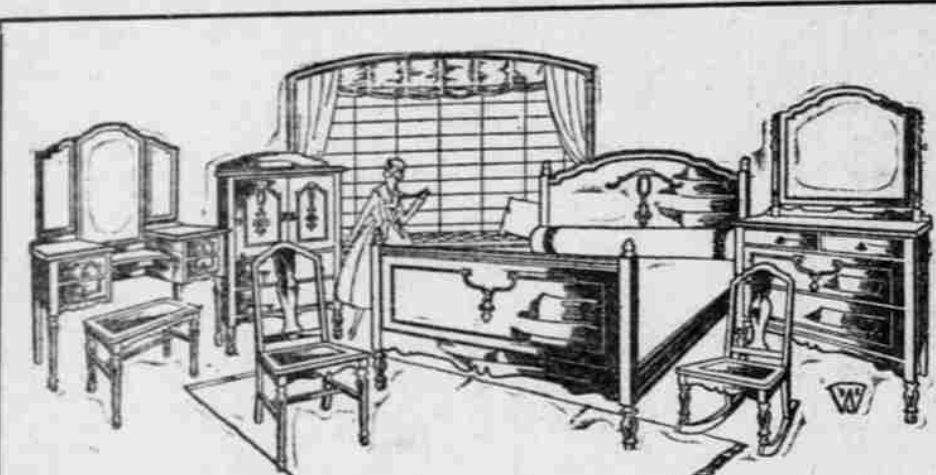

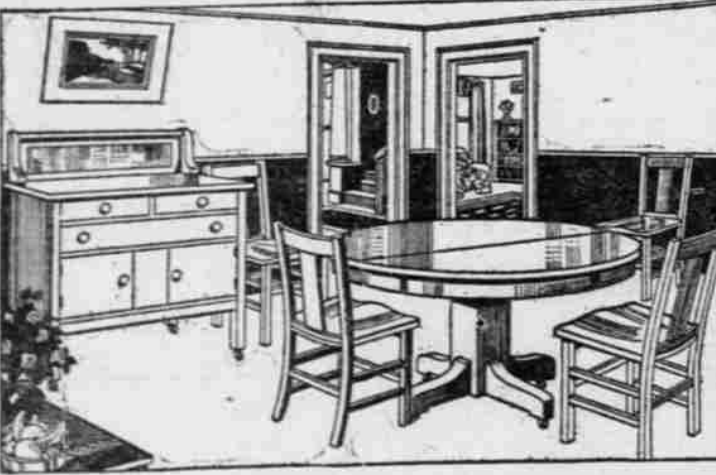

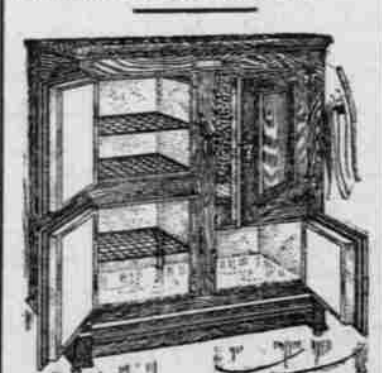

DEMPESEY GETS OFFER OF \$10,000 WEEKLY

San Francisco Theatrical Man Bids for Champion.

NEW OPPONENTS SOUGHT

Georges Carpentier of France Suggested as Logical Candidate for First Chance at Title.

TOLEDO, O., July 5.—(Special).—Toledo city awoke this morning to find itself back nearly to normal population. The many special trains and boats departed shortly after yesterday's world's championship bout and with the departure tonight of the last of the 600 newspaper men who have been giving Jack Dempsey and Jess Willard the double "O" for the past month everything is as quiet as dreaming trees on the banks of the now well-known Maumee river.

Jack Dempsey, the brand-new crowned king of boxers, slept downtown last night for the first time since he opened his training camp on the shore of Lake Erie. He stayed at the Boody House, which was known as the Dempsey men's headquarters. At 6 A. M. he motored to his camp. There is not a mark on this wonderful 24-year-old from Salt Lake City.

Dempsey Likes Hero Role. "How do you like the hero stuff?" I asked Jack tonight.

"It's part of the game," was his reply. "The people want to see me and talk to me and I'm going to play the game for keeps. The only thing that bothers me is when a crowd starts to place me on its shoulders or tries to tear me to pieces. That stuff is all right, but it wears a fellow out."

