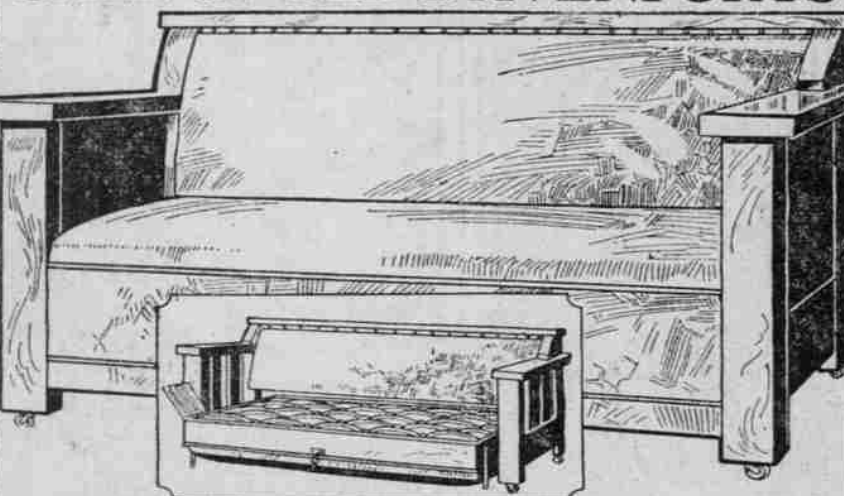

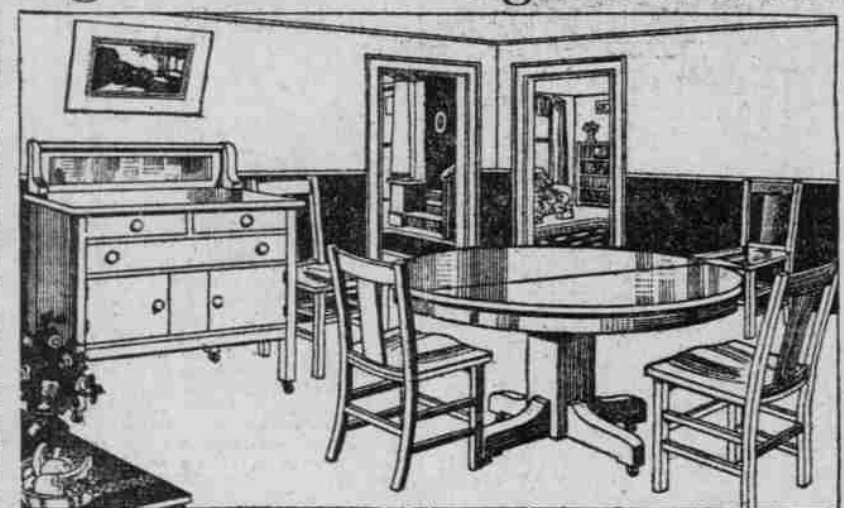

SCENE OF BIG BOUT

Carpentier Manager Names Labor Day as Time.

WORD COMES FROM SPAIN

Descamps Announces New Plans After Frenchman Knocks Out McClaskey at Bordeaux.

BORDEAUX, Jan. 10.—George Carpentier knocked out "Blink" McClaskey at the beginning of the second round of their fight tonight.

At the conclusion of the fight, M. LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 10.—Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion, apprised by the Associated Press tonight of the statement of Mr. Descamps, Georges Carpentier's manager, that the Dempsey-Carpentier fight would take place in New Jersey on Labor day, said he knew nothing of any arrangements or even any proposal to that effect, but admitted that Jack Kearns, his manager, might be able to throw light on the matter.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Jan. 10.—James Wood Coffroth, boxing promoter, who has been proceeding on the theory that his offer of \$400,000 for a world's championship fight at Tijuana, Mexico, between Georges Carpentier and Jack Dempsey would be accepted, said tonight that he was at a loss to explain what was meant by the latest announcement of M. Descamps, Carpentier's manager.

