

LABOR WINS POINT AT U. S. CONFERENCE

Right to Organize in Shop Associations Recognized.

UNITY OF ACTION SURE

Effort Made to Avoid Break Between "Right" and "Left" Factions.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—A tentative agreement on collective bargaining was reached by the general committee of the national industrial conference tonight after an all-day session.

The committee agreement was reached by taking the declaration of the public and labor groups as a basis and adding to the sentence recognizing the right of wage-earners to organize "in trade and labor" unions the words "shop and other industrial associations."

Renewing their demands that the issue of the right of workers to bargain collectively through their chosen representatives be disposed of by the national industrial conference before other matters are taken up, the labor delegates urged the committee of 15 today to report back the resolutions on this subject when the conference reconvenes Monday.

Amendments Are Submitted. The labor representatives pointed out that the resolutions already had been debated for two days and that nothing was to be gained by further postponement of a decision.

In the hope of satisfying both labor and capital on the question of how employees should be represented in negotiations with the employers, members of the public group in the committee submitted several amendments to the two resolutions today.

One proposal was that labor representatives be elected after a fair vote of the employees.

Chairman Lane conferred informally with committee members before the meeting today in an effort to bring together the extreme opinions of the "right" and "left" factions in order to avoid a break.

Unanimous Agreement Expected. Thomas L. Chadbourne, a public representative, said he was confident a declaration on collective bargaining would be agreed upon unanimously.

Charles Edward Russell, spokesman for the committee, said the various groups were getting closer together.

PARIS, Oct. 18.—The supreme council today adopted a resolution that delegates of the great powers may sit on the various commissions created under the German peace treaty and may vote on questions before these commissions, whether or not their laws enacted later by congress authorize them.

If the United States senate does not object, it is said to be probable that American delegates will take the places assigned to the United States on such commissions.

Germany is anxious to have the commission begin their work fully organized, it is declared, and is particularly desirous of American representation on them.

Signor Tittoni, the Italian foreign minister, sat in the council today for the first time since his recent return from Rome. He has been ill for the last two days.

The subject of Fiume was not taken up by the council at this meeting. An American representative declared emphatically today that the senate would not consent to participation by American representatives in the league of nations until the peace treaty had been ratified by the senate and specific laws enacted later by congress authorizing such representatives and providing for their expenses.

Opposition to premature participation of American representatives, these leaders said, is so pronounced that a new reservation declaring that the appointment of American delegates shall await legislation by congress, is under consideration.

Today's reports from Paris regarding the American representatives brought vigorous private criticism from the republican side of the senate and this was expected to be renewed later on the Senate floor. They declared appointment of American delegates before the senate acted on the treaty would be an affront to the senate and another usurpation of power by the executive branch of the government.

Administration senate leaders, on the other hand, declared the president had full power to appoint American representatives on commissions, although they expressed doubt that he would do so if the senate made formal objection.

Any attempt to put the senate on record as opposing such a step would be certain to fail, they predicted, citing in support of their prediction the defeat of the Fall amendment to the peace treaty proposing elimination of the United States from representation on these commissions.
