

IDAHO PLANS SPECIAL
LEGISLATIVE SESSIONFunds for Erection of Buildings
at Boise Deficient.

CABINET SPLIT ON ISSUE

Old Statehouse Torn Down and
Solons Are Without Meeting
Place for Emergency.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 16.—(Special).—A formal call is not likely to be issued by Governor Davis for an extra session of the legislature to prevent the issuance of deficiency warrants to raise funds for needed state buildings, but a session extraordinary may be held, that Governor Davis may propose solons in both the house and senate meet in Boise at their own expense.

When the legislature was in regular session last winter an appropriation of \$15,000 was authorized to be used for the erection of a main building at the Soldiers' Home. This edifice was destroyed by fire two years ago. Since then the war veterans' inmates have been housed at the Boise barracks. This was to be a temporary arrangement until the legislature could provide the funds to replace the building. But the high cost of materials struck Idaho after the legislature adjourned and it was found that the legislative appropriation was far short of the amount needed. When bills were called for the lowest one was \$22,000 above the amount of money the state had available. Following the first the state collected \$22,500 insurance on the building, but this went into the general fund and was not held in reserve, because it was found the law did not permit this.

Cabinet Divided on Issue.
In an attempt to solve the problem the state cabinet took up the matter. Some of the members thought the board of examiners should authorize the issuance of deficiency warrants above the amount of the legislative appropriation and sufficient to raise the necessary amount of money to erect the administration building at the home. Others thought that the legislature should be called into extra session and the appropriations secured in that manner.

A resolution was passed by the cabinet recommending that the state board of examiners authorize the issuance of deficiency warrants in such a sum as would make construction of the soldiers' home administration building possible. The board of examiners is composed of the governor, attorney-general, secretary of state and state auditor, the latter being secretary and ex-officio member. Two of these officials are members of the state cabinet. The governor is chairman. Secretary of State Jones is commissioner of law enforcement.

Solons Without Meeting Place.
Should the legislature meet here it will have no place to hold its sessions unless a private hall is rented, for in preparation for the new building the wings to the new capital building the old statehouse in which the legislature held its sessions have been torn down and the senate and house of representatives exist only in memory.

J. K. White, commissioner of public welfare, is opposed to the special session. He issued the following statement: "Fully realizing the deplorable conditions, I would be opposed to the legislature at this time. I would be opposed to making any permanent improvements until such time as a definite plan of policy has been determined upon."

Session Is Opposed.
"When my recommendations go before the next legislature, be it special or regular session, I want them to be complete in every detail and on a scope that not only will care for our present and future needs, but will be modern and permanent in every respect. With a view to economy in construction, operation and maintenance, if an extra or special session should be called now or in six months from now, I would be wholly unprepared in the first instance and only partially prepared in the latter. I am unalterably opposed to any such plan."

State Treasurer Engelson contends that the special session is necessary. "It is my opinion," he said, "that the cost of a special session of the legislature will be practically covered by the discount on the deficiency warrants together with what will be added to the bid by the successful contractor for handling the paper."

FREIGHT BUSINESS HEAVY

Coos Bay Towns Furnish Much Traffic for Southern Pacific Branch.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Aug. 16.—(Special).—The Southern Pacific Railway company is doing a heavy freight business on the Coos Bay branch and one train left this week with 26 cars. Fourteen to 20 cars is a common sight on the regular freight leaving Marshfield and North Bend, but this is only a proportion of the traffic, since there is a big business from Reedsport and Garibaldi, in Douglas county, that is moving more farther up the line toward Eugene, from lumber and shingle mills.

The traffic from this coast section is largely lumber and lumber products, including piling. Cars of stock often number six to 10 to the train. Recently a large consignment of special piling went out for Quebec.

VILLAGE THRIVES ON FINES

Union Gap Harvests \$200 Daily From Highway Speeders.

YAKIMA, Wash., Aug. 16.—Two hundred dollars a day is being harvested in \$15 fines from automobile drivers by the little village of Union Gap, three miles south of Yakima. The Inland Empire highway, paved, and the sole avenue over which traffic between this city and the lower valley must pass, is thronged with cars at all hours, and passes directly through the town.

A constable, Arthur Goins, motorcycle mounted, goes and gets 'em, and "Judge" McDonald does the rest. The town council recently fixed 12 miles an hour as the speed limit, but changed this to 15. Nearly everybody goes faster than that, and the harvest has been continuous. The regulation fine is \$15.

POST OFFICERS NOMINATED

Vancouver Branch of Legion Now Has 120 Charter Members.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 16.—(Special).—Officers and members of the executive board, to be elected at the next meeting of the Smith-Reynolds post of the American Legion, were nominated at a meeting of the post held last night and a constitution

was adopted. Thirteen names were put in nomination for the executive board, of which five will be elected. These five, together with the post commander, vice-commander, adjutant and financial officer, will constitute the board.

The officers nominated are Dale McMullen, post commander; Cedric Miller, vice-commander; Richard Yeatman, adjutant; C. K. Rice, financial officer; Louis Schaefer, historian; Harry Williams, chaplain.

About 120 men have signed the membership roll, but the organization is counting on a membership of 1000. Steps for the formation of an orchestra were taken last night.

olled in recent years. W. H. Crawford is engaged in compiling in convenient form information as to terminal and switching charges to different sections of the city in order to be able to give full information to industries seeking desirable locations.

Transportation is a first essential in large industries, for economy in obtaining raw material and cost of deliveries to the trade or to consumers are elements of the highest importance. Because of the many tariffs involved, and switching charges widely varied between different zones within the city, the problem is intricate and manufacturers have found their initial effort lost by not being fully advised. This is one function the department is trying to simplify.