Coffroth made the following statement: "In regard to the statement of Carpentier's manager, issued from the ring after the Frenchman's victory of tonight, I will say that when men work on a purse proposition instead of a percentage of the gate receipts we do not take it that they should be concerned in the battleground."

However, things may come around to that effect, but I have his wish granted, although I always will adhere to my belief that Tijuana must have first call if it promotes the fight. The same line of thought applies as regards the date of September 6. The date is a matter of mutual agreement between all parties and either July 4 or September 6, which is Labor day, is immaterial to me.

Jack Kearns, manager of Dempsey, went today to Tijuana and inspected the proposed site. He expressed the hope that the fight would be held at Tijuana and that Coffroth would promote it.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—Charles E. Cochran, the English fight promoter, tonight denied the assertion of M. Descamps, manager of Georges Carpentier, the French heavyweight champion, that Cochran's agreement with Carpentier would expire on January 15 if he was unable to obtain the signature of Jack Dempsey by that date.

Cochran declared he doubted that Descamps made such a statement and announced he had sent a cable message today asking him to deny it. "I have made the first payment under the contract due on or before February 15, and I shall make further payments as they become due," the message said. "I hold you to your contract, and you have no right to enter into other negotiations."

Cochran said the next payment under the provisions of the agreement was not due until June 1. He added that "M. Descamps and Carpentier were both delighted with the terms of the contract at the time they signed it."

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Jan. 10.—Following lengthy conferences yesterday afternoon and last night between Jack Kearns, manager for Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion pugilist of the world, and James Coffroth, fight promoter, Kearns and Coffroth went this morning to Tijuana to look over the proposed site for the fight between Dempsey and Carpentier.

Details Are Delayed.
One development of yesterday's conference was that nothing further toward completing the details of the proposed heavyweight contest can be done until Carpentier and his manager have made the first payment under the contract due on or before February 15, and I shall make further payments as they become due, the message said.

SAN FRANCISCO FANS TO SEE
TEN-ROUND MIX AT PRESIDIO

Jimmy Darcy and Battling Ortega Will Clash in Fight—Not Allowed Under Civil Laws but Exempt When Held on Government Property.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 10.—(Special.)—For the first time in many years—not counting an attempt of the same sort at Fort McDowell, California fight fans will have an opportunity of watching boxers go more than the four rounds to which we have been accustomed. On Monday night in the Oregon building, now equipped to seat 4200 people, under the auspices of the Presidio service club, Jimmy Darcy of Portland and Battling Ortega of Oakland will box 10 rounds. In addition, there will be three six-round matches, or a total of 28 rounds of action.

As was explained last week, a ten-round fight is made possible by virtue of the fact that the matches will be subject to the laws of the state of California. If the first show goes through with a bang, it is the plan to stage a fight card every two weeks on Monday night. Naturally the four-round promoters are looking askance at the new project, for they realize that 10-round fights will tend to make the four-round affairs look a trifle flat.

But everyone is waiting the outcome of the fight between Darcy and Ortega, which is being held at the Oregon building to see how matters go. After that there will be ample opportunity to do some talking.

Harry Wills, as popular for a time as was a negro fighter in San Francisco, is not making a foolish offer. While we are far from the center of population of the United States, California is a good sporting community and there will be thousands from around the northern part of the state who will motor to Tijuana.

An international fight over 45 rounds—which means to a finish—will be a strong attraction. Then, too, it is the kind of trip that eastern people will be glad to make. Of course Coffroth is figuring not only on a profit out of the fight, but on advertising his race track as well. It will be a big boost for the Tijuana course, which is the only one open for the long-postponed meeting on January 24.

The promoter is certainly playing in hard luck. He had a good house and a good crowd right up to the main event. It would have gone far toward establishing the Coliseum as a fight location. But it's not the first time that the promoter has been in hot water of the same sort.

There is an eastern trip in prospect for Jimmy Duffy. Tommy Simpson has had some inquiries from eastern fight clubs who would like to use the Oakland lightweight and he has received a promise of a trip in the near future.

