

ITALIANS SEIZE FOOD AND HOIST RED FLAG

Chamber of Labor Is in Authority in Florence.

1 KILLED, 20 HURT IN RIOT

Troops Occupy Town of Ancona but Crowds Meet With No Resistance in Carrying Away Stocks.

ANCONA, Italy, July 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—The entire stock of foods and other necessities in the city are now in the control of the chamber of labor. These stocks have been labeled with inscriptions reading "Goods requisitioned and at the disposal of the people."

Large contingents of troops occupy the town but crowds meet with no resistance in carrying away stocks. The soldiers were applauded by the people who gave them part of the wine stocks requisitioned. Men in the crowds shouted "Down on boys, you also deserve a drink."

PALESTINE, July 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—Thirty of the principal fish merchants were arrested here today charged as "starvers of the people." The arrests were made after the merchants were denounced by crowds.

BOLOGNA, July 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—Standard meals at fixed prices have been imposed on restaurants here as a result of the food riots. The prices vary from 25 cents to \$1 for a meal, according to the class of the restaurant.

One Killed in Rioting. The situation created by disorders over the cost of living has been improved considerably by the receipt of food stuffs, which are requisitioned immediately upon their arrival.

FLORENCE, July 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—Carabinieri fired upon crowds here today. Disorders are increasing and the ransacking of shops is widespread. One dead and 20 injured was the total of the rioting today. Strengthened by riotous, the crowd has abandoned itself to the general sacking of shops, destroying what is unable to carry away. One entire street is flooded with petroleum, gasoline, wine, beer and olive oil.

Wherever the chamber of labor is able to exercise authority, goods are being transported to apartment houses under the red flag. Large quantities of supplies are being turned over to the municipality in the chief square of the city. Money taken from shops also is being placed in the care of the municipality or the chamber of labor. Thousands of boxes of matches are being distributed free to the crowds.

Labor Chamber in Authority. The only shops respected by the rioters were those bearing the inscription: "This shop is at the disposal of the chamber of labor." The chamber of labor apparently has become the only authority to which the people pay any attention. The automobiles and cabs permitted to use the streets must bear a sign reading "circulation allowed by chamber of labor." The local authorities seemingly have made no effort to suppress the chamber.

All the newspapers have suspended publication because of a strike of printers. The sale of newspapers from other cities is prohibited. One of the manifestoes issued by the chamber of labor announced that all goods which had been sold at prices fixed by the government would hereafter be sold at half that price. All other goods, including medicine, it was ordered, should be sold at a reduction of 25 per cent from the previous prices.

Firing Increases Alarm. Noise of firing in the outskirts of the city has increased the alarm caused by cost of living disorders here.

The red flag has been hoisted in many places here and elsewhere in the Romagna district by what are termed local soviets. These organizations throughout the Romagna district, in addition to imposing rules for gathering and selling food, are also issuing sentences in controversial cases under the authority of the red flag. All available supplies from shops have fallen into the hands of the crowds or of the organizations.

VITERBO, Italy, July 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—Crowds today attacked and ransacked shops. They attempted to storm the residence of the mayor, whom they charged with failure to take measures to reduce the cost of living.

DANIELS PRAISES LEAGUE

METHODIST MINUTE-MEN IN-DORSE NEW COVENANT.

Union of Two Branches of Church Is Also Approved—Wilson May Visit Gathering.

COLEMBUS, Ohio, July 3.—Methodist minute-men had their celebration today at the Methodist centenary here. Secretary of the Navy Daniels, a minute-man of the Methodist church, south, delivered an address on problems confronting the church. He recommended strongly ratification of the league of nations covenant, referring to it as "the noblest covenant the world has known, a patriotic sermon on the Mount, adopted by all allied nations of every clime and every tongue and every faith."

Resolutions approving the league of nations and the planned unification of the two branches of the Methodist church were adopted at the close of the meeting. President Wilson has taken under advisement acceptance of the invitation of centenary officials to spend a day at the exposition, and will announce his decision when he arrives in Washington. Officials said they had received this word today from the president aboard the George Washington.

FOREMAN THOUGHT SUICIDE

MISSING MAN'S COAT FOUND CONTAINING NOTE.

C. M. Smith, Union Meat Company Employee, Believed Deranged, Has Been Missing Three Days.

C. M. Smith of 1615 Chatham street, foreman at the Union Meat company's plant at Kenton, is believed to have committed suicide by drowning in the Columbia river, near the interstate

bridge. A coat and hat found on Hayden's Island by a bridge-tender was identified yesterday by J. R. Myers, son-in-law of Mr. Smith, and a note found pinned to the coat requested that the finder notify Mrs. C. M. Smith at 1615 Chatham street. Mr. Smith received an injury to his back at the packing plant about three weeks ago, which seemed to become steadily worse. It is believed that this caused a derangement of his mind which led to the ending of his life. Mr. Smith was 54 years old and had been employed at the Union meat company's plant for a number of years. An effort was made yesterday to recover his body by dragging the Columbia river between the island and the bridge, but with no success. Continued effort will be made today. Mr. Myers has posted a reward of \$25 for the recovery of the body. Mr. Smith was last seen at the packing plant last Wednesday noon, but employees of the plant did not notice his departure and have no means of knowing when he left the plant. The coat and hat were found on Thursday morning and turned over to the Sheriff Hurlbert, who began an immediate investigation.

SUFFRAGE LEADER LAUDED

FUNERAL OF DR. ANNA SHAW IS NOTABLE EVENT.

Decorations Pinned on Breast as Prominent Woman Lies in Coffin at Late Hour.

