### OIL DRILLING AT MOCLIPS IS BEGUN

Standard Is Operating in Olympic Peninsula Field.

### STIR IN REALTY RESULTS

Nearby Properties Take On New Valuation, Even if Outside of Line of Development.

HOQUIAM, Wash., July 12.—(Special.)—After several months of preparation, the Standard Oil Company of California began drilling for oil near Moclips today. The well is the first of several which will be sunk by the company in an effort to prove the Olympic peninsula field. Three shifts of drillers and tool dressers will be used at the rig. Superintendent Thompson announced when drilling started. The drill will be kept running day and night. Superintendent Thompson made no predictions on the length of time needed to drill this first well, but added that the formation and the number of fishing jobs would determine the time. The officials expect to find oil at a depth of not to exceed 2500 feet. The expense of drilling this first well will exceed \$100,000, the equipment being run up on a plank roadway which the company had to build over logged-off land into Grays Harbor county. Records at the county courthouse show 3200 acres of land in this county to be under lease to the Standard Oil Company of California. In addition, the company holds much land in the Indian reservation on government leases. Owners of land who have leased to the Standard are given a one-eighth royalty on all oil produced from their property. They also receive 10 cents an acre per month as rental. The company agrees to drill on each tract and leased within five years. While the company has not announced the location of its second well, it is believed this will be in the Indian reservation. Superintendent Thompson says it has become the policy of the Standard Oil operating department of recent years to prospect in new territories in an effort to enlarge the oil supply of the

world. Regions where oil is likely to exist are recommended by the company's geologists and drilling is then undertaken. The Moclips field is among the places recommended. At the starting of drilling will be kept up for about ten days. After that it will be stopped for about a week while a cellar is built under the rig. After the completion of this cellar there will be no let-ups in drilling unless these are forced by fishing jobs. Half a dozen oil offices already have sprung into existence on the streets of Aberdeen and similar concerns have opened in business here. Real estate dealers are almost forgetting city realty to devote most of their time to handling oil lands and leases. Speculative values have been placed on tracts 20 to 30 miles from the Standard oil operation, property not even in

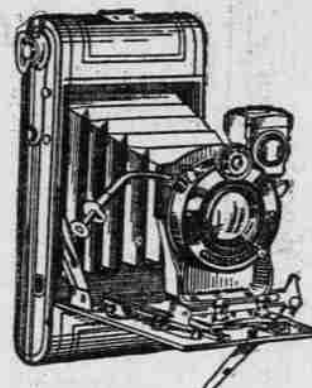
