Tallest Visitor Ever At The White House.

IT IS habitual for big men to call at the White House, as all men who have visited the executive mansion will readily affirm. R. E. Madison of Ranger, Tex., 22 years of age, measuring 6 feet and 6 inches and weighing 230 pounds, claims the distinction of being the tallest man who has called there recently.

Ohio may have two favorite sons in the list of presidential candidates, Senator Warren G. Harding, republican, and Senator Atlee Pomerene, democrat, are being discussed as possibilities by leaders of their respective parties.

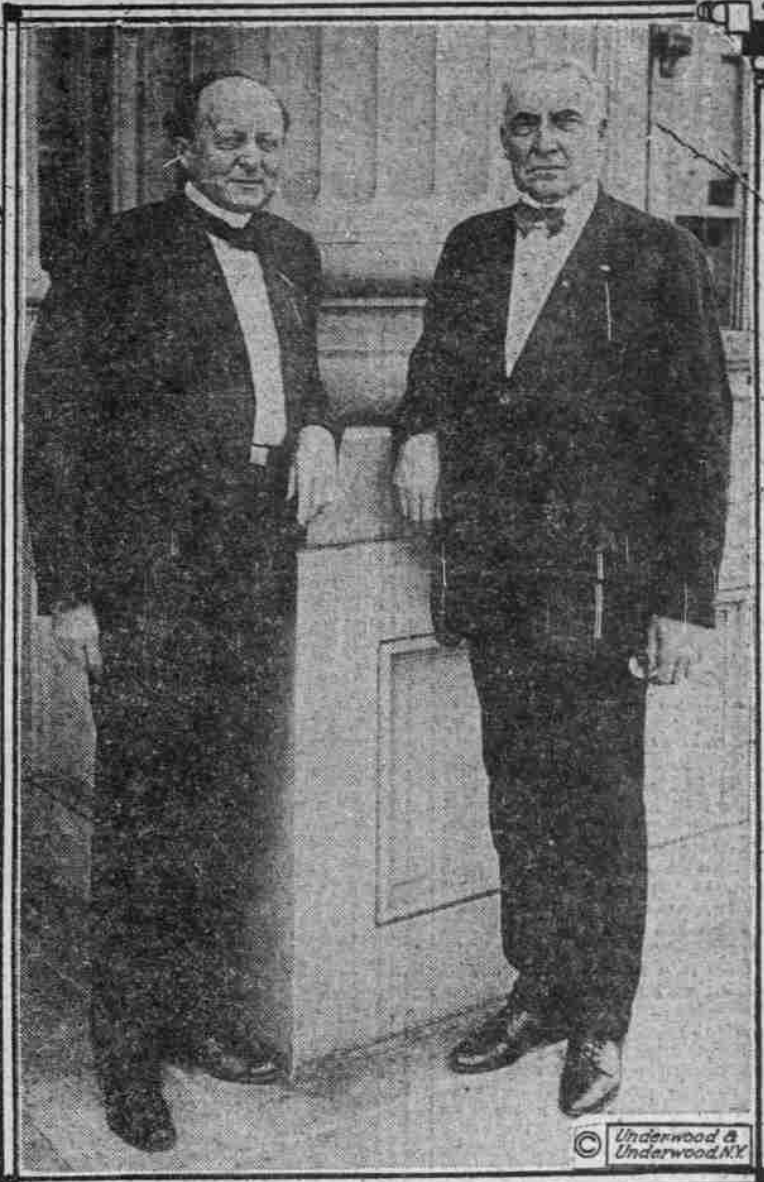

worn by those who crowded the galleries.

The super-dreadnought New Mexico, flagship of the Pacific fleet, on its journey to the new station gave the severest test of the facilities of the canal locks. At Gatun locks, in the upper west chamber, it was visited by the officials of the canal zone.

