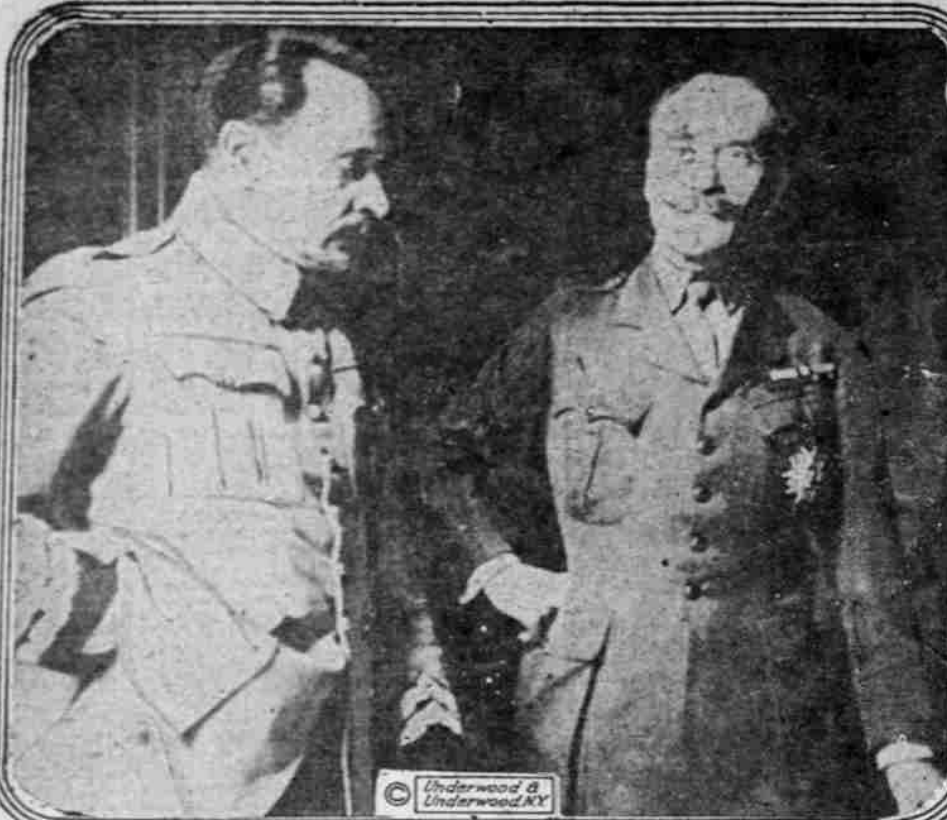


NEWS OF WORLD AS SEEN BY CAMERA

GENERAL HALLER of Poland and General Henrys of France are the military officials who are in command of the armies to protect Poland against the menacing armies of bolshevism coming from the east.

Captain Watson M. Washburn, assistant athletic officer of the American expeditionary forces, was congratulated by General Feraud on the fine showing made in the inter-allied tennis tournament in Paris. Captain Washburn and Lieutenant Dean Mathey were victors in contests.

The Vickers-Vimy-Rolls bomber plane which crossed the Atlantic in 19 hours 13 minutes won a place in history. It marked an epoch in aerial navigation.

The bravery and endurance of Miss Mary Cunningham, nearly 80 years of age, in holding to her humble lodgings at Courtrai, France, during the entire German occupation, is said to be one of the wonderful stories of the war. The windows of her house were riddled, most of the furniture used for firewood, but she stayed through the ordeal. She is called the "Heroine of Courtrai." Special interest in this country is aroused by reason of the aged woman being a cousin of President Wilson. She is a native of Ulster.

Three American women, Dr. Estelle Warner of Portland, Miss Ruth Hyne-

man of San Francisco and Miss Lillian Hull of Newton, Mass., have been designated for Young Women's Christian association work in Russia. They are now en route to their stations.

In readiness for whatever duties they might be called upon to perform, the American army of occupation has been kept in the best of training. None but regular army divisions remained in Germany when the treaty of peace was signed. One division was recently reviewed on a plateau above the Rhine, near the fortress of Ehrenbreitstein.

