BY E. R. LOCKHART, OF PORTLAND. PARIS, June 22.—Important front-line positions in Paris, Y. M. C. A. work are now held by two Oregon men who have forged their way to leading places by their ability and fidelity. They are Owen A. McGill, of McMinnville, and James E. Stevenson, of Portland. The former has recently been promoted to the head position in the postoffice and now is the chief of the postal service for France, while Stevenson a few weeks ago was placed in charge of a large department in the night-seeing division of Paris and under him some 15 men directing soldier parties besides five trucks loaded to the guards every day.

taken by the speaker, this has been overwhelmed by a storm of applause in favor of the speaker's position. For instance, just last Sunday night O. W. Stewart of Chicago, who has spoken throughout the country, delivered the address. At the climax of his speech I heard one soldier in a loud aside give expression to his disgust. A moment later the big audience burst out in applause at the dry sentiments of the speaker in a most enthusiastic manner, the hand-clapping and cheering was so loud and so long that the slightest doubt as to the position of the big soldier audience on this question.

This audience has not been trained to appreciate such views by Palais de Glace speakers, for every day a vast proportion of the members are strangers and every few days practically the entire audience has undergone a change, as the men are usually in Paris on a three-day leave. They come from Germany, Italy, all over Europe, and their expression of conviction must carry weight with those who think and serve to convince many that the A. E. F. in France will "set" the prohibition question the other way. Upon their return to America, as is so often boasted, it is a mistake to think that the American force to a man is set against the banishment of drink, as it is also a mistake to think that the returning army goes home, each man with a Bible under his arm and a hymn book under the other, singing "Onward, Christian Soldier." These are two radically extreme views and one is about as reasonable as the other.

I have recently visited the Verdun section and traveled by automobile and army truck all over the famous battle-field. Beyond Verdun, in the Argonne where there were 20,000 American soldiers in camp, including 8,000 negro warriors, I was greatly impressed with the American national cemetery, a large, open-air place, surrounded by trenches, crossing and criss-crossed with dugouts and shell holes dotting the country. The hell of war has swept hill and plain, and the Argonne is doing police duty in Paris, his best being on the famous Champs Elysees, the fashionable thoroughfare. Mr. Goodman is a fine type of westerner and a good representative of the west-coast state. He is one of the best-looking M. P.'s in Paris and there are 2000 of them here. He has relatives in the Alsace country, a brother-in-law in Corvallis and is known in Salem.

I think it was the Corvallis man who remarked to me that he guessed he was not a good soldier, and when I asked him why, replied: "I have not been bedbugged, loused, deloused nor cootied, since coming to France."
