

It is not being made here at present because there has been no demand for it, but several mills are preparing to supply us with the paper, which will be finished in our plant. The paper required for this work is the highest grade of 90 per cent sulphite. It takes the best grade of paper to stand the strain of going through the waxing process and receiving impressions in three colors."


