GUARD TROOPS ANNOUNCED

COMPOSITION OF PERMANENT
DETAIL MADE PUBLIC.

Americans Will Occupy Choice of
Barracks Formerly Used
by Germans.

WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES IN GERMANY, Aug. 30.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Composition of the final permanent guard of American troops in Germany has just been announced. According to the terms of peace, the Americans are to have the choice of the best barracks formerly occupied by the German army. The 5th infantry, as has previously been announced, will form the main body of combat troops. A crack cavalry detachment of two troops has been organized and will be under command of Colonel J. M. Wainwright. This mounted unit will be used for the patrol of the American zone in the occupied territory and as a headquarters guard. The two companies of the 7th machine gun battalion, members of which claim the distinction of being the only American unit which ever fought in the city of Chateau-Thierry itself, will form part of the United States garrison on the Rhine. The 7th machine gun battalion was attached to the 3d division, which was instrumental in stopping along the Marne the last great German drive on Paris. The list of units in the permanent garrison as announced at the Coblenz headquarters follows:

Commanding general, Major-General Henry T. Allen, and staff; headquarters field clerks; one combined headquarters and military police company; the 5th infantry regiment; the 7th motorized machine gun battalion, two companies; one supply truck train; one mobile ordnance repair shop; the 1st field signal battalion; company A, 1st engineers; quartermaster's corps and a bakery unit; ordnance detachment; the 2d battalion, 6th field artillery, and a medical department. The forces will consist of between 7000 and 8000 officers and men.

more severe in Ireland than censored news dispatches indicated.

Michael J. Ryan of Philadelphia, another member of the Walsh commission to Paris, told the committee that Irish claims were based on the principles of President Wilson.

Time Limit Reduced.

Mr. Ryan said he had been told that only 10 minutes was allotted for final consideration of the league of nations covenant by the peace conference. Making a dramatic appeal for rejection of the treaty, Mr. Ryan declared the Irish in this country had rallied to a man to fight for the American cause in the great war.

Resuming the Irish hearing the committee was addressed by Lieutenant-Governor McDowell of Montana, who said sentiment in his state was "strongly in favor" of Irish independence and in "decided opposition" to authority to any clause in the treaty which would handicap that movement.

John Murphy, Buffalo, N. Y., said England was seeking "under the specious title of a league of nations to draw a wall of iron around the markets of the world where, by a preferential imperial tariff, the products of our factories will be handicapped in their efforts to obtain a foreign market."

World Safe for Hypocrisy?

D. C. O'Flaherty of Richmond, Va., said that "as a Virginian, as a Protestant, and as a Mason and as a democrat," he believed ratification of the treaty "would only make the world safe for hypocrisy." He presented a resolution adopted August 26 at a meet-

ing of four thousand people in Richmond expressing opposition to "any proposed league of nations which does not protect all American rights and ideals and which binds us to guarantee the territorial integrity of the British and Japanese empires."

Mr. Cockran said that conditions in Ireland were "inestimably worse than those in Cuba in 1895 and the only way they could be remedied was through intervention by the United States."

"This is not an Irish question," he said. "It is not an internal question; it is a question affecting the peace of the world."

Every great war, he declared, had grown out of the troubles in Ireland. It was the Irish unrest, he asserted, that led the kaiser to believe in 1914 that the time was ripe to strike for world dominion.

Owen Replies to Lodge.

Replying in the senate today to arguments presented by Chairman Lodge of the foreign relations committee against unreserved ratification of the peace treaty, Senator Owen, democrat, Oklahoma, declared Mr. Lodge had been blinded by partisanship and by a distrust of popular institutions.

Referring to the committee chairman's parallel between the league of nations and ill-famed holy alliance, Mr. Owen said that the argument had overlooked the intrigue and autocratic selfishness which surrounded the alliance. "The fact that was followed the treaty of the holy alliance," he continued, "was because this treaty was between military dynasties, made by monarchical autocracies, each controlled by intrigue."

"The trouble with the senator from Massachusetts is that he really believes in the rule of the few over the many. He does not believe the people ought to have the right to initiate laws they want or veto laws they do not want. He looks upon them with less confidence than he did upon the military autocracies, for the senator favored a league in 1915, when the autocracies were in full flower."

"He is not, as he thinks, waging a war against Woodrow Wilson. He is waging a war against the desires and the hopes of all mankind. Let him beware of throwing himself and his blinded partisans across the path of the righteous judgment of mankind."

WAR TROPHIES TO BE SEEN

CAPTURED ARTICLES TO BE EXHIBITED AT STATE FAIR.

Visitors to Compare Equipment Used by German and American Fighters.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 30.—(Special.)—Trophies and other enemy material captured on the battlefields of France by American soldiers will be one of the biggest features of the United States government exhibit, to be shown at the state fair, which will open here September 22 for a week. The captured articles have just been brought to this country and have never been on exhibition. With them will be shown military and naval equipment of the American forces.

The character of the display is indicated by the following partial list: Light and heavy machine guns, anti-tank guns, rifles and carbines, small-arm ammunition, grenadenwerfers, trench mortars, helmets of various kinds, sabers, officers' and enlisted men's canteens, shells and cartridge cases of various sizes, trench periscopes, gas shells, smoke hand grenades, smoke pots, anti-gas alarm devices, field telephones and switchboards, signal lamps, breast reels and trench lanterns.

Visitors to the exhibit will have an opportunity to compare the German

equipment with that used by the American fighters.

One of the feature exhibits is a collection of 32 enlarged photographs, selected from 20,000 taken by army photographers in France.

The navy will exhibit two complete exhibition models of fighting ships and five small models showing the application of camouflage.
