## JOHNSTON WINS TITLE

### NATIONAL CLAY COURTS FINALS HOTLY CONTESTED.

Miss Carrie M. Neeley of Chicago Is Outplayed 6-4, 6-2 in Straight Sets.

CHICAGO, July 19.—William M. Johnston of San Francisco was the spectacular star of the ninth annual clay-court tennis tournament, which virtually closed today with Johnston as new national men's singles champion and one of the doubles champions.

Before the terrific driving power of the Californian, a former tennis champion whose victories were in the nature of a come-back, William T. Tilden Jr. of Philadelphia fell in defeat in the singles title match.

Tilden, the 1918 champion, was outplayed and Johnston pounded the ball time and again against Tilden's base line and had him playing weakly at the net.

In the first set Johnston accumulated 24 points to Tilden's 7. The sets resulted 6-0, 6-1, 4-6, 6-2 in Johnston's favor.

Johnston shared the doubles championship with Samuel Hardy of Chicago, one of last year's champions, in the defeat of Robert G. Kinsey of San Francisco and Axel Graven of Berkeley, Cal.

Another champion, Miss Carrie M. Neeley of Chicago, fell before Miss Corinne Gould of St. Louis, who won the title, 6-4, 6-2.

Miss Neeley and Miss Mary Katherine Voorhes of Chicago won the women's doubles championship from Mrs. Harry Peterson of Cleveland and Miss Gould, St. Louis, 6-3, 6-0.

The final of the mixed doubles, with Miss Marion Leighton of Chicago and Robert Kinsey of San Francisco opposing Mrs. Ralph Field of Cincinnati, one of the 1918 women's doubles champions, and Axel Graven of Berkeley, Cal., remained to be played off tomorrow.

A great cheer went up in the midst of the dance given last night at the Laurelhurst club in honor of the visiting tennis players who competed in the league and one of the leading juniors and boys' tournament, which was concluded on the club's courts yesterday afternoon.

It came when Walter A. Goss, sectional delegate for the United States Lawn Tennis association, presented to Phil Neer, of Portland, northwest junior champion, his credentials to compete

in the national junior tennis championships, which will be run off on the courts of the West Side Tennis club, Forest Hills, N. Y., next month.

Neer won the northwest championship and the right to go east when he beat Jack Wright, of Spokane, at Laurelhurst Friday afternoon.

"In presenting you with your credentials as a candidate to go to New York City representing the Pacific northwest section in the national tournament of juniors I desire to offer you my sincerest congratulations and to tell you that we have every confidence in your ability to bring credit to the club which you represent. There has been no challenge trophy arranged for to be given to the winner who makes this eastern trip. I now have the matter up with the various clubs and doubtless there will be such a trophy offered this season," said Goss.

"The national tournament opens in New York August 25 and Mr. George P. Allen, president of the United States National Lawn Tennis association, has asked you to be his guest for a week prior to the big event at the country club at Westchester. They have most excellent turf courts at the Westchester club and I hope you will be able to avail yourself of this invitation."

"Finances necessary toward making this trip have been provided for by many of your friends here in Portland and I am sure you have our best wishes."