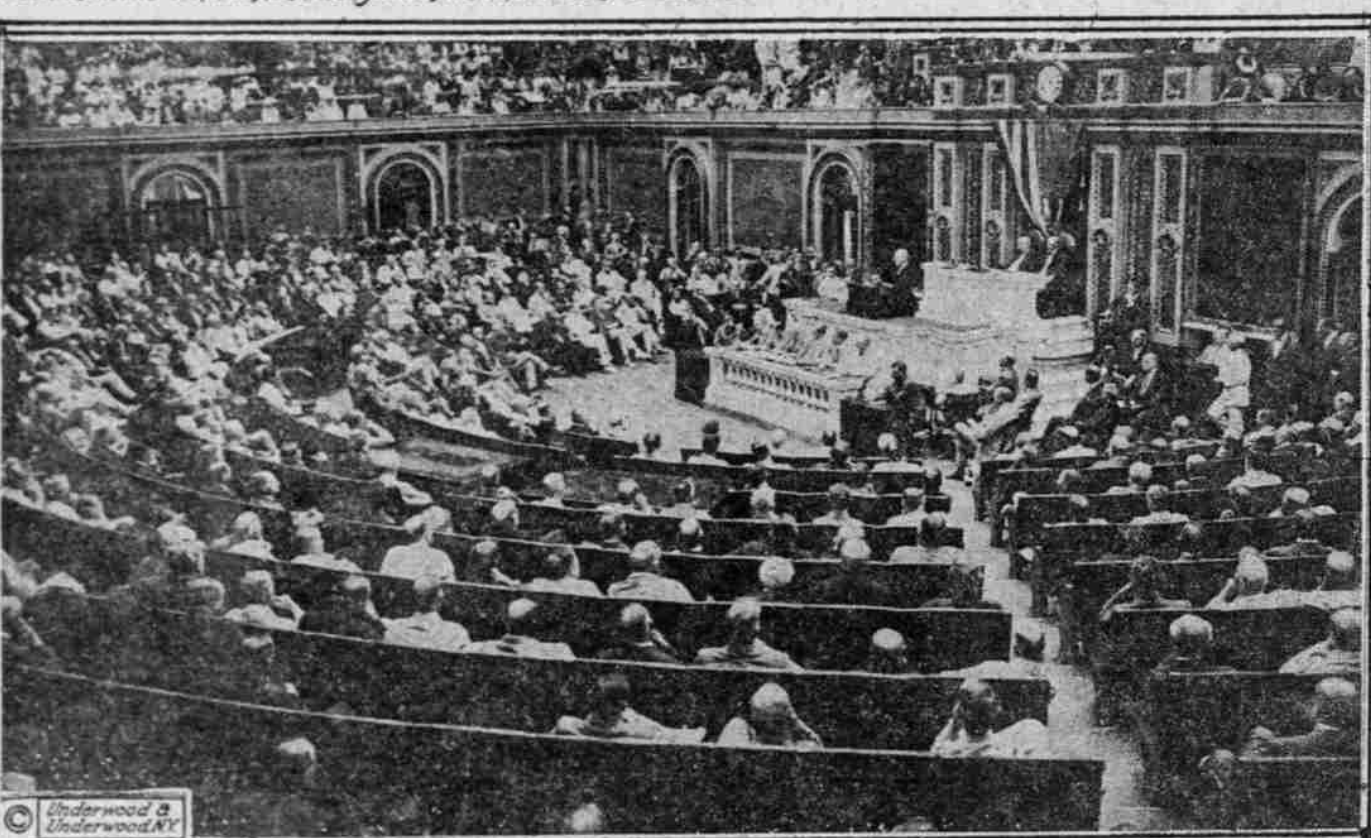

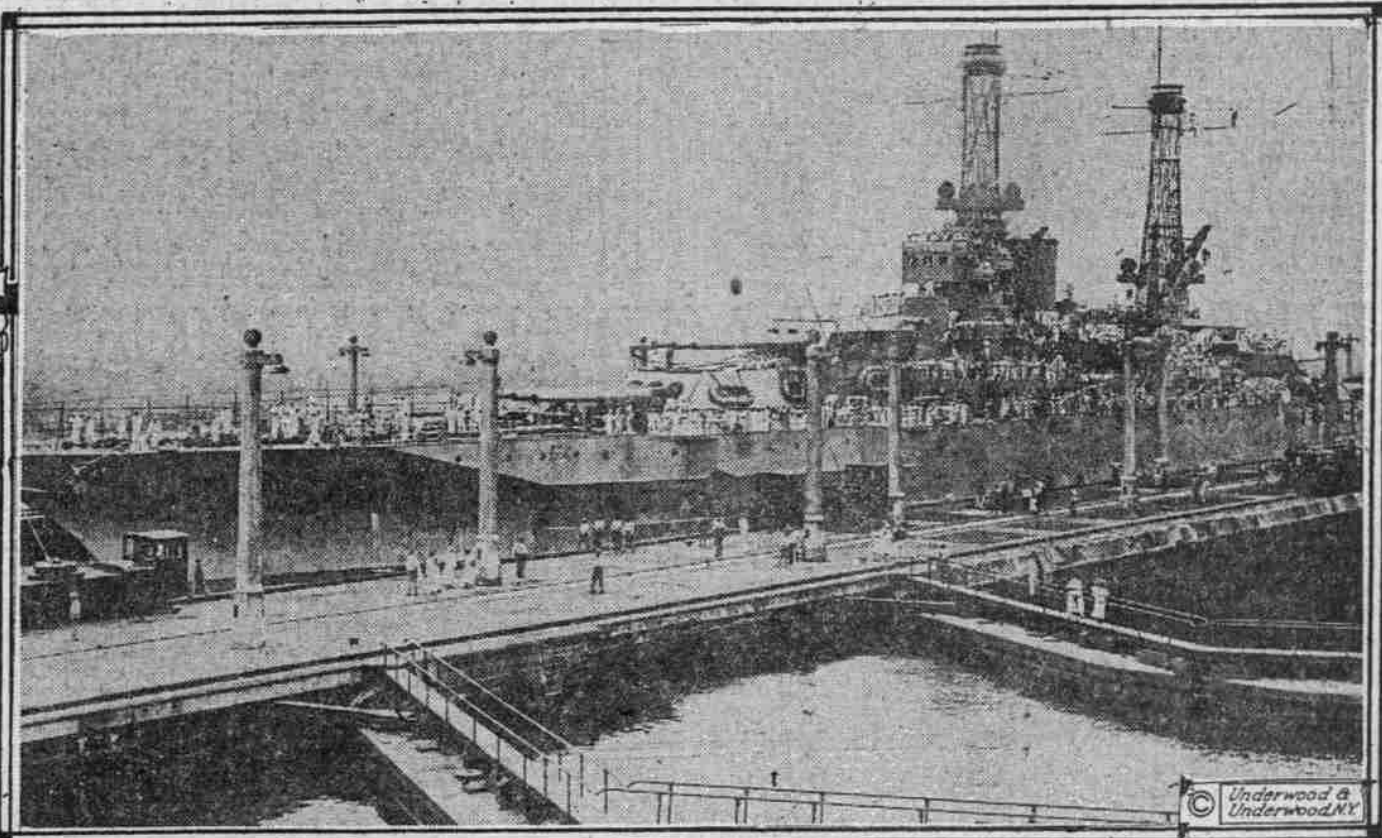
