COPIES of the peace treaty, about which there was something of a furore in this country, were carefully guarded while in transit in France. When it came to taking copies from Versailles to Paris two trusted French soldiers, supervised by an officer, were detailed for the job.

When W. W. Ballentine was dropped from the crew of the R-3's first dirigible to fly the Atlantic, he determined to make the trip anyhow and succeeded in doing so as the world's first aerial stowaway. He and "Jazz," the R-3's kitten mascot, are great pals.

When Lieutenant-Commander A. C. Read returned to this country after winning the undying honor of being the first aviator to fly across the Atlantic he was greeted by a very much relieved and very happy woman—Mrs. Read, his wife.

By way of honoring the military leaders of the allied nations Trinity college, Oxford, England, conferred degrees of doctor of laws simultaneously upon Marshal Joffre, General Pershing and Sir Douglas Haig. The three notable leaders of armies were brought together at Oxford at the time the degrees were awarded and donned cap

and gown in accordance with time-honored custom.

Captain Roy W. Francis, U. S. A., is soon to undertake the ambitious enterprise of flying from coast to coast—from New York to San Francisco—with only one stop on the trip. The stop is planned for North Platte, Neb. The captain's plane has twin engines of 800 horsepower.

Joseph Lee, president of the War Camp Community Service, was honored recently by being awarded the distinguished service medal. Presentation of the medal was made by Major-General Clarence Edwards, commanding the northeastern department.

In order to make an inspection of working conditions in mines of the British Isles, the Prince of Wales donned regulation miners' garb and made the rounds of the underground workings armed with the customary miner's lantern.

When the late Augustus D. Julliard died he left a very unusual will in that his millions were placed in the hands of trustees to be used to promote music in any way they deem most effective. Chester A. Braman, former partner of Julliard, was named as one of the music fund trustees.

