

WONDERFUL GOWNS TO BE SEEN IN PARIS

Sergeant Blumenthal Returns to Place Behind Counter.

FRENCH GIRLS DISAPPOINT

American Women Are Much Better Dressed Than French; Can Learn Very Little From Paris Styles.

"Yes, one sees some wonderful evening gowns in Paris," remarked Sergeant Ed Blumenthal yesterday, "but there's getting to be less and less to them. Shouldn't be surprised if the women got down to Hula garments sooner or later."

Sergeant Blumenthal, who for ten years has been connected with the Wonder Millinery store in this city, has just returned from service overseas with the motor transport corps. While in the army he had an opportunity to travel from Paris to Monte Carlo and Nice and, on account of his business connections made a study of women's apparel in the shops and on the boulevards. His general conclusion is that the American women as a whole are much better dressed than the French and that the former can gain little by looking to Paris for style suggestions.

Parisians Easily Forget War.
"True Parisians," he said, in speaking of the effect of the war on styles, "have easily forgotten that there ever was any fight. The cafes and theaters are crowded and designers are just as busy as before the war. Streets are again brilliantly lighted and with the casting off of the gloom they are getting away from sombre military modes and are into bright colors and extreme styles that would hardly be countenanced in an American city."

That the return of the American youths from France will have much to do with lessening the demand for imported articles is the opinion of Sergeant Blumenthal.

"The fellows are glad to have everything American and are so tired of France they won't be inclined to register much enthusiasm over Paris fuff."

French Women Are Disappointing.
"I was frankly disappointed in the French women after I had heard so much of their styles. Of course there are some who are wonderfully dressed, but to every one of them there would be a hundred in the United States. One reason, I believe, for this is that American women are wearing American designed clothing and the style has improved. They don't profit any longer by looking to Paris, where anything with an American trade mark is held in as much esteem as we formerly had for the 'made in Paris' label. For instance, the French shoe people haven't a show-down beside the Americans. One firm from this country has five stores in Paris alone."

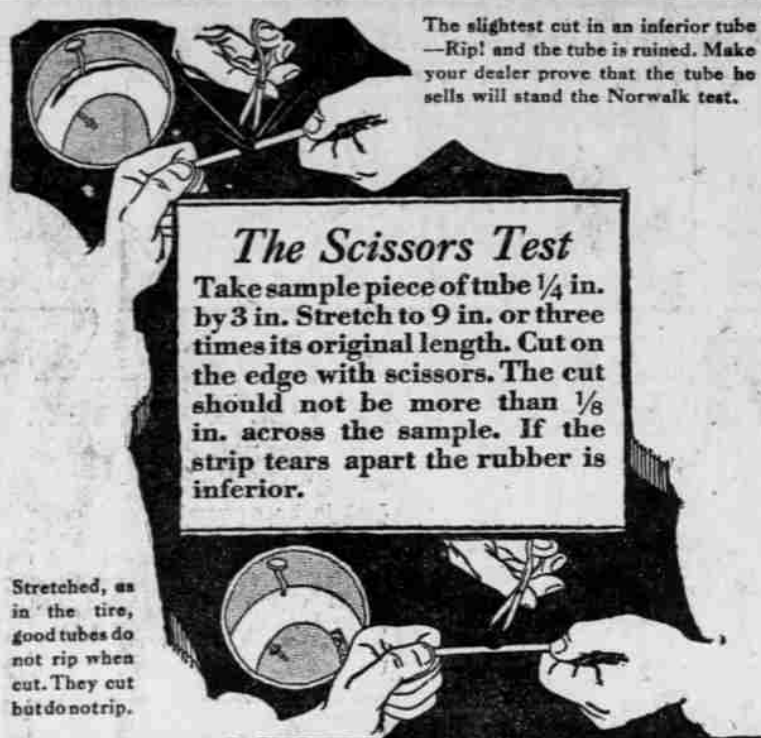
Referring to freak styles, Sergeant Blumenthal said: "You will find that these are mostly brought to this country by the buyers who are forever seeking something bizarre and unusual."

Fashion's Inconsistencies Seen.
"French women are no more remarkably dressed than those in this country. Ideas taken from the continent are very seldom carried out on this side, as they were in the original garments."

"For a while, of course, there was an advantage in importing fancy articles such as the fine laces and beaded bags because of the cheapness of labor."

He pointed out what to him were some of the inconsistencies of the French and spoke of seeing women in hats that in this country would be out of date. Many of them laden with ill-arranged ostrich plumes. Furs, too, he declared, lacked the style and beauty of American ones. In the stores window displays are poorly arranged, the main idea with the shopkeeper apparently being to crowd as much of his stock as possible into them.

Monte Carlo Climate Praised.
In February, Sergeant Blumenthal was in Monte Carlo and Nice, which were just opening up to tourists for the first time since the beginning of the war. A number of French had already arrived there, but the places were largely occupied by Yankee soldiers. He praised the climate and architecture and said this was the only part of the world where a pink house with robin's egg blue balconies would fit into the color scheme.
On his way home he stopped at Gibraltar and had an opportunity to examine much of the Spanish hand-embroidered work. He reached New York June 17 and was discharged June 25 coming west as quickly as possible. Altogether he was nine months in France and, previous to that time, ten months on the Texas border.

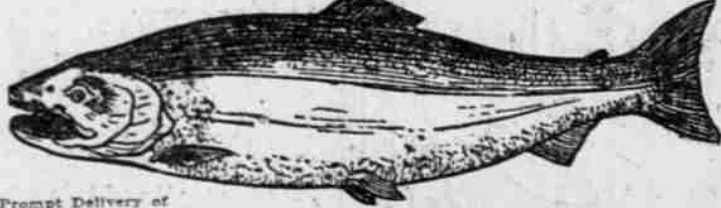
Prof. Dunton Goes to Castle Rock
