

THREE WOUNDS SURVIVED

Syrian, Shot by Mexican Bandits, Makes Remarkable Recovery.

NOGALES, ARIZ., Dec. 27.—One of he most remarkable cases handled by the local surgeons in recent years is that of Pedro Jamit, a Syrian mer-chant of Tuxpan, Nayarit, Mexico. A bullet that had been lodged in Jamit's builet that had been lodged in Jamit's back for several months was removed recently at a hospital here. Jamit was held up and robbed of \$1800 by bandits. He was shot through the head, in the hip and in the stomach. The first two bullets came out, while the one that entered the stomach was the one removed by the surgeons.

After being wounded, Jamit was taken into the mountains by the bandits. During the 16 days that he remained there, he received no medical treatment, his wounds being washed with cold water by an aged Mexican nurse. Through the aid of a Mexican woman, the Syrian escaped and made his way to the border.
