

STRIKE PREVENTION URGED ON SENATE

Committee Reports on Steel Walkout Investigation.

RADICAL BACKING FOUND

Foreign Element Large—Working Hours Too Long—Federal Mediation Is Recommended.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Characterizing all strikes as "industrial barbarism" and declaring that there is no place in this country either for industrial despotism or labor despotism, the senate committee which investigated the steel strike today presented its report. The committee's main conclusion was expressed in the statement that "the public has a right to demand that capital shall not arrogate to itself the right to determine in its own way those industrial questions, and it is the same as to labor, and the duty is upon congress to provide some way of adjusting these difficulties."

As a permanent preventive of strikes, which the committee concedes, "are apparently the only way for labor to secure even its just demand if employers refuse to grant them," it is recommended that congress authorize the establishment of some such mediation agency with well defined powers as the recently dissolved war labor board.

"This board would have the power of compulsory investigation," the report adds, "but the extent of compulsory arbitration. A just decision of the board would be endorsed by the public. There is good sense enough in the American people to bring about an adjustment of these difficulties." The report was signed by Senator Kenyon of Iowa, chairman, and Senators Sterling, South Dakota; Phipps, Colorado, republicans, and Mc-Kellar, Tennessee, and Walsh, Massachusetts, democrats.

Eight-hour Day Favored.

With the system of working hours in the steel industry, the committee disagreed strongly, saying:

"An eight-hour day with a living wage that will enable men to support their families and bring up their children according to the standards of American life ought to be a cardinal part of our industrial policy, and the sooner the principle is recognized the better it will be for the entire country."

The report also dealt with the efforts of strike leaders to get Judge E. H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel corporation, into a conference, far enough to point out that committee members felt sympathy with the principle of collective bargaining, but did not believe the steel strikers had taken the right course. The representative of Iowa, chairman, said that he believed those who believe in the principles of American government.

Home State Loyalty.

"In the home state of every other candidate," Wood, so far as the preference of the members of the house is concerned, is second choice.

Senator Knute Nelson of Minnesota declared today that he is not a candidate and that the only reason he is not is that he is not a citizen of the United States.

"In Illinois, with Lowden as the favorite son, Senators Sherman and McCormick were counted as expressing a preference for him. Likewise in Indiana not only Watson but New are classified as for the former.

"To designate closely the preference of states or small groups of states would reveal the identity of the senators with the exception of Theodore Roosevelt, he is the only man President Wilson kept out of war."

Soldiers' Support Claimed.

"That 90 per cent of the soldiers who participated in the war are friendly to him, partly due to the belief that he would 'clean up the bunch' at the head of the war department and the army and partly to the fact that he is opposed to a big standing army."

"That he would fulfill the tradition of the republican party in elevating to the presidency men of patriotic military experience, as exemplified in Lincoln, Grant, Hayes, Garfield, Arthur, Harrison, McKinley and Roosevelt."

Ballot of 522 Indicated.

"If the states where the majority of the members of congress who expressed the conviction of the war possible more sentiment in their respective districts and states for General Wood than for any other candidate vote the same way in the republican national convention, Wood will receive 522 votes on the first ballot, not counting any of the states of the south which have no republican representative."

At any rate, in the 18 years that I have been taking this poll it has never so far failed to indicate the nominee. While members of congress do not control the delegates from their respective districts, they do with accuracy reflect the sentiment of the country.

Foreign Proportion Large.

Touching on the subject of radicalism in the strike the report said:

"The committee is of the opinion that the American Federation of Labor has made a serious mistake and has lost much favorable public opinion by permitting the leadership of this strike movement to be in the hands of some who have heretofore entertained the most radical and dangerous doctrines."

"Such men," said the report, alluding to Foster and Margolis, "are dangerous to the country and they are dangerous to the cause of union labor. It is unfair for men who may be struggling for their rights to be represented by such leaders. If Mr. Foster has the real interest of the laboring man at heart he should remove himself from any leadership. If he will not remove himself from leadership the American Federation of Labor should purge itself of such leadership, in order to sustain the confidence the country has had in it under leadership of Mr. Gompers."

"New England is almost unanimous for Wood if the views of its representatives in congress are evidence. It was in New Hampshire that he was born, over a grocery store in it was in Massachusetts that he attended Har-

vard college, of which he is now an overseer, and it was there that he cast his first vote.

Roosevelt Association Helps.

"Of the Massachusetts members of the house the vote for Wood, one is for Lowden, one is for Taft and one non-committal. So that the identity of the members may not be divulged, the vote of Connecticut, Rhode Island, Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont is here given en bloc. Eleven representatives voted for Wood, two for Lowden, one for Harding and one was non-committal.

"Partly due to the Plattsburg movement for the national defense and partly to the association of his name with that of Theodore Roosevelt, Wood has a great preponderance of favorable opinion in the New York delegation. Fifteen expressed a preference for him, one is for Lowden, one for Wilson, one for Taft, two for Pershing and three non-committal.

Pennsylvania Support Strong.

"In Pennsylvania is an even more overwhelming sentiment for Wood. Nineteen members of the house from that state are firm in their conviction that he is the one man to select. Lowden has one supporter there, Harding has one, Senator Knox has one, Governor Spruill has one and one was non-committal.

West Is for General.


"The states of New Jersey, Maryland and Delaware line up with ten for Wood and one for Harding.

"Ten of the Michigan members are for Wood, one is for Harding and one was non-committal.

"Harding has nine votes in Ohio, with four for Wood and one non-committal. Five members of the house for Watson and one is for Lowden. In Wisconsin sentiment is mostly for Lowden. Five members of the house expressed a preference for him, while three voted for Wood and one was non-committal. Iowa is overwhelmingly for Lowden, who attended the state university there. Nine are for Lowden, one is for Wood and one is for Harding.
