The Oregon plan for vocational training, as outlined by Mr. Van Dalsem, is essentially a means of insuring the placing of the work on a practical basis, and through the home-project proposal is placed on a basis which is productive agriculturally as well as educationally.

"Some schools where the pupils come mostly from the farm desire to relate their manual training more closely to the needs of farm life," says Mr. Van Dalsem. "In small schools it may be possible to turn the school shop into a laboratory for farm shop work and farm mechanics and have one teacher handle both shop work and agricultural instruction. In large schools there is usually co-operation between the teaching of manual training and agriculture.

"Departments of vocational agriculture form an excellent medium for the school to extend its service into the community. As the instructors are employed for 12 months and serves as supervisors of home work they



The girl is a tomboy and heartily dislikes housework, so she will be given an opportunity to work outside of the home. Several family
