

LANE COUNTY ORDERED TO COMPILE STATISTICS.

List of Natural Resources and Map Showing Topography of All

Districts Required.

EUGENE, Or., Sept. 20 .- (Special.)-Major William H. Emerick, of the en-gineer corps, was in Eugene from Port-land yesterday in the interest of the collection of Lane county data for the use of the war department.

The department has asked each county engineer in Oregon and presum-ably in every other state on the coast to compile statistics on the roads, bridges, weather at different seasons of the year, the matural resources of the county, the number of head of livestock, number of automobiles, number of other kind of vehicles, the amount of timber, the amount of foodstuffs raised here and information upon hundreds of other items

Included in the information required by the war department is a sectional map of the county showing in detail each body of timber, agricultural lands, swamps, rocky lands, hills, mountains, streams, lakes and other topographical features.

Percy M. Morse, Lane county en-gineer, says that to furnish all the in-formation desired would require the work of a number of men for several weeks.






