NIGHT OF JUNE 9 RECALLED

Descriptions of Missing Girls Fall to Tally With Body of Woman Buried Near Olympia.

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 12.—(Special.)—An eyewitness who talked with a man near the scene of the murder and burial of an unidentified woman near Plum station on the night of June 9, together with a fair working description of the man, has been obtained from a letter written to Chief of Police C. Mack of Olympia by E. W. Ellis, coroner of Tacoma. Mr. Ellis wrote as follows:

"I was passing through that country on my way to Portland and remember a man who acted very suspiciously. We had passed through Olympia a little after 10 o'clock in the evening and were going south on the evening of June 9. I came to an abandoned farm about a quarter of 8 o'clock and decided we would camp there. An auto was standing on the right-hand side of the road, headed north. Just as I was going to get out of the machine a man came hurrying over from this other machine and asked me what I was going to do.

BIG HANGARS TO BE BUILT

HOUSES FOR DIRIGIBLES AS LARGE AS ANY IN WORLD.

Expenditure of Approximately \$3,500,000 Authorized in New Naval Appropriation Bill.

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Acting under specific authority granted in the new naval appropriation bill the navy department will start construction on two of the largest dirigible hangars in the world.

Ground area necessary for the construction of a double hangar will be about one square mile. Each hangar will be about 800 feet long, 250 feet wide and 150 to 200 feet high. It is probable that all steel construction will be used and officials estimate that from eight to ten months will be needed for their erection.

Provision for the purchase abroad of a Zeppelin type airship at a cost not to exceed \$2,500,000 is made in the new bill, and the construction in this country of a similar machine at a cost of \$1,500,000. It is probable that the machine purchased abroad will be of the British R-34 model, although larger.

It probably will be flown to this country by an American crew, the only other alternative being to attempt to tow it by cables from the coast. Negotiations looking to the purchase have already been entered into with foreign nations.

Secretary Daniels said he had no further statement to make regarding the rumored trans-Pacific flight. Naval officers believe, however, that such a flight will be attempted shortly after the nation's possession of its first cruising dirigible.
