

THOUSANDS TO BE HOUSED AT REUNION

Homecoming Problem Tackled by University Students.

O. A. C. TO SEND 2000

Big Game Will Be Principal Event of Day, but There Will Be Something Doing Every Minute.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 25.—(Special.)—Plans for feeding, housing and entertaining at least 1500 former students and alumni of the University of Oregon Homecoming week-end, November 14 and 15, are now being completed by the large student committee which is in charge of all arrangements. In addition to the alumni about 2000 students are expected from Oregon Agricultural college, although this figure can be only an estimate, and many who are not Oregon's students from all parts of the state.

They are being attracted principally by the annual game with O. A. C. which will be the first game to be played on Oregon's new turf field which is so constructed that rain or shine it will be the very best of fields for the contest. The grandstand which will seat 4000 is almost completed as are the bleachers which will accommodate 2500. Reservations of seats are being made now through Marion McClain, graduate manager.

Gymnas To Be Dining Halls.
So large a crowd is expected for the Homecoming luncheon on Saturday noon that both the indoor and outdoor men's gymnasiums will be used. In this way the 4000 or more who will attend the luncheon will be well cared for. A large committee of members of the women's league under the leadership of Jennette Moss of Grants Pass is planning the luncheon. The booths will be presided over by girls from the various classes. The luncheon is free to everyone on the campus.

The fun will begin Friday with an old-time pre-war parade through the downtown streets with Charles ("Slim") Crandall, veteran yell-leader, keeping the crowd pepped up. Everyone will then gather on Kincaid field where the freshmen will light the largest bonfire ever known to blaze there. They are already forming plans for gathering their supplies and days before will start building the huge pile.

Governor Olcott has been asked to be one of the speakers. Others who have been asked to speak are President P. L. Campbell, Shy Huntington, Bill Hayward, Professor H. W. Howe, Charles Robinson of Astoria, champion yell leader of several years ago, Walter Winslow of Salem and other prominent alumni.

Stunts Also Planned.
Between the speeches the ten men's organizations on the campus will present short four-minute stunts in competition for a trophy, probably a cup. All buildings on the campus will be open Saturday morning for inspection and students will act as guides for the guests who wish to see the classrooms, museums, laboratories and library.

All alumni will be met at the depots where they will register. The Y. M. C. A. but on the campus will be used as headquarters and there will be kept the list of rooms for those who have not provided for them previously. The people of Eugene are co-operating with the students in their effort to get rooms for all the guests.

The Homecoming dance for which all alumni and former students will be special guests will be given in the armory Saturday night. The dance will be informal.

Special trains will probably be arranged to come from Portland and eastern Oregon and remain in Eugene a day or two.

CHURCH DRIVE IS PLANNED

Congregationalists to Raise \$50,000,000 in Five Years.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Oct. 25.—The national council of the Congregational church, in biennial convention here, voted today to raise \$50,000,000 in the next five years for church work. Of this sum, \$30,000,000 will represent a national denominational budget and \$20,000,000 will be devoted to Congregational educational institutions.

A commission on the status of the ministry was elected, with instructions to include in its work an investigation of ministers' salaries. Rev. Robert C. Hering and Frank V. Morse of New York were elected respectively general secretary and treasurer of the national council.

DEATH NOTICE PREMATURE

Count Terachi, Japanese Field Marshal, Still Living.

TOKIO, Oct. 21.—(By the Associated Press, Delayed.)—Field Marshal Count Terachi, former premier of Japan, whose death was reported here yesterday, is still alive, his physicians announced today. When the aged diplomat sank into a coma yesterday his physicians believed that death had overtaken him and news of his demise was given to the world. Camphor injections given the count as a precautionary measure restored consciousness and today he was able to partake of milk and ice cream.

Count Terachi's death had been officially pronounced and posthumous honors had been bestowed upon him by the imperial court.

Toledo to Pass Election.

