

NORRIS SAYS WILSON HAS TWISTED FACTS

History of Shantung Deal Is Declared Garbled.

PRESIDENT IS CHALLENGED

Secret Pact, 2 Years After Japan Entered War, Held Not Needed to Gain Her as Ally.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6.—Prefacing a prepared address on the League of Nations, Senator Norris, republican of Nebraska, declared in the senate today that President Wilson's statement in his St. Louis speech to the effect that Great Britain and the other allies had promised Japan Germany's rights in China in order to get Japan into the war was "erroneous."

"The president represented our government at the peace conference," said Senator Norris, "and he knows that was presented there and what the facts are. It is a matter of history that Great Britain and the other allies did not make the secret agreement with Japan until 1917. At the time that agreement was made all of Germany's possessions in China had been captured and there was not a German ship on the Pacific coast. The president has not got his history on straight. I challenge the president to produce evidence to substantiate what he said in St. Louis."

Reflection on Conference Feared. Senator Norris said the president would not tell the facts regarding the disposition of Shantung "because it would cast some reflection on the peace conference."

"Supporters of the administration," he said, "dare not because it would incur the displeasure of their great leader," so the senator announced he himself would relate the history of the "troubled community."

In narrative form Senator Norris told the story of Shantung. Throughout his speech nations were referred to as individuals, Germany being styled "Bill Kaiser," Japan, "Mr. Jap," Great Britain, France and Italy as John Bull, Mr. French and Mr. Italian, respectively, while the United States was named Miss Columbia.

The senator's story of the sitting of the peace conference included a satirical account of the journey and methods of Miss Columbia, one who "possessed a beautiful voice and had a wonderful command of language," adding that "she surpassed by far the greatest of her sex in her ability to talk."

America Held Unjust. Senator Norris declared that China had greater cause for complaint against the United States than any of the other judges.

With the return today of Senator Kellogg, Minn., republican senators favoring "mild" reservations to the peace treaty conferred and it was decided to oppose the committee resolution of ratification.

Senators attending the conference said opposition would be based principally against the reservation on article 10 of the league of nations covenant. This committee reservation, one of the conferees said, is regarded as involving "scuttling of the whole league."

Senators attending the conference expressed confidence that with anticipated support of the democrats they would secure adoption of at least a modified reservation to article ten.

On the other hand, republican senators leading the fighting for the committee reservations said after numerous cloak room conferences that prospects for adoption of the committee resolution were brighter.

Democratic Support Expected. Republicans favoring the committee reservations said considerable democratic support was regarded as assured.

Leaders on both sides in the reservation controversy said privately that virtually the sole decisive question was over the reservation to article 10.

Republican leaders of the actions opposed to unreserved ratification of the treaty will begin a campaign of speaking in reply to the president Wednesday. Senators Johnson, Borah and McCormick will address a mass meeting in Chicago on that date, and Senator Johnson plans to speak at Indianapolis Thursday, St. Louis Friday and Kansas City Saturday. Senator Reed will deliver an address at Akron, O., Sunday, and next week Senator Wadsworth will speak at Albany, N. Y. Senator Poinsett will address at Dunkirk, N. Y., Thursday, and later will speak at Pittsburgh and New York City.

paraphrase the old but sententious remark, "He is playing both ends against the middle class. It is now the middle class that has got in the way of some of Mr. Wilson's enterprises both at home and abroad."

He has pleased labor on the one hand and placated Wall Street on the other, and he is now on the platform to induce that great big middle class to subscribe to his arbitrary personal ideas. He has satisfied labor by helping settle some wage disputes its way, and he flattered the large financial interests by taking two members of J. P. Morgan & Co. along with him to Paris to frame the financial provisions of the peace treaty to their liking.

But in dealing with these two extremes, the middle class, comprising more than three-fourths of the people, has been, as Senator John Sharp Williams said the other day, crushed between the upper and nether millstone. It is, therefore, the disposition of this middle class to stay at home and do the fall housecleaning or dig the last crop of potatoes that is causing some of the cities that Mr. Wilson is visiting to look deserted.

Wall Street Not Squirming. Tell some favoring far western admirer of Mr. Wilson that he is not popular in the east, and he will invariably answer, "Oh, yes, that is because Wall Street has made Wall Street squirm." But that is not true. Wall Street is won to Mr. Wilson. Anyone can go up in the financial district of New York and find out for himself. After he has visited some of the leading financial offices he can step a few blocks away and question the clerks, and clerks, the lawyers, the small shopkeepers and all that great class of people who cast the mass of votes. He will find them antagonistic to the administration, distrustful, suspicious.

