LONGSHOREMEN TO RETURN

Grays Harbor Men to Work Pending Wage Decision. HOQUIAM, Wash., July 26.—(Special)—The longshoremen's wage walkout in Hoquiam and Aberdeen inaugurated Thursday morning will end Monday with the men returning to work, according to a statement made tonight by H. M. Delany, manager of the Grays Harbor Stevedore company. Mr. Delany said he was notified this afternoon by the longshoremen that they had resumed work with the understanding that they would be granted whatever increase had been offered upon the Puget sound and Columbia river by the national wage adjustment commission.

STRIKE FRAMEUP CHARGED

CONSPIRACY AGAINST GRAYS HARBOR SHIPPING ALLEGED. H. M. Delany Says Stevedores Refuse to Work on Emergency Fleet Steamers Only.

ABERDEEN, Wash., July 26.—(Special)—H. M. Delany, manager of the Grays Harbor Stevedore company, openly charges a conspiracy against Grays Harbor in the matter of loading emergency fleet steamers. Grays Harbor is the only port where longshoremen are striking, and the strike apparently is directed chiefly against emergency fleet steamers, he says, making little or no objection to work on other vessels. Unless the strike is ended it is likely that the harbor mills will lose the loading of 11 emergency fleet steamers which are yet to come here for cargoes, according to present plans. Of eight vessels now in port only two are working, these being the Carnell and Makawell. One steamer, the Hoquiam, upon finding a strike here, left Grays Harbor for Coos Bay to load. The emergency fleet steamers Alken and Hoxbutte at the Eureka and Blagden mills, are idle. Other idle vessels in port are the Idaho, Rhasta, Daisy and Raymond.

ITALY TO CUT RATIONS

MEAT CONSUMPTION ALREADY LESS THAN DURING WAR. Red Cross Worker Declares Food Situation is Worse Than in Any Allied Country.

ROME, July 26.—(Special cable)—In speaking today of the food situation in Italy, Senator Scaramella Manetti, president of the Home Chamber of Commerce, who has recently been appointed by the mayor as a member of the food commission to be prices, said to the World correspondent: "Italy must further reduce its food consumption, which through the war was always less per head than that of her allies. In spite of three meatless days per week, when the butcher shops are closed, there is great scarcity. We have less than half the livestock supply of 1915."

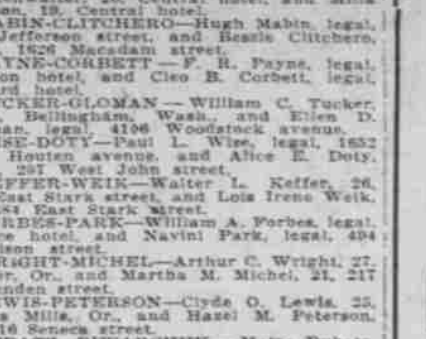
