

JEWISH PRISONS HELD RESULT OF SAD FATE

History of People Is Filled With
Much Persecution.

RACE IS ALWAYS OUTCAST

Constant Suppression of Faithful
Held by Many to Be No
Benefit to World.

Before the world war upset all census figures it was estimated that there were more than 15,000,000 Jews in the world, 6,000,000 of them living in the ten provinces of Russian Poland and the 15 provinces called the "Pale of Settlement" in Russia proper.

Way back in Rome after the Christian era Jews and Christians flocked in great numbers. During this time of social chaos there was a cult among some of the Romans that led them to embrace Judaism, but generally the Jews were exclusive, unexpansive and contemptuous of other religions, and exhibited particular hostility toward the Christians. Followed long years of struggling and almost constant persecution. These persecutions have stimulated Jews in self-protection to maintain their exclusiveness, to continue their religious life and rigid adherence to their ceremonial, and to avoid assimilation. It increased their intense activity, their cunning in business in order that they might live at all in face of opposition, and it produced in them the traits that are now made the basis for denouncing them.

The Jews do not follow agricultural pursuits because they have long been forbidden to own land, and by this long deprivation their tastes have been formed for city life. Denied the opportunity for education, they are ignorant. It is felt by those who have interested themselves in this race's problems that it cannot be good for a country like Russian Poland and the Pale to continue 6,000,000 of its inhabitants in such a persistent condition of poverty and demoralization.

PENDLETON SEES CARMINE

SEPTEMBER ROUND-UP GETS ON
UMATILLA NERVES.

With Harvest Over Population Begins
to Consider Cowboys and
Healthy Bucking Bronchos.

PENDLETON, Or., Aug. 9.—(Special.)—Umatilla county has finished cutting its wheat and Pendleton is beginning to equine at the end of the season. The whole country is seeing red and all they can make out is "Let 'er Buck" and September 18, 19 and 20.

Those are the dates. Pendleton will be host at the tenth annual round-up and the first after-war presentation of the world's greatest frontier exhibition. Champions from former round-ups and champions from the lesser round-ups west shows are sending in their names for entry. Ed McCarty, who rode Done gone to the broncho busting championship at Cheyenne, will be here to defend his title. McCarty will bring his own roping horses and two relay strings, one for the cowboys' race and one for the cowgirls' race. Sixteen cowboys will join McCarty from the ranges near Cheyenne and be entered in the various competitions.

Charley Irwin, who is also something of a roper, has notified the round-up board that he will have a relay string of roping horses here for himself and a party of 20 cowboys and cowgirls from Cheyenne. He was last here in 1916 and is planning on making his cowboy back a big one. Entries in both the cowboys' and cowgirls' relay races will come with Irwin.

Many local boys who used their riding ability to make up troop D of the old Oregon cavalry have returned from France and Germany and are "rarin' to go." Last year at round-up time they were propelling French 75s and similar presents to the Hun in the Argonne and they say it will be lame to the speed they expect to show in competition.

Indians from the Umatilla reservation will be down in full force, many of their boys having been away last year at the front. At one of the round-ups natives had a ten-day celebration with races and bucking contests from July 13 to 13 at Cayuse and many redskins will be in there riding the cowboy-studded saddle which is put up as a prize for the world's champion broncho rider.

Pendleton is expecting the biggest crowd which ever has congregated within its limits.

PIONEER RECALLS PAST

MISSOULA WOMAN RELATES
CUSTER INCIDENT.

Mrs. E. C. Woody Crossed Plains
With Father in 1860—Party
Survived Many Perils.

MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 9.—Shortly before her death here Mrs. Elizabeth Countryman Woody, who was one of the six pioneer white women living in Missoula in June, 1870, jotted down for the members of her family some of her reminiscences of the early days. These notes have just been made public. One paragraph reads:

"My father, Horace Countryman, carried the news of Custer's massacre, riding day and night from Columbus, Mont., then Stillwater, to Helena, and that is how it was that I was born, the wires being down."

Mrs. Woody was born in Yuba county, California, in 1825. At an early age her parents returned to New York by way of the Isthmus of Panama, but in 1860 they again headed westward and crossed the plains in a cavalcade of wagons, her father serving as captain of the train. There were but five women. Of this trip Mrs. Woody wrote: "It was through the mercy of God and my father's bravery, coolness and good judgment, that we reached our destination in safety. The Indians were bad and the train passed through many narrow escapes. Frequently we saw smoldering heaps of what had been less fortunate trains than ours."

After a year in California the family moved to Washoe City, Nev., whence they went to Lakes Ridge, the present site of Reno. There were but four houses, Mrs. Woody wrote. In 1863 they left for Montana, stopping at Phillipsburg, where Mr. Countryman had preceded them, and was building a mining mill—the Hope mill—which still is standing.

Mrs. Ida B. Callahan, Chairman For Oregon Federation Meeting In October

In dealing with social problems affecting women of the world.

The hostesses for the six weeks' conference will be the social morality committee, war work council, national associations, and committees are busy arranging details of features connected with the carrying forward of so large a project.

Already nearly 30 women physicians from abroad have accepted the invitation to the conference, which will open September 15. Doctors from India, South America and Canada are also expected and three from China will come.

The general purpose is to learn the attitude toward social education on the health and sex problems together with the responsibilities related to them in the various countries and to discuss future possibilities dealing with individual, national and international problems. The program will include eminent specialists from this country and abroad and a tentative outline of the program will soon be ready for publication.

Frank Branch Riley, who is now in the east giving his lecture on "The International Northwest," will return to Portland about the middle of September. He will give his illustrated talk for the benefit of the women's building campaign of the University of Oregon. The lecture will be under the patronage of the alumni of the University of California and Stanford, and a number of prominent Californians will be among the patrons. For the many people in the city who have never heard the story of the northwest as it is presented by Mr. Riley, and seen the wonderful collection of pictures from Oregon, Washington and British Columbia, which this benefit will provide the opportunity of spending a delightful evening. The collection includes also many interesting pictures of industries such as fisheries and lumbering. The women's building campaign, which has been the popular cause of many affairs this summer, has raised approximately half of the required amount and has pledged for more than this. It is hoped that the contract for the shell of the building can be let this summer, and in the fall an effort will be made to raise the final sum, about \$40,000, which will be needed to complete the interior of the building.

Health, the psychological aspects of the sex question, and legislative measures as they affect the present status of sex morality will be the three divisions of the program intensively studied by women physicians from all parts of the world when they gather in New York in the early fall for an international conference.

The final week will be devoted to a more general discussion of these subjects of vital importance to women, and representative of all the women of the country will be invited to join the doctors. The purpose of this general conference will be to reach a common ground of understanding upon which may be based methods for co-operation.