Mr. Wilson is no more than out of Washington than all of the structure that he was supposed to have built under the treaty without amendments and reservations begins to topple. Today for the first time it can be definitely said that the treaty reservationists are in the saddle. The Wilson support in the senate for an unamended and unreserved treaty is disintegrating.

Senator Shields, democrat, of Tennessee, definitely committed himself to strong reservations by his votes in the foreign relations committee during the last few days of the consideration of the measure.

It is declared that the president now has only 27 votes that he can count upon to go straight through for his programme. On this basis he must win 37 votes. Instead of the administration having the two-thirds necessary to carry his programme, his opponents appear to have the two-thirds and a comfortable margin.

Rejection of Taft Idea Defeats. It was the beginning of the end for any victory that would save Mr. Wilson's face when he rejected the suggestions of Taft, Root and Hughes, who sought to find a way to help him out of his difficulties by clearer definitions of certain sections of the treaty and league covenant. The issue then became partisan, because it disclosed the typical Wilson attitude toward any advice not his own or from some of his own party.

But for the interest revived in the treaty fight by reason of the opening of the president's campaign, the country would have been hearing more about that conference of capital and labor, which is to be held in this city next month. It is enough to say that there will be an awakening soon, and it will come with a jar, if, as some economic students assert, the president's plan is the sovietization of all business and industry.

Two concrete recommendations which he will make to the conference are said to be "representation of labor in the board of directors of all corporations, or at least the large ones; assignment to labor of a regular share of the profits."

It may be that the president's scheme does not go so far as some declare, but as one goes deeper into the information at hand it would seem that he is looking toward some radical economic innovations.

HAZELWOOD GIRLS STRIKE

TEN EMPLOYEES QUIT; NOON LUNCH DEMANDED.

Action Due to Misunderstanding. Say Managers of Big Confectionery Establishment.

Ten girls in the candy-making department of the Hazelwood confectionery store struck yesterday, demanding that the management furnish them lunches. The girls said that practically all other employees of the Hazelwood stores are given three meals a day and they believed they were entitled to one meal at noon. A further grievance was cited in that the girls understood they would receive an advance of \$5 a month beginning in August. This increase had not materialized.

The management of the Hazelwood did not care to make a statement, other than that the action was due to misunderstanding. The lunch question, it was said, was settled some time ago when employees decided they would rather be on a salary basis. The Hazelwood employs about 400 persons.

SCHOOL GETS WHEAT LAND

Half Interest in 3500 Acres Given

Willamette University.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 6.—(Special.)—Professor George A. Alden, dean of Willamette university, who returned to Salem tonight after six weeks spent in different sections of the Pacific coast, reported the gift of a half-interest in 3500 acres of wheat land situated near Prosser, Wash., to Willamette university.

The land is said to be valued at \$75,000. Whether the money derived from the land will go into an endowment fund was not given out by Mr. Alden. Professor Alden also signed up a number of students who will enter Willamette this winter.

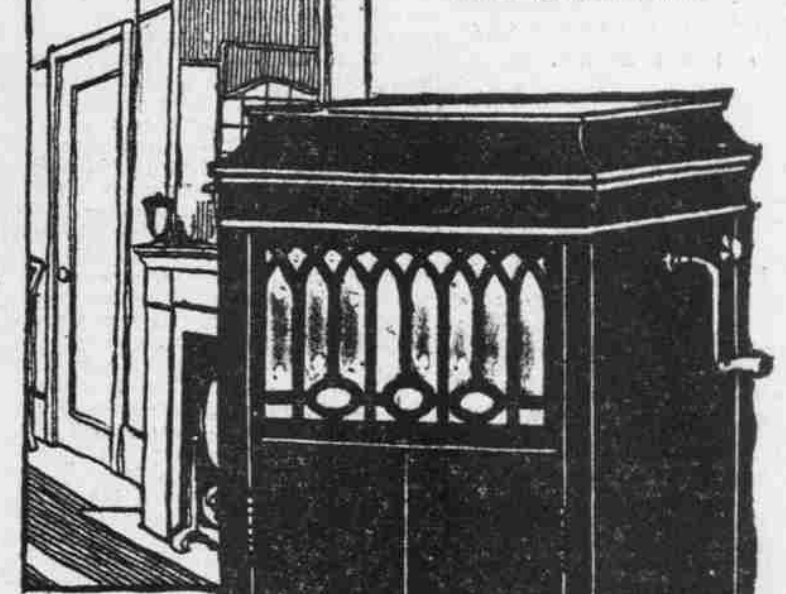