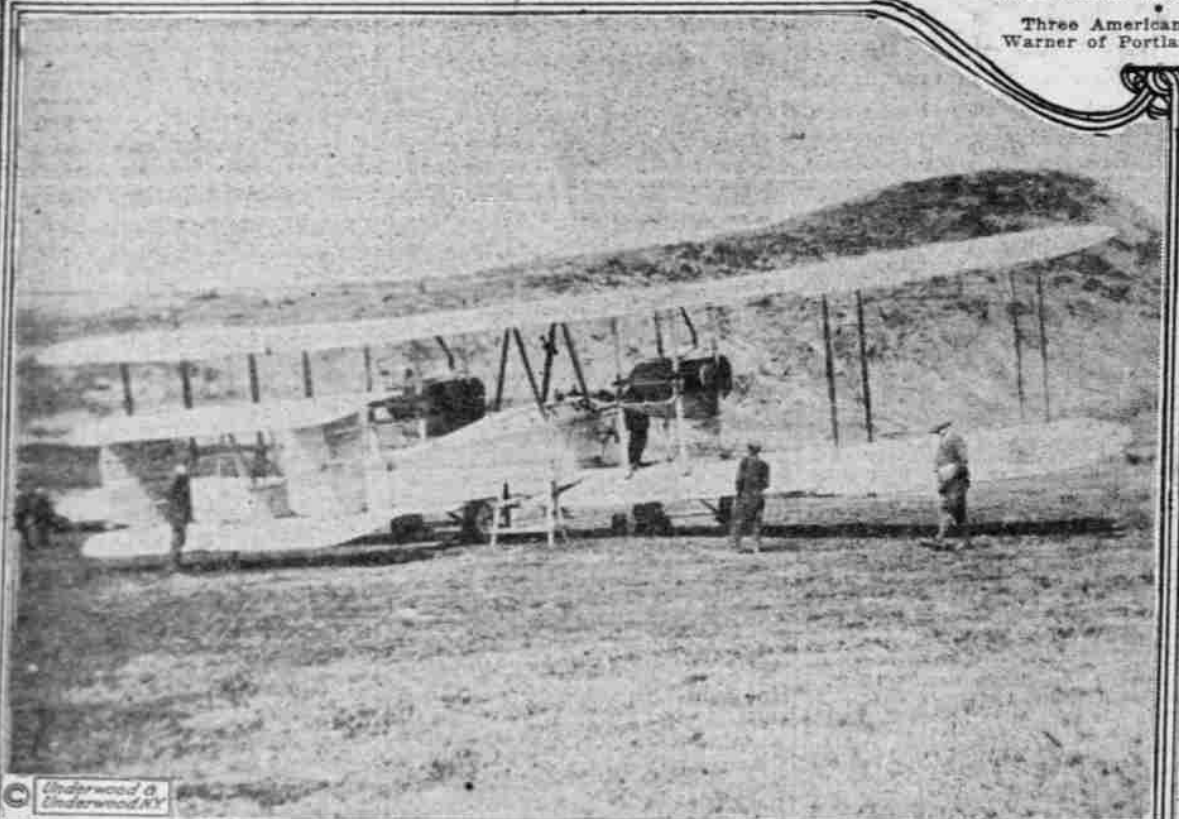

