Many Bright Pages Written in Country's Naval History.

FAMOUS FIGHTERS DOOMED

Foremost Among Achievements is Part Played by Great Fleet During Spanish-American War.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Decision of the navy department to break up and sell for junk or use for targets 12 obsolete battleships marks the passing of a fleet of vessels long identified with many of the most glorious achievements of the new American navy.

The doomed ships, including the famous old Spanish-American war fleet consisting of the Oregon, Iowa, Indiana and Massachusetts, and the more modern but hardly less famous Kentucky, Kearsarge, Albatross, Illinois, Wisconsin, Ohio, Missouri and Maine, composed one of the most, if not the most, powerful battlefleets in the world more than 25 years ago.

SEAMEN CHEER EXECUTIVE

ABOARD U. S. S. GEORGE WASHINGTON, July 5.—(By Wireless to the Associated Press.)—President Wilson might have been an American sailor, he told the seamen of the George Washington today in the course of a stirring tribute he paid to the American navy and the part it had borne throughout the war.

His speech to the crew was made when the sailors assembled between decks to give the president a hearty greeting as he moved about among them. It was the navy, he said, which had put the army in the fighting field by safely transporting two million men across the Atlantic, and it was the navy that engaged in the prodigious task of promptly and safely returning the great host home.

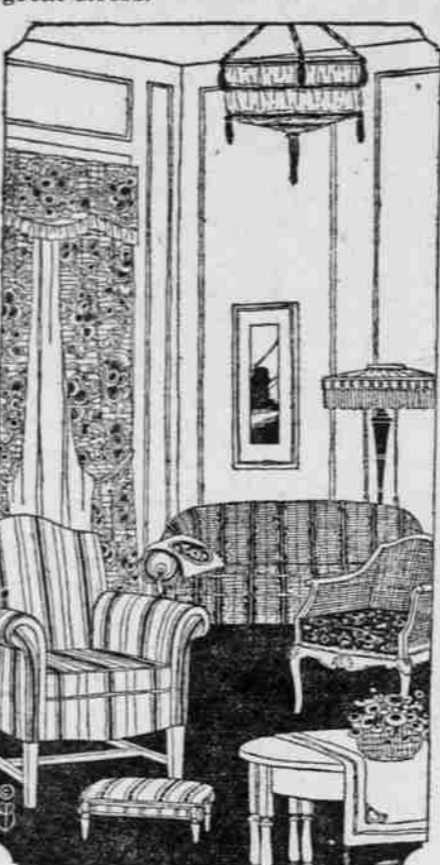