Roche is one of the greatest little gymnasium performers there is in these parts, but when it comes to actual ring work he has never been better.

MORTON FARREN GO
MAY BE HUNDRED

"Puggy" Claims Draw With Chicago Charley White.

"Puggy" Morton, the Los Angeles lightweight, who will meet Frankie Farren of San Francisco in the ten-round semi-windup of the Portland boxing commission show at the Hellig theater, Wednesday night, claims to have given a draw with Charley White to his credit, which was fought while he was in the east recently. If Morton could hold White to a ten-round draw he must be a worthy battler and can be depended upon to give the rugged San Francisco boxer a hard mill. Morton has beaten such men as Chlie Taft, the Canadian lightweight champion and other good fighters in the east and middle west. Morton gave Harry Schuman one of the toughest fights of his career in Tacoma recently and his policies off Farren is eager to meet the best of them.

Farren is a mighty hard boxer to beat at any time and is exceptionally dangerous because of his punch. The Portland fans will find him quite a few pounds heavier than his last appearance here, when he was beaten by Muff Bronson. At that time Farren scaled only about 135 pounds at the most when in the best of condition, but it is now said he will hit with a force of 150 pounds when in the pink. The added weight gives Farren more power and Morton will receive the acid test from the hard-hitting Sam Rocks city mill winder.

Farren does not win all of his fights but always lets his opponent know that they have been in a battle. Johnny McCarthy, the San Francisco welterweight, who has met Alex Trambilas in the main event, spent two hours in the gymnasium yesterday running up his five-round bout against the clever Rumanian. Trambilas figures that his speed will carry him to victory over the rugged Harp. If he can evade McCarthy's terrific wallop he may be able to register a win, but if Johnny should be able to land his crushing blows Alex will have to be prepared to stand an awful shock. One thing seems certain and that is both principals will be in the best of shape for the mill.

Two six-round bouts and a four-round curtain-raiser will complete Wednesday night's bill at the Hellig. Jimmy Dundee of Oakland will meet a six-round clash against Weldon Wing. Frankie Denny of Oakland will battle Sammy Peisenger, while Seattle Jimmy Duffy will tangle four rounds with Bud Stevens of Portland.

The advance seat sale will open tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock at the Hellig theater box office, which will be the only place the fans will be able to purchase tickets in advance.

Two of the best boys in the east who are under the direction of Mike Collins, the famous St. Paul boxing manager and promoter, are eager to invade the city and are going to meet Noye, St. Paul lightweight, and Mike Erle, bantamweight, who is a brother of Johnny Erle, former bantamweight champion of the world.

Noye has fought many of the best 125-pounders in the country and recently won in three rounds on a foul in Denver from Lew Tandler, the sensational Philadelphia lightweight, who is touted as the only man in the world today with a good chance to defeat Benny Leonard.

Erle, who is said to be like to see some boys the caliber of Noye. His ability is not an unknown quality, as the St. Paul manager has had reports of his bouts and in most cases he has been on the receiving end of the decision. It is said he is a clever boxer and a creditable boxer.

Mike Erle, Johnny's younger brother, has been coming along with leaps and bounds in the last few months, and his only real defeat was at the hands of Frankie Mason, who won a decision over him. Erle should make a good opponent for Billy Mascock.

Newspaper clippings from St. Paul reveal that Erle stopped Harry Paul in Denver in three rounds without turning a hair.

Jimmy Darcy and Battling Ortega will hook up in the main event of the ten-round show at the Hellig. The bout will be staged out at the Presidio, which is government property. According to reports from the south, the seats for the card have all been sold with the officials charging from \$1 to \$5 to witness the battle. The Darcy-Ortega bout is the only one so far between well-known boxers. Six four-round preliminaries between service men and San Francisco boxers complete the card.

Matchmaker Frank Kendall of the Milwaukee boxing commission is busy as a crank with the local boxing card for the latter part of this month. He is figuring on Roy McCormick and Tommy Gibbons in the main event.
