HERMISTON, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—President Kerr and regents J. K. Weatherford, Jefferson Myers, G. von der Hellen and G. M. Cornwall of Oregon Agricultural College, accompanied by Mrs. Weatherford, Mrs. Myers, Mrs. von der Hellen and Mrs. Cornwall, with the Oregonian scribe, left Hood River yesterday morning for Astoria and returned about noon, where they had dinner. After dinner, the party went to the branch experiment station near Moro, where they met the director, Mr. Stephens and a couple of dozen farmers who had gathered to greet the party. Several hours were passed in going over the progress of the station and in discussions with the farmers.

Much satisfaction was expressed by Dr. Kerr and the regents at the way things were being conducted, but more particularly at the good feeling and fellowship existing between the workers of the station and the land owners. In the evening, a fine banquet was tendered the party at the Wasco hotel by the citizens of the county and the special-making committee. The party left until midnight. This morning at 8 o'clock, we were on our way, in the three machines of the party, to this place.

Mr. Myers, Mrs. Myers and two friends from Albany branched off a few miles east of the Forks River to go by the wagon. Heppner and Pilot Rock to meet us tomorrow at Pendleton, and Mr. and Mrs. Weatherford stopped at Oles to visit Mr. Weatherford's brother for a short time. Dr. Kerr, Mrs. and Mrs. Cornwall and the writer came on and reached here before dark, after passing through the most severe sand storm witnessed in this section for a long time. It became so dark that the driver of the car could not see ten inches ahead, and the machine was stalled. After a busy half hour in the blinding storm, a near resident came along and assisted us in getting started. One of our sorrowfuls is that we did not get the name of this good Samaritan. Our Waterloo, as it promised to be for a time, happened about 25 miles south of here, and we made the run of 97 miles from Wasco here in less than ten hours, and by the way, stopped and had a mighty fine dinner at home. After an inspection of the station here we will go on to Pendleton, where we hope to be before midnight. In the morning we will leave for the station at Union, and from there to Baker and thence to Burns.

UNION STATION IS INSPECTED
O. A. C. Party Entertained by Ad Men at Luncheon.

UNION, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—President Kerr and his party from Astoria arrived at this station here this morning. The party reached La Grande at 1 o'clock, after a pleasant trip through the Bluff mountains. A fine lunch had been prepared for the party at the Hotel Foley by the Union County Ad club and 40 members of that club were in waiting. Only one of the three minutes arrived in time to participate in the lunch and speaking but that car contained two regents to uphold the cause of Oregon Agricultural College, Mr. Myers and Vanden Hillan.

When the other members of the party arrived they were entertained by the ladies at the hotel and the women were taken in automobiles to view the town. Mrs. Cornwall was taken ill last night at the Hotel Pendleton and the effects of enduring the sand storm yesterday in Morrow county.

With her husband she left the party at Pendleton and the couple will return to Portland as soon as Mrs. Cornwall is able to travel.

We were joined at La Grande by Walter M. Pierce and Mrs. Pierce, who will accompany us for the balance of the trip. Mr. Pierce, a regent of great zeal for the interests of Oregon Agricultural college, was to meet us at our first stop, Hood River, but his car was stalled with an accident, causing the delay.

Tonight at Hermiston the president and regents made a report on the rotation of the experiment station there, praising the system of experiments made by the director and the valuable aid being given to the orchardists and alfalfa growers.

ORCHARD COMBINE FORMED
Walla Walls Dealer Relates Plan of \$125,000,000 Corporation.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 12.—John W. Langdon, president of the Walla Walla commercial club, and secured orchardist, of the northwest, just home from an eastern trip during which he assisted in the organization at Pittsburg of a \$125,000,000 corporation, which is buying up big orchards.

Through some of the experiments the director now is able to make an analysis of the soil and to determine the amount of water to be used for the best growth of alfalfa.