PHILADELPHIA, July 5.—With the pinning on her breast of the distinguished service medal conferred by the government for her work, and the jeweled American flag worn by Susan R. Anthony, funeral services for Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, honorary president of the American Woman's Suffrage association, were brought to a solemn close at her late home in Moylan, Pa., late today.

Leaders of women from all parts of the country gathered about her rose-covered coffin to pay their last respects in a ceremony, the outstanding feature of which was simplicity. Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the suffrage association, fastened the suffrage pin upon the breast of Dr. Shaw as a symbol of the highest honor the women of the world had to offer. The pin is an American flag with a diamond for every state which voted for suffrage before the national suffrage amendment passed congress.

The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Dr. Carolina Bartlett Crane of Kalamazoo, Mich., and Mrs. C. W. Crane, a brief address eulogized Dr. Shaw for her efforts in behalf of women and laid at her feet the honor for the passage of the Susan B. Anthony amendment.

The home was a profusion of flowers. Nearly every state sent a floral tribute, as did President and Mrs. Wilson, the council of national defense and many individuals and organizations. Telegrams of condolence were received by Dr. Shaw's relatives from hundreds of well-known men and women, both at home and abroad. A cablegram was received from President Wilson. In accordance with Dr. Shaw's wishes, her body will be cremated.

MOTORCYCLIST HAS LUCK

Racer, Going 70 Miles an Hour, Hits Dog; Escapes Accident.

ALBANY, Or., July 5.—(Special.)—To strike a dog while driving a motorcycle 70 miles an hour and not even jar the machine was the experience here yesterday afternoon of Martin Swyter of this city. The dog was thrown at least 50 yards and instantly killed. Swyter was participating in the motorcycle races here on First street. He had just crossed the finish line at First and Baker streets when the dog started across directly in front of his machine. Spectators expected Swyter to be thrown, but the machine didn't swerve an inch.

YOUTH'S FUNERAL IS HELD

Kenneth Lee of Oregon City Is Buried at Clarkes.

OREGON CITY, July 5.—(Special.)—Funeral services for the late Kenneth Lee, 19-year-old son of Mr. Harry Lee of Clarkes, were held from the family home of John Gard, uncle of the young man, this afternoon. R. V. E. W. Seaman, pastor of the Presbyterian church of this city, officiating. Interment was at Clarkes cemetery. Kenneth Lee was born in Oregon City. He graduated from a Portland high school.

OREGON CITY CHILD DEAD

Charles Starr Succumbs to Attack of Scarlet Fever.

OREGON CITY, Or., July 5.—(Special.)—Charles Starr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Starr of Oswego, died at the family home July 4 from scarlet fever. The child was 19 years of age, and is survived by his parents and a little sister.

Polk Lands Appraised. DALLAS, Or., July 5.—(Special.)—V. C. Brock, a government land appraiser from the Spokane reserve bank, has been in Dallas and Polk county this week for the purpose of appraising farm lands in this county, covering more than 80,000 acres owned by that bank. According to E. K. Plasecki, secretary of the Polk County Federal Land association, the organization is in fine shape, with no delinquents on its books. Many farmers throughout the county have taken advantage of the federal loan association's low rate of interest in securing loans.

Mill Nearing Completion. DALLAS, Or., July 5.—(Special.)—The new sawmill of the Valley Lumber company, being erected on the O. C. Smith property near Lewisville, is nearing completion and will be ready to begin operations within a short time. The mill is to be operated by Captain E. B. Hamilton, who recently returned from France, where he served with an engineer regiment in the Argonne forest, and O. C. Smith of this city. The company will engage in a general lumber business.

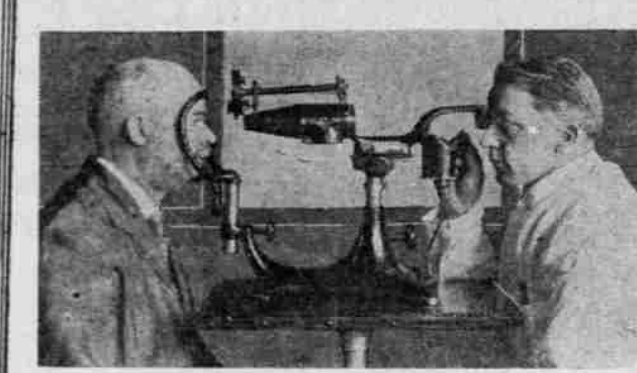

HOOVER FEEDS EUROPEANS

AMERICAN RELIEF HEAD MOVES FOOD TRAINS RAPIDLY.

Vast Quantities of Supplies Are Handled Out of Trieste and Flume Headquarters.

NEW YORK, July 5.—A recent report by Herbert Hoover to the supreme economic council on the work of the special mission appointed by the American Relief administration to re-establish transportation in central Europe was made public by the American Relief administration here tonight on receipt of a cablegram from Mr. Hoover. In his cablegram Mr. Hoover quoted Lieutenant-Colonel William G. Atwood, Chattanooga, head of the mission, to the effect that an average of 2100 tons of supplies had been moved daily from Trieste since March 23, an increase of 1100 tons daily since the American mission went into action.

"When the American mission began operations Trieste was clogged with 41,000 tons of relief supplies and Flume with 12,000," said the cablegram, "and the daily movement was only 700 tons from Trieste and nothing from Flume. Since March 23 the mission has moved from Trieste 178,000 tons. Some days we exceed 4000 tons of supplies. There were 125,000 tons delivered to the Austrian republic and 52,000 tons to Czechoslovakia."