"Right after the fight we were tossed into the ring from Willard's corner yesterday I went over to shake hands. I hated to beat you, Jess," I told Willard. Jess nodded something but no one could make out what he said. He shot square, did this big fellow, and I have a lot of admiration for him."

Fighting Is Preferred. "Personally," continued Dempsey, "I would rather fight than do anything else. I have told Kearns that, but it's up to him," concluded the chap who promises to become as popular a champion as was James J. Corbett.

Jack Kearns, the new champion's handler, believes that George S. Carpentier of France is the logical candidate for the first chance at the title. However, Billy Roche, famed New York referee and manager, throws a bombshell into this idea by saying that Carpentier is not in the line of choice and that George S. weighs but 175 pounds.

Carpentier is in the same position as Willard, that is, to a large extent, said Roche. "He has been out of the game for four years and I don't believe he can ever come back."

Roche came from abroad, where he has been serving as a Knight of Columbus secretary, to get the pictures of the fight to be shown to the members of the American expeditionary forces.

Dempsey Offered \$10,000 a Week. Manager Kearns, with the most magnetic box office attraction in the world on his hands, is already swamped with offers and does not worry about his ability to select the best of them. Jack gets the money. The champion will probably show first in Cincinnati, leaving here shortly. Sig Grauman, San Francisco theatrical man, offered Dempsey \$10,000 a week for 12 weeks.

The new champion's gloves went to a woman who resides at the Overland club, which Dempsey used for his training quarters. Immediately after the fight Jack telegraphed his mother, who is ill in Salt Lake. He received a message from her this morning congratulating her son.

Kearns' protegee says that it was a right-hand punch over the heart which paved the way for Dempsey's easy victory. This blow was followed with a left hook to the chin which put the huge Kansan on the deck for the first time in his pugilistic career.

Referee Is Criticized. There is much unsatisfactory comment on the work of Ollie Pecora as referee. The Toledo official appeared very incompetent. When Willard went down for the first time Pecora was on the opposite side of the ring and started counting while running across the enclosure.

Further than that, he became excited when the bell saved Willard from losing in the opening canto. The gong rang as Pecora counted seven, but the official did not hear it and counted the eighth knockdown. It is a shame to have that kind of men handling big scraps with fellows like Jack Welsh, Billy Brown of New York, Jim Griffin, and a score of others keen for the place.

Knockout Failure Accounted For. Critics were still arguing today as to the number of knockdowns in the first round. They vary from four to seven with six being the popular choice. That's the number that the writer counted. Billy Gibson, popular New York promoter and manager of Benny Leonard, says that he was keeping time just for the fun of the thing and that there elapsed between the first and second rounds one minute and 20 seconds. This, joined with the fact that it took Dempsey a brief portion of the second round to recover his equilibrium after being carried out of the ring and proclaimed champion and then being fetched back to batter further a 245-pound Goliath, to my mind, accounts for the fact that Jack did not put the big fellow away in the second cable.

Willard Admits Surprise. Mrs. Jess Willard, unknown to anyone, arrived in Toledo Thursday night and witnessed the lacing deal to her husband. Jess is at the home which he leased here for the period that he expected to stay and when interviewed by the writer said:

"Tell them that I would have never fought again even if I had won from Dempsey, the greatest puncher in the land. I did not believe that there was a man alive who could knock me off my feet, and although I was terribly hurt after that left hook which hit me on the jaw, I believe it was surprise as much as anything else which allowed me to be so open. I was taken back to such an extent that I forgot what

I was doing, although it's hard for a fellow to explain his exact condition when he feels like I did about that time."

Jess Doubts Popularity. "It's a good thing for the game that I lost. Dempsey will make a popular champion. I have never been popular, and as I said before, would have retired for keeps had I won," concluded the man who in April, 1915, stopped Jack Johnson.

Mr. and Mrs. Willard will leave for Lawrence, Kan., within a few days. Since the show ended under the baking sun yesterday afternoon there has been a hot rumor here to the effect that Willard had a fractured jaw and that he would lose the sight of his right eye.

