### HOOD RIVER CITIZEN DIES

#### DIXON McDONALD PROMINENT IN CIVIC AFFAIRS.

One of First Exponents of the Columbia River Highway Held Remarkable Masonic Record.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Sept. 6.—(Special.)—Dixon McDonald, born November 28, 1858, at Stormont, Ont., who died Monday morning, and whose funeral services were held at the Riverside Congregational church Tuesday afternoon, for 29 years had taken a prominent part in Hood River civic and business affairs. Mr. McDonald had served as member of the city school board, mayor, councilman, trustee of the Congregational church, director of the Commercial club, president of the Merchants' association, president of the Hood River Game Protective association and director of the First National bank. He was always a good roads booster and was one of the first exponents of the Columbia River highway.

Mr. McDonald had a remarkable Masonic record, having been master of the local lodge and having filled the highest offices of the local chapter, Royal Arch Masons, the council of royal and select masters and the commandery of Knights Templar. His funeral was conducted by the Masonic lodge, and commandery members attended in uniform in a body.

Mr. McDonald is survived by his widow and the following children: Angus and Clifford McDonald, just mustered out of naval service; Mrs. G. L. Schetky, Misses Ellen and Barbara McDonald and Malcolm McDonald. His mother, aged 83 years, resides at Hardman. Four brothers and sisters are living: Mrs. Elwood Thompson of Oregon City, Mrs. C. O. Thompson of Medford, Mrs. Simon Overturn of Darby, Mont., and Mrs. Aaron Thompson of Spokane, Wash.; Neal McDonald of Moro, Sam McDonald of Venice, Cal., and George and John McDonald of Hardman.

All stores of the city were closed for the funeral Tuesday. Before coming to Hood River Mr. McDonald was O. W. R. and N. agent at Biggs. He was also a wheat buyer in eastern Oregon.

### U. S. TO MAKE EXHIBITS

#### OREGON STATE FAIR TO SHOW GOVERNMENT WORK.

Department of Agriculture Lists Great Variety of Subjects of Interest to Farmers.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 6.—(Special.)—The magnitude and scope of the work of the United States department of agriculture is indicated in exhibits that are to be shown for the first time at the state fair, which will open here September 22.

The exhibits are sent by the department for the primary purpose of making farmers better acquainted with its work and to show them how they can make use of the investigations work that is going on in Washington and other places.

To list everything that will be included in the department of agriculture exhibit would mean the cataloging of hundreds of items. Here are a few of the subjects to be treated:

- Bureau of animal industry—Poultry raising, meat inspection, etc. construction, dairy buildings, sheep buildings, methods of combating animal diseases.
- Bureau of plant industry—Corn production, seed corn and breeding, cereals, forage crops, fruit growing, home improvements.
- Bureau of chemistry—Plant dust explosions, farm treatment of hides, enforcement of food and drug act, destruction of adulterated foods, vegetable drying, use of flour substitutes.
- Plant relations service—Extension work with men, women, boys and girls, from the national, state, county and community standpoint; making available on the farm the facts that are developed in scientific research.
- Bureau of entomology—Destructive insects and methods of combating them; weather-proof granary; insecticides, fungicides and spraying equipment.
- Forest service—Land erosion through deforestation, woodland improvement, forest fire effects and prevention, recreation in the national forests, growing windbreaks, fence-

### SIBERIA MAIL MISSENT

#### INCORRECT ADDRESSES CAUSE SOLDIERS' LETTERS TO STRAY.

United States Postal Agent With Army in Siberia Explains Form to Be Followed.

VLADIVOSTOK, July 15.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Hundreds of letters intended for American soldiers in Siberia have gone astray because of incorrect addresses, according to S. A. Cisher, United States postal agent in Siberia, who was sent here with the American expeditionary forces to look after the mail for the doughboys. Many letters intended for Siberia were sent to Archangel when American troops were there, and many letters intended for Archangel were sent to Vladivostok.

The correct address for letters to Siberia is: Name, unit, A. E. F., Siberia, via San Francisco. Writing the unit to which the soldier belongs in the address saves at least 24 hours in delivery of mail upon reaching the A. E. F. base in Siberia. Mail addressed to units is delivered from the ship at Vladivostok.

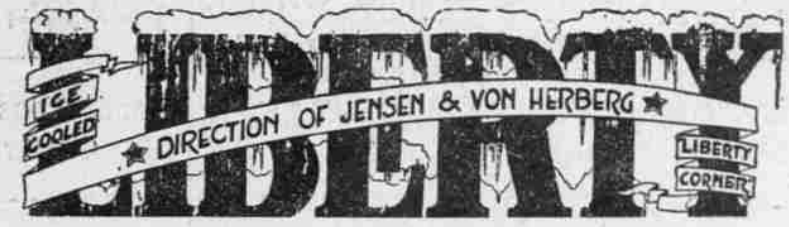
