

GERMAN GUNS DRIVE LETTS OUT OF RIGA

Heavy Bombardment Enables Russians to Attack.

LONDON HOLDS IT SERIOUS

Copenhagen Reports Fighting in Petrograd and Moscow Between Bolsheviks and Enemies.

LONDON, Oct. 11.—It was stated in authoritative quarters here this afternoon that a German-Russian attack on Riga was carried out on Friday under cover of a heavy bombardment by German guns, forcing the Letts to evacuate the city.

The reports of capture of Riga is regarded most seriously by military experts here. They say that between these German-Russian troops and Petrograd there is no force that would stop an advance upon that city.

It was learned that well-informed circles in London accepted the capture of Riga as a fact.

It was stated that the Lettish legation that the Estonians were sending two divisions to aid the Letts against the Germans.

"New War" Holds Attention.

"Germany's new war" is featured in this morning's newspapers in connection with hostilities at Riga. The whereabouts of General von der Goltz continues to be the subject of contrary rumors, and estimates of the size of the army commanded by Colonel Ayliff-Bernhardt also show a wide divergence. It is recalled that General Count Keller, commander of a large body of soldiers in the Baltic provinces, which was recruited from German troops left in Courland by the allies at the time of the Russian revolution, formerly a general in the Russian army. He has established headquarters at Shavil, while General von der Goltz has his headquarters at Mitau.

Princess Peter Lieven, formerly of the Russian foreign office is superintending the co-ordination of the forces commanded by these two leaders, it being intended to transfer the occupation of Lithuania and Courland to a nominally Russian-Lithuanian army, composed in part of Germans from the ranks of General von der Goltz's troops. This move, it is said, led to the present hostilities.

Interest here now is largely focused in the result obtained from the note which the supreme council of the peace conference is reported to intend to send to Berlin today, demanding the withdrawal of German troops from the Baltic provinces on pain of coercive measures from the allies.

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 11.—According to a dispatch from Helsinki, Russian newspapers report that serious fighting has broken out in Petrograd between adherents and opponents of the soviet regime. The "counter-revolutionaries" have taken possession of several important buildings and government institutions, it is said.

This announcement of the outbreak of a serious revolt against the bolsheviks in Petrograd, together with the bomb attacks upon the bolshevik leaders in Moscow, the second capital, indicate serious internal opposition to the bolsheviks.

A German telegram from Mitau, says:

Fighting between Lettish and Russian troops between Mitau and Riga is continuing. None of the troops subservient to the German government is taking part.

A telegram from Königsberg, East Prussia, reads as follows:

The Russian Colonel Wirgolicz, commander of the 2d west Russian volunteer corps, has in Schaulen (Lithuania), proclaimed the part of Lithuania occupied by his troops as Russian territory. The Lithuanian troops in Schaulen have been alarmed by the Russians and the Germans co-operating with them.

SHOW RECORDS LARGEST GATE ON RECORD.

Breeders who had made consignments said that the amounts bid were better than they had expected, as the sale was a novelty in Sherman county. A number of Shorthorn cattle had been bought by farmers last spring, when they organized an interlocking system of county breeders, and this materially helped to make the sales satisfactory.

EUGENE, Or., Oct. 11.—(Special).—It remained for Miss Wanda Brown, junior at the University of Oregon from Stayton, Or., to originate something new in the line of women's activities. Together with five assistants, all girls, Miss Brown undertook a contract during the past summer to harvest a crop of 40 acres of wild evergreen blackberries on Mount McCully, near Lyons, in Linn county.

The gathering of the crop was begun September 1 and required 21 days. The entire crop was moved by auto truck, 550 pounds constituting each load. The berries had a market value of eight cents a pound. The girls maintained a camp on the property and enjoyed the outing as well as the financial returns.

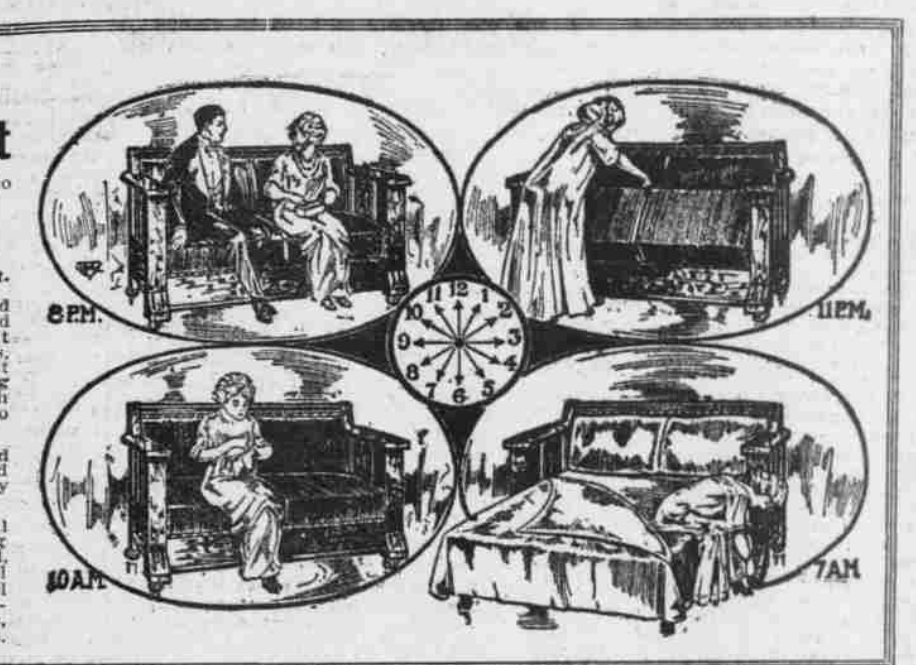