Thus the land owners may no longer work blind in seeding land to that legume, if the soil is not adapted to its growth they can find it out without costly experimentation, simply by presenting samples of soil at the station for free analysis.

All along the line there has come to the ears of the president and regents fine testimony as to the work being done by the station.

It has been demonstrated that those who consult the directors of the stations and follow their advice as to planting, cultivation, selection and rotation of crops are far outdistancing their haphazard neighbors, who plant by the moon and cultivate as their fathers and grandfathers did, the cheapest of the necessities.

Tonight, after inspecting the station here, which is under the direction of Robert Withycombe, son of the late governor, the party will take dinner here and then proceed to Baker, where we hope to be before midnight.

Tomorrow morning we will start for Burns, probably passing Sunday night at Canyon City. We expect to be at the Burns station by mid-afternoon.

NORSEMEN LIKE OREGON
SHIPPERS AND BUYERS END FIRST WEEK OF VISIT.

Hood River Orchards and Astoria Fishing Industry to Be Viewed. Buying Programme Extensive.

Norwegian, Swedish and Danish shipping men and buyers, who came here at the invitation of the Pacific International corporation, of this city, have found Oregon and its products more extensive and attractive than had been pictured, and the extent of their buying programme is said to have staggered producers and manufacturers with whom they have come in contact. The party has ended the first week of its visit.

Yesterday and today are regarded recreation periods, the Columbia highway being traversed yesterday and today the Portland Golf club will be their mecca. Tomorrow's programme will embrace a continuation of the plant inspections and delving into market conditions, and Tuesday the members will go to Hood River for a tour of the orchard section and conference with apple packers. Wednesday they are slated to visit Astoria. Canned fish, like canned fruit and vegetables, are related among the necessities they feel greatly in need of, and their intention is to invade markets held by Germany.

The opinion is expressed that the effort to reach an understanding as to the ship work, since it is not alone desirous to have more private contracts for the future, but with closer relations throughout this region and northern Europe, the construction of steamers for the Norsemen will help to carry northwest products to them.

RUPERT DUE NEXT WEEK
ESCAPED PRISONER EXPECTED AT SALEM TUESDAY.

Federal Officials at San Diego Deliver Fugitive to State Agent After Some Delay.

SALEM, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—William Esch, special state agent, left San Diego, Cal., for Oregon tonight with Clyde "Red" Rupert, who escaped from the United States Penitentiary at San Diego, Cal., on July 10, and is expected to reach Salem Tuesday.

When Mr. Esch arrived at San Diego federal officers refused to deliver the prisoner until they had been so instructed by the United States district attorney. Telegrams were sent to Governor Olcott by Mr. Esch and the former communicated with United States District Attorney Haney at Portland, with the result that the San Diego authorities were notified to surrender the prisoner.

Previous to the arrival of Mr. Esch in San Diego it had been agreed between Governor Olcott and Mr. Haney that Rupert would be returned to the Oregon penitentiary to serve the remainder of his sentence. News of the start of the officer and prisoner for Salem was contained in a telegram received at the executive offices tonight.

CITY AWAITS DE VALERA
Portland to Entertain President of Irish Republic.

As soon as a copy of the speaking schedule of Eamon De Valera, president of the Irish republic, now touring this country, can be obtained in Portland, the United States Penitentiary will begin preparations for his entertainment here. A parade and mass meeting will probably be held in his honor. The United States Penitentiary at San Francisco and may go from there to Los Angeles before his departure for a few days later.

LICENSE RULING IS GIVEN
Owner of Slaughtering Plant Is Permitted to Feed Offal.

SALEM, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—A man who operates a slaughtering plant and feeds offal to swine owned by himself and kept on his own premises, is not in the business of disposing of bodies of dead animals to feed swine garbage and other offal, according to a legal opinion given by the attorney-general today.

The opinion was given at the request of Dairy and Food Commissioner Mickel in the case of an operator of a Portland slaughtering plant. Under the attorney-general's opinion the operator is not subject to state license.