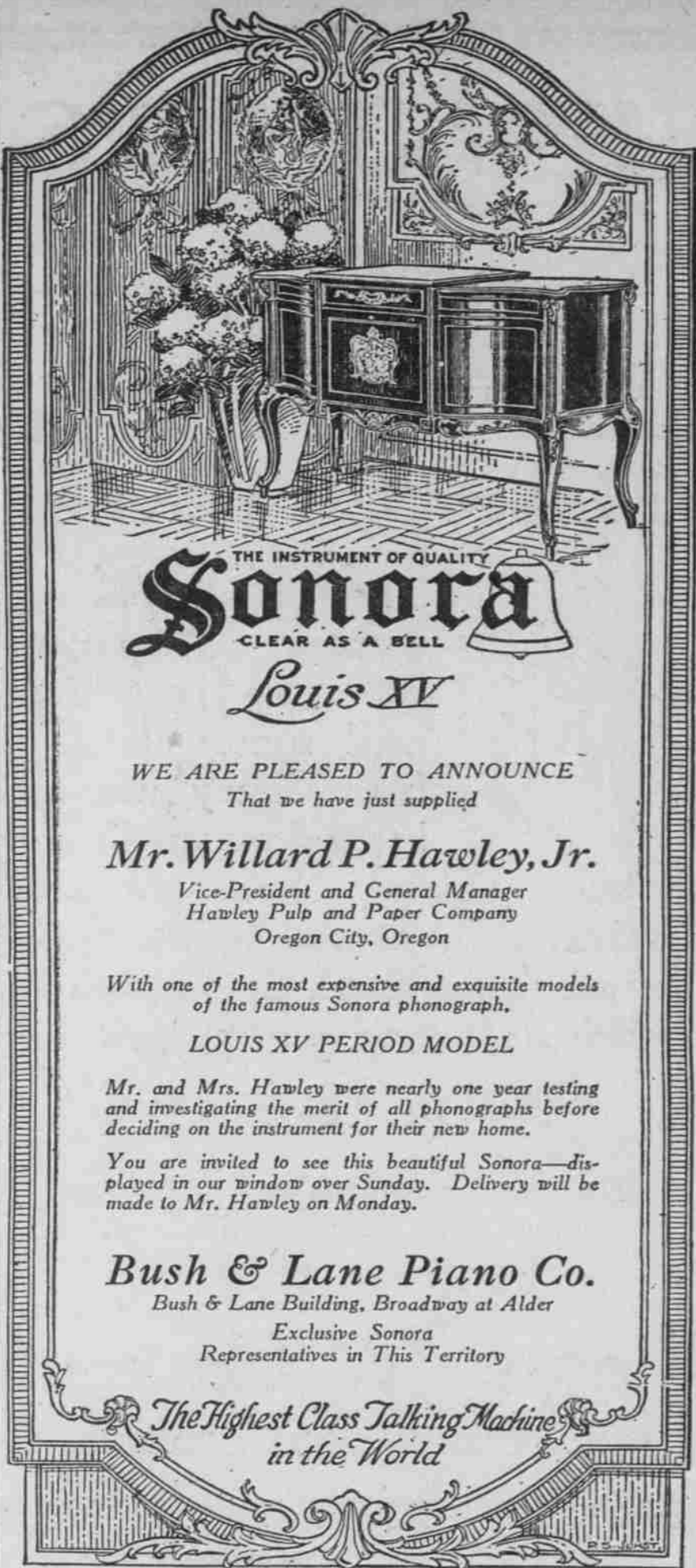

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ROBBERS ELUDE POLICE

SEARCH FOR MEN WHO HELD UP CAR BARNS FRUITLESS.

Officers Believe That Operations by Same Gang Will Be Tried in City in Next Few Days.

Although the entire police department was on the alert in the effort to capture the holdup men who robbed the office at the Piedmont car barns Friday night and made their escape amid a fusillade of shots, and ever possible clue was run down, the search yesterday was without results.

S. Roboeker, a shipyard worker, was arrested as he was entering his small shack at East Fifth and Hawthorne early yesterday morning by Patrolman Chase, and was held for investigation in connection with the robbery. Although Roboeker was identified by R. L. Filley, teller at the car barn, as one of the robbers, the man was able to prove an alibi. He proved satisfactorily to the police that he had been engaged in a game of cards in the north end until after 10 o'clock. As a consequence Roboeker was only held on an after-hours charge.

That the men robbing the car barns and those robbing the Little Jewelry store in the Heilig building are the same is the belief of the police, who are anticipating other operations by this same gang within the next few days.

The search for the three men in the vicinity of the place of their disappearance following the overturning of their auto was continued until midnight Friday following the holdup. The search was assisted by the two bloodhounds.

Blood marks on the automobile and upon coats left with the machine indicated that one of the men at least was injured when the car turned over. Two revolvers were left when the men deserted the overturned machine.

In an effort to put an end to the crime wave which has been sweeping the city, Mayor Baker announced yesterday that the streets of the city would be patrolled by officers in automobiles in constant touch with the police station.

Wintock Veteran Home.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Oct. 25.—(Special.)—Clyde Leathers, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Z. Leathers, returned to his home in Wintock this week after service overseas with the 14th transportation division. The soldier returned to the United States a few weeks ago on the same steamer that brought King Albert and Queen Elisabeth to this country. He received his discharge in San Francisco.