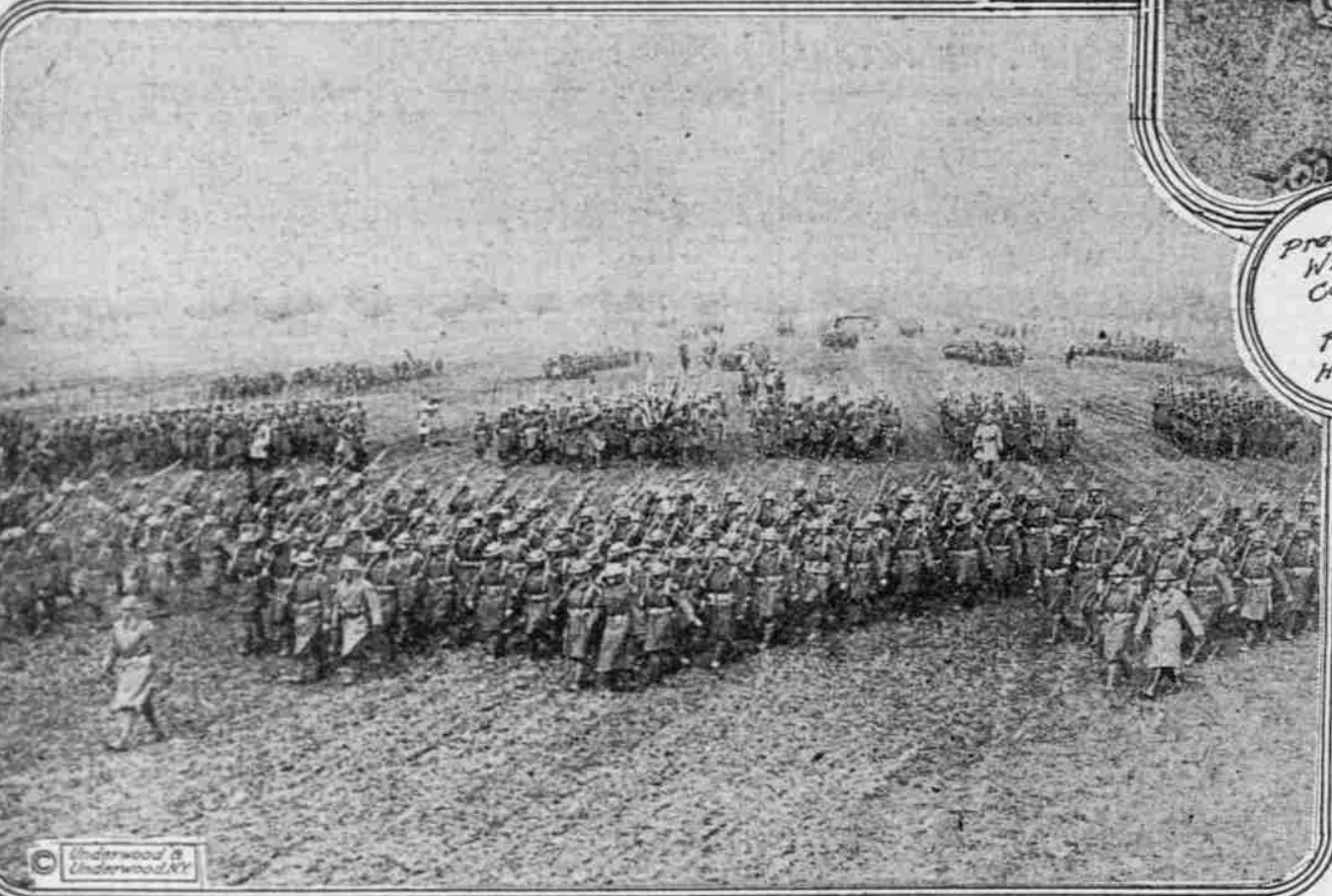

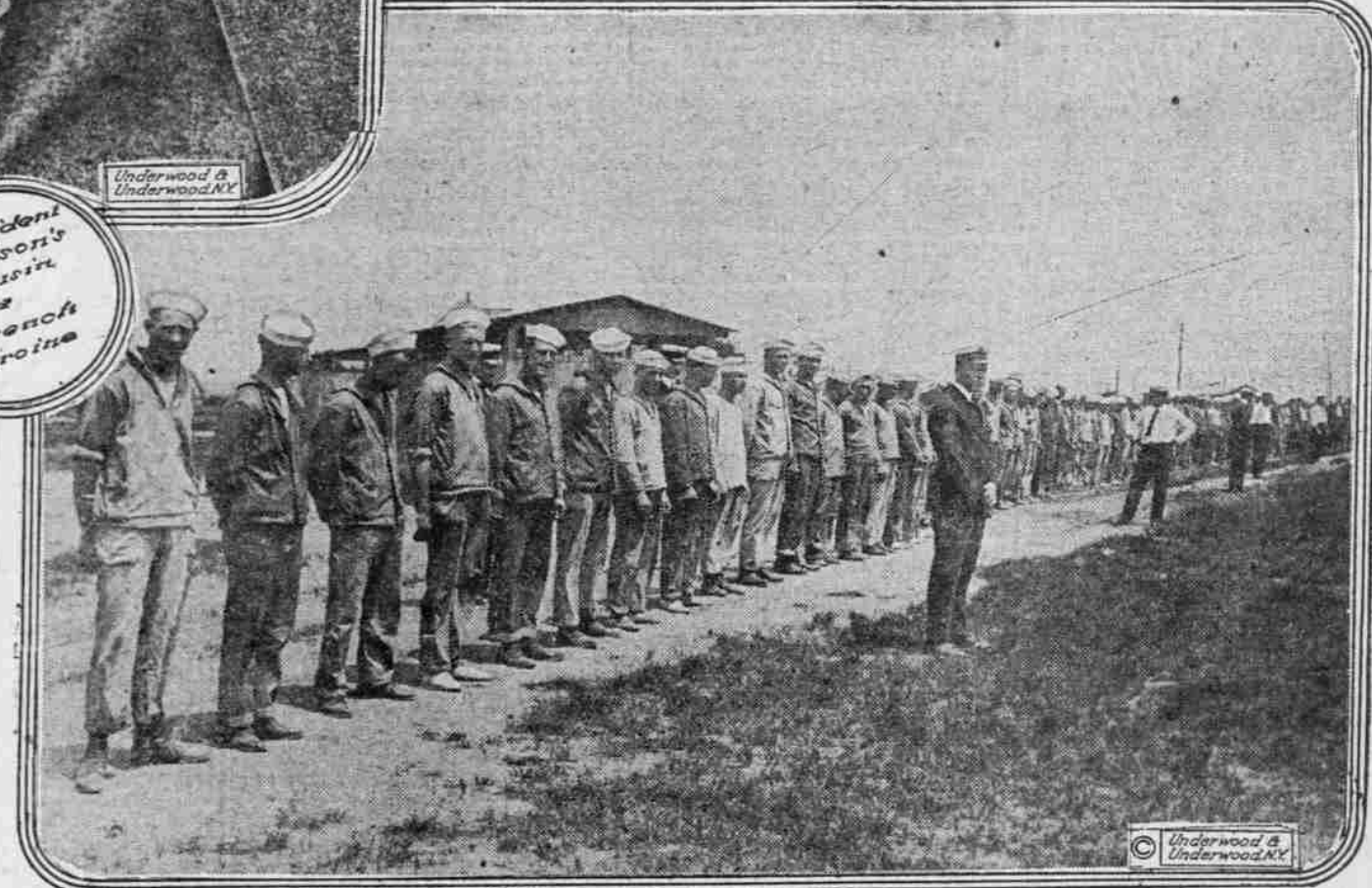