Formerly there was a considerable tanning industry here, and in Sellwood is a plant that has been idle for a time, that formerly produced a great deal of leather. With a large and dependable supply of hides, this plant is one avenue that the department of industries believes merits investigation.

Shoes and leather products are manufactured here, but not in large quantities as trade demand would seem to warrant, and it is anticipated that there is room for a number of industries in this line. With all of the requisites in Oregon for supplying the raw material, and opportunities for utilizing by-products of mills and factories, the co-operation of firms engaged in these lines is being obtained with a view to greater development.

Big Factory Building Purchased.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 16.—(Special).—The Johnson Auto Signal company has purchased of L. M. Hadden, the four-story factory building located on Railroad avenue at the foot of Seventeenth street. The building which was originally built for a co-operative plant has never been used. The purchasing company will engage in the manufacture of auto signals and spotlights.

TEN COWGIRLS WILL
RIDE IN BIG ROUND-UPOld Champions and Prize
Winners Among Entries.

RUTH PARTON COMES BACK

Kitty Canutt of Colfax and Ruth
Roach of Oklahoma Two of Best-
Known Spectacular Riders.

PENDLETON, Or., Aug. 17.—Ten of the best-known cowgirls in the country will ride in the various events at the tenth annual Pendleton Round-Up September 18, 19 and 20, a glance at the long entry lists shows. Among the number are several old champions of former Round-Ups as well as prize winners at other wild west shows.

Kitty Canutt of Colfax and Ruth Roach of Oklahoma are two of the best-known and most spectacular of the girl performers who will be on the Round-Up programme. Kitty will appear with Charley Irwin to defend many titles she has won in relay and broncho riding. At the 1918 Round-Up Kitty not only piloted a broncho around the oval and broke the tape ahead of the field, but won the title for riding bronchos. She again won the relay event at the Cheyenne Frontier shows in July and is counted a favorite in that event this year here.

Array of Girl Entries Classy.

The relay field will have a classy array of girl entries, however, and Kitty will be opposed by such riders as Lorraine Udy Trickey, Donna Card and Ruth Parton. The last named is staging a comeback after several seasons' absence from the Round-Up. On her last appearance here she had her own relay string, but will ride for W. M. Parsons this year. Lorraine Trickey and McCarthy's relay entry and Donna Card and Ruth Parton are also expected to ride for Drumheller.

Prairie Rose Henderson, a new face to Pendleton audiences, is coming here this year to show the other girls how to break a broncho. She will have competition from Kitty Canutt, Louise Thompson, Bonnie McCarroll and Ruth Roach. Miss Roach won this event from Kitty Canutt at Cheyenne. Trick riding honors will be competed for by Little Miss Parsons, Ruth Roach, Eloise Hastings and Mrs. Hugh Smith. All these have appeared in Pendleton and their ability to ride a horse in any position is well known. There is keen rivalry between all the girls entered and some rare treats are promised from the fair ones as well as from the men entered.

Faster Horses to Be Entered.

To insure greater speed in the running races this year a steeper banking of turns on the Round-Up track is being made by the grounds committee. Faster horses than ever are to be entered in the races this year, stockmen have written the Round-Up board, and the elevation on the turns has been changed to guard against injury to the entries as they round the corners.

At least 100 first-class racing animals are expected this year besides the Indian ponies and common horses from the range. One hundred box stalls will be provided for horses this year. Scout cars which have made trips over the various roads leading into Pendleton from the west advise tourists from Portland and central Oregon to come here by way of Harney, the road between Echo and Pendleton is still almost impassable in places due to the soft sand and motorists will find the going better by way of The Dalles, Wasco, Olex, Ione, Heppner and Pilot Rock into Pendleton.

CHERRY CROP 1000 TONS

AVERAGE PRICE PAID 8 1/2 CENTS A POUND.

One Firm Alone Puts Up 330 Tons, 300 of Which Are in the Form of Maraschinos.

THE DALLES, Or., Aug. 16.—(Special).—The cherry crop of The Dalles and vicinity this year totaled 1000 tons according to reliable estimates secured from firms who handled the greatest crop which this section has ever produced.

Figures show that Libby, McNeill & Libby processed and canned some 520 tons of the small fruit. Three hundred tons of this total were made into maraschino cherries.

The Dalles Cherry Growers' association marketed 230 tons of cherries of 52,913 pounds. This new organization in the field, in reality a combine of cherry growers, was instrumental in securing the highest price ever paid local growers for the crop.

The P. J. Stadelman Ice & Cold Storage company handled 300 tons of cherries during the season, or 200,000 pounds. This company shipped eight cars averaging 10 tons to Chicago, one to Minneapolis and two to Calgary, Canada. The rest of the shipments were made to northwest markets.

The average price paid for cherries this year was 8 1/2 cents, giving a total of \$196,565 paid the growers the year. The average selling price was about 10 1/2 cents, totaling \$261,755 for the crop.

The bumper cherry crop this season is largely due to scientific pollenization.

City Needs Larger Pump.

LEWISTON, Idaho, Aug. 16.—(Special).—The flow of water in the Hatwai Creek springs well being sunk by the city of Lewiston to supplement the city supply of the municipality has increased beyond the capacity of the pump and the installation of a much larger pump has been necessitated.

Many Cases for Grand Jury.

PENDLETON, Or., Aug. 16.—(Special).—Between 25 and 30 cases are to be heard by the Umatilla county grand jury which will begin its sessions here September 2. Most of them are minor offenses. Several involve violations of the liquor laws.

Kelso Laundry Sold.

KELSO, Wash., Aug. 16.—(Special).—The Kelso steam laundry was sold this week by J. J. Little to George W. Jacob, a Portland business man, who has managed C. M. Golden of Portland, local manager of the laundry. Mr. Little has gone to Centralia where he is purchasing an interest in a laundry.
