TACOMA, Wash., July 19.—(Special.)—Schools for officers at Camp Lewis will be opened at once. To provide for the camp has been divided into three departments, camp headquarters, camp provost guard and camp utilities. Day License in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 19.—San Francisco has an ordinance that requires vendors having no fixed place of business to make their headquarters in hotels or other temporary places, to pay a license of \$50 a day. Out-of-town dealers from all sections of the country unwittingly have had experience with this ordinance. Many have quietly left on being notified of the law.

The representative of one firm refused to pay the license and after submitting to arrest attacked the constabulary of the ordinance. He was tried, found guilty, sentenced to six months in the county jail and fined \$20.

The judge in pronouncing sentence said: "This court is thoroughly in sympathy with the merchants of San Francisco in their protest against itinerant vendors who come to the city and clean up a lot of money without entailing any expense, pay no license or tax whatever and enter into competition with legitimate merchants who employ a large force of workers, pay taxes and contribute toward civic improvements."