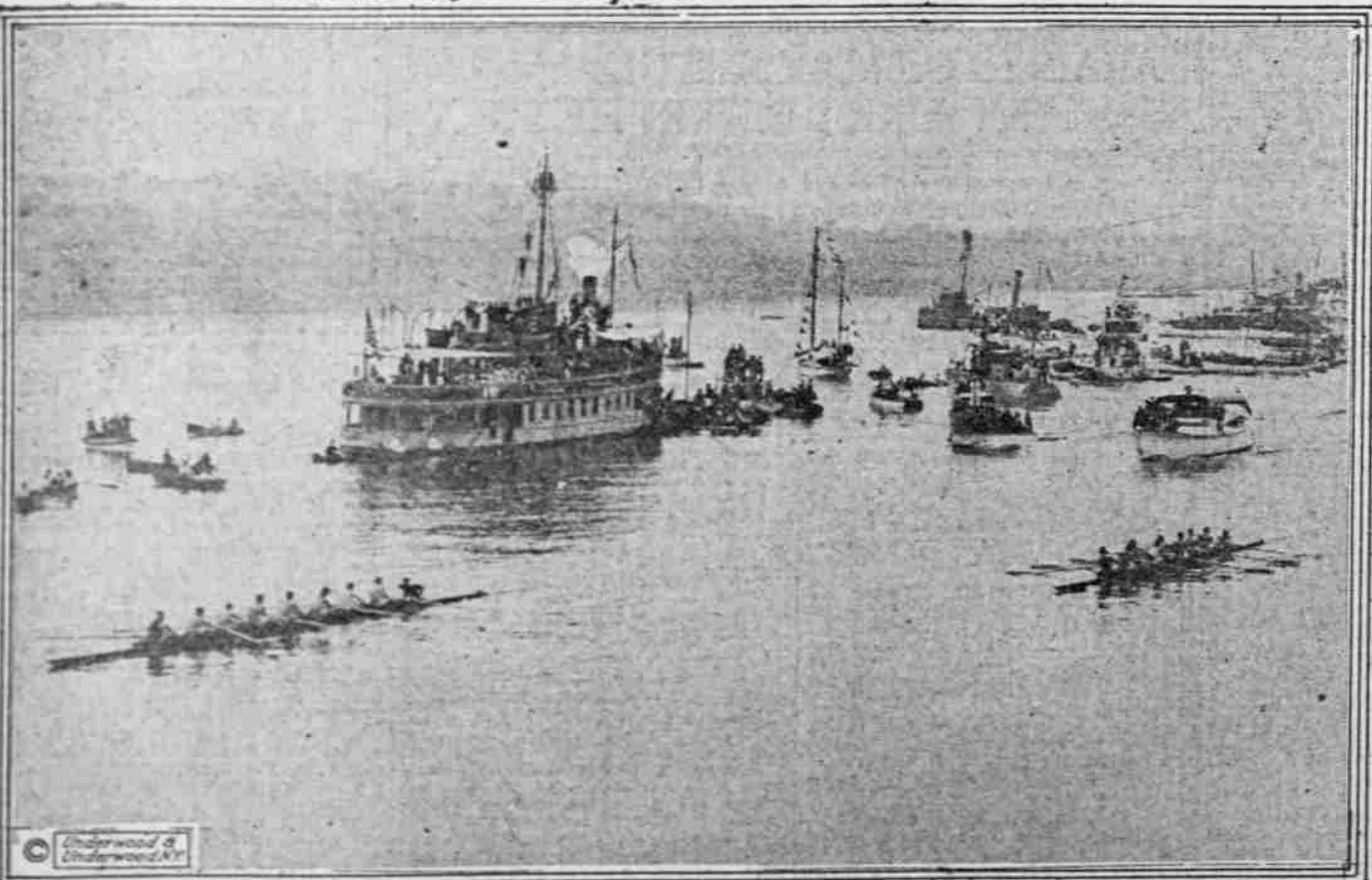