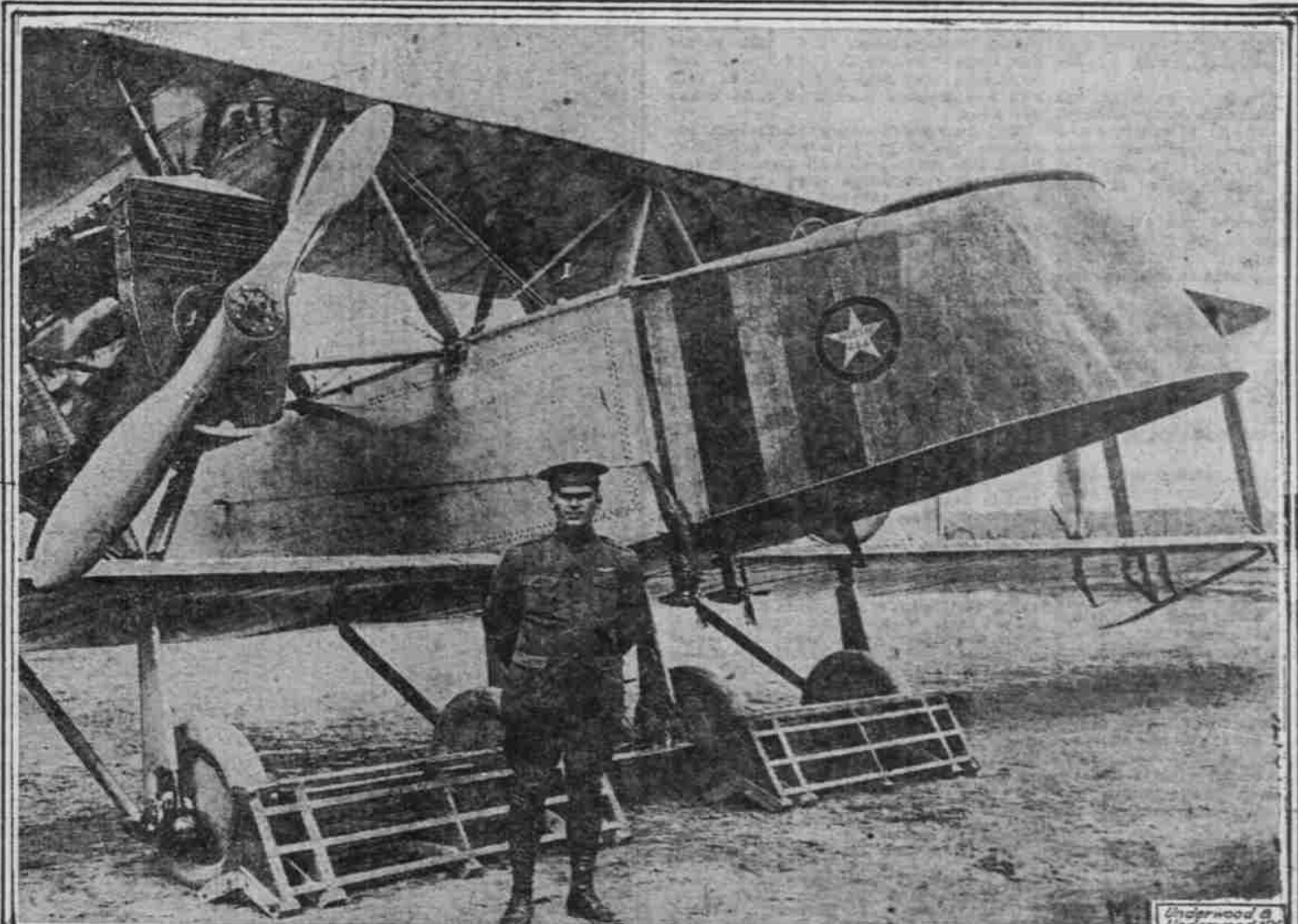

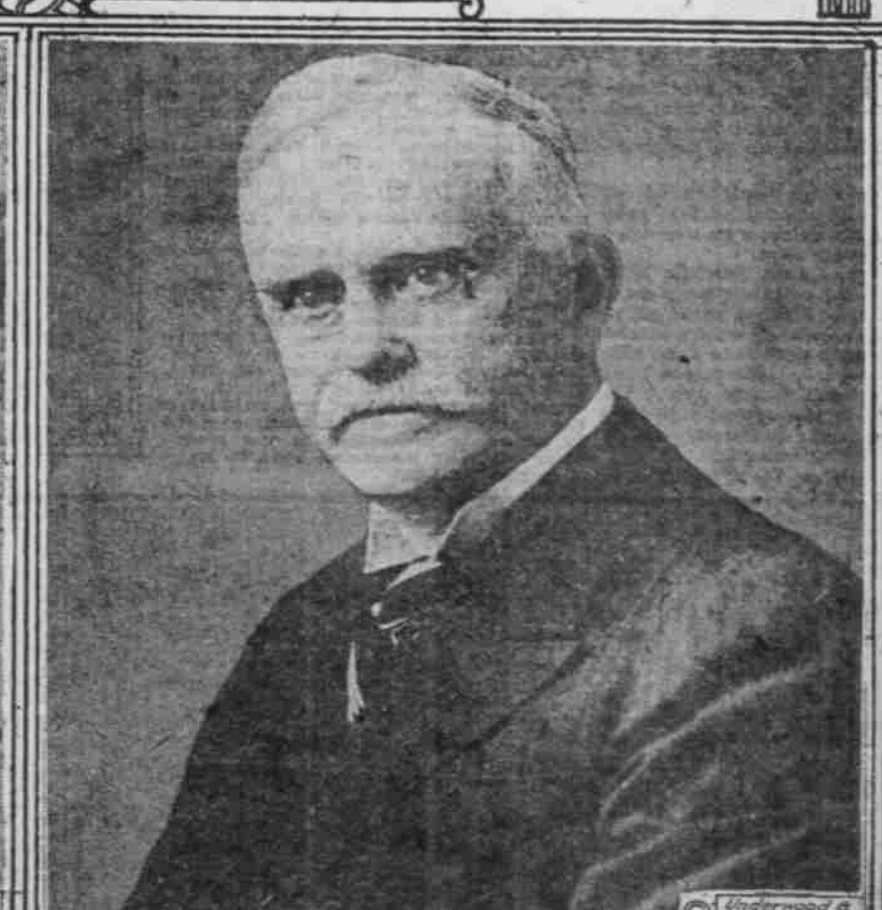