This report is untrue. Jess' appearance is back to the way he was, but nothing is hurt permanently except his clothing and his pugilistic earning ability. Mrs. Willard is attending her husband, who has a badly swollen jaw and a cut right eye which is still closed. The lower lip is severely cut on the inside. The Willards would accept no telephone calls today.

Mike Butler Leaves. Promoter Richard declares that he knows nothing relative to how long the mammoth Bayview arena will be left standing. Tex says that there is no match on the pugilistic market big enough for him to exploit at this time. The Nevada man will hike for New York as soon as his business is straightened out here. Mike H. Butler, a third authority, accompanied by Robert Edgren, left for New York at 3:40 P. M. Butler plans a lengthy trip throughout the east and through California before returning.

TOLEDO, O., July 5.—Although official accounting has not been completed, Tex Rickard, promoter of the heavy-weight championship contest between Jess Willard and Jack Dempsey, estimated tonight that the gate receipts would total between \$500,000 and \$600,000.

Revenue agents are assisting in checking up the receipts to determine the amount of war tax due the government. Basing the receipts on \$600,000, the government will receive approximately \$51,600, while approximately \$42,000 will be turned over to Toledo's charity fund.

The city, under the agreement with promoter Rickard, is to receive 7 percent of the gross receipts. Rickard already has paid \$30,000 to this fund.

Mayor Schreiber plans to use this money in sending orphans and children of Toledo's poor families on vacation trips to Michigan. He also plans to devote a part of the money to endow beds for the poor in hospitals. Dempsey left tonight for Cincinnati to open his theatrical engagement there tomorrow. He is to receive \$7000 a week.

Willard spent the day resting quietly at his temporary home in company with his wife and a few friends. Aside from the swelling on the right side of his face, which was subsiding under cold applications, he was none the worse, apparently, for his encounter with Dempsey. He accepted his defeat without any attempt to excuse it or belittle the new champion's fists. However, on the contrary, he made a number of complimentary remarks about Dempsey's ability.

"There is little to add to what is already known," the defeated champion said. "After that first hard swing to the jaw in the first round, Dempsey came in so fast that I never had a chance to clear my head and square away for a better offense or defense. I was fighting in a daze. There is no attempt to alibi my defeat or take credit from Dempsey, who is a fast, clever, hard-hitting opponent, ranking with the best of the heavyweights."

"Now I am through with boxing and expect to be just plain Jess Willard. I hope, however, that the public will remember me as a boxer who always tried to give his best in the ring and did his share to keep the boxing game above suspicion."

Efforts are being made today to obtain permission from proper authorities for the exhibition of the moving pictures of the fight in the soldier camps and hospitals where wounded overseas fighters are recuperating. It is hoped that eventually the pictures may be shown in public generally without violating the law. Rickard and Willard still retain their two-thirds interest in the films, but Dempsey sold his third before the fight.

Because of the controversy over the number of knockdowns Dempsey scored in the first round, the first exhibition of the pictures scheduled here tomorrow is being awaited to settle the dispute. Referee Pecora said there were six knockdowns. Dempsey, however, believes the champion seven times. Boxing experts at the ringside vary from five to seven knockdowns.

American Association News.

WHY is St. Paul leading? Here are a few facts: The Saints have made 75 sacrifice hits, more than any other of the association teams. They lead in stolen bases with 165. They have 135 bases on balls to their credit. Kansas City is the only team ahead of them in this department, having had 187 walks. The Saints are also fairly well down in the strike-out column with 124. Columbus players have struck out 120 times so far this season and Toledo 122.

Columbus and Louisville share honors when it comes to making double plays. The Colons and Senators have each made 49. Kansas City has made 49 and St. Paul 39.

Milwaukee rates third in sacrifice hitting, having made 68 sacrifices, 7 less than St. Paul. Indianapolis has 66, Kansas City 64, Minneapolis 63, Columbus 61, Toledo 41.

Louisville is also second to St. Paul in base stealing and sacrifice hitting. The Colons have stolen 60 bases this season and have made 72 sacrifice hits.

When it comes to striking out, Milwaukee takes the medal. Clarence Rowland's men have fanned 178 times, 11 more than the next team, Minneapolis.

Tim Hendryx is hitting .357. He is one of the leaders in run getting and has not yet been charged with a fielding error.

Taggart of Columbus accomplished something last week. He pulled himself up from 23rd place to sixth, raising his batting mark to .227.
