

HUNT CLUB STABLES BEING ORGANIZED

Horse Lovers Get Together to
Provide Better Quarters.

HOME SITE IS BEAUTIFUL

Portland Club Tract Found Desir-
ably Located and Improved.
Capital Is \$25,000.

Plans are being perfected for the immediate organization of a company composed of prominent Portland horsemen to provide needed accommodations and training facilities for their equine friends. It is to be the Hunt Club Stables, Incorporated, with \$25,000 capital, of which more than half already has been paid up.

Identified with the movement are men who have had an active part in the Portland Hunt club annual horse shows and have been participants and supporters of the various enterprises connected with the training and development of riding and driving horses and encouragement of breeding better animals for purposes of sport and utility.

The company will be composed of members of the Hunt club and citizens whose love of the horse causes them to feel an interest in the movement that has for one of its objects such increased activities as will make the future horse shows of the Pacific International Livestock association one of the most important exhibitions of the kind held annually in this country.

Prominent Men Participate.
W. V. Sanderson, president of the Portland Hunt club; Natt McDougall, Fred A. Martin, Claude D. Starr, secretary of the Hunt club; Ralph Wilbur, Ted Warrens and Julius Meier are some of the men who have become interested in the enterprise.

The Garden Home tract of the Portland Hunt club is a most attractive property, the location of which has been found desirable because it is where the country roads are easily accessible. For training purposes there is the half-mile track, with its oval enclosure that provides an excellent polo ground and steeplechase field. The stables, which are ground, with setting below the Hunt club community, attractive clubhouse and packed with the finest of the pretty spots reached by paved roads that render it easily and quickly accessible for the horse and rider.

Organizers of the Hunt Club Stables, Incorporated, plan to acquire for their development a portion of the Hunt club tract, on which the projected buildings will be erected. As tentatively planned by Joseph Jacobberger, architect, it provides for a barn 70x140 feet, double the size of the present barn of the Hunt club, which would be utilized in the new structure.

Proposed Structure Ample.
Whereas, the present barn has ten stalls and 25 standing stalls, the new structure would provide accommodations for about 100 horses, with rooms for harness, horse and carriage, and with concrete floors throughout, provisions for all sanitary conveniences and a modern ventilating system.

Adjacent to the barn is to be located a riding and driving school embracing the best ideals for indoor training work and suited to staging riding events and show affairs. Along one side of the arena will extend a gallery with seating capacity for 500 people, with standing room for 75 additional persons.

The mezzanine floor above the arena will be finished with a woman's parlor on one side, with spacious rest rooms. At the other end of the mezzanine floor will be a smoking room and lounge for members and visitors.

To encourage the breeding of horses of the best type, both riding and driving animals, is the purpose of the members of the Portland Hunt club who are to be organized.

Club name to be "Portland Hunt Club," said Fred A. Martin.

"We Can't Lose Bill," Sentiment

of Campus—Trainer to Take

Time Over Resignation.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Bill Hayward, a decision whether or not to remain with the University of Oregon athletic staff is still hanging fire, following his first conference with President Prince L. Campbell, since Hayward's return to the campus.

Evidently no decision was reached in the conference, as neither Hayward nor the president would say anything of what had been done at the meeting.

Bill has announced that he has been granted two weeks in which to think over the proposition offered him by the other college which is endeavoring to secure his services, and that he would probably take all of the allotted time to make up his mind.

Hayward, in speaking of leaving his job here, said that it was like leaving his home, and leaving his friends all behind him. He pictures the method of deciding the matter by saying that he would weigh the loss of his many Oregon friends in one hand and the increased salary that he would receive in the other, to see which was the more valuable.

"We can't lose Bill," is the way the campus feels about the matter. Student sentiment reached its highest pitch upon the occasion of the banquet tendered the team last night, when every man in school able to walk, paraded from the campus to the banquet rooms, cheering and demanding to hear from Hayward and Huntington.

LONG BEACH Buries PHOENIX

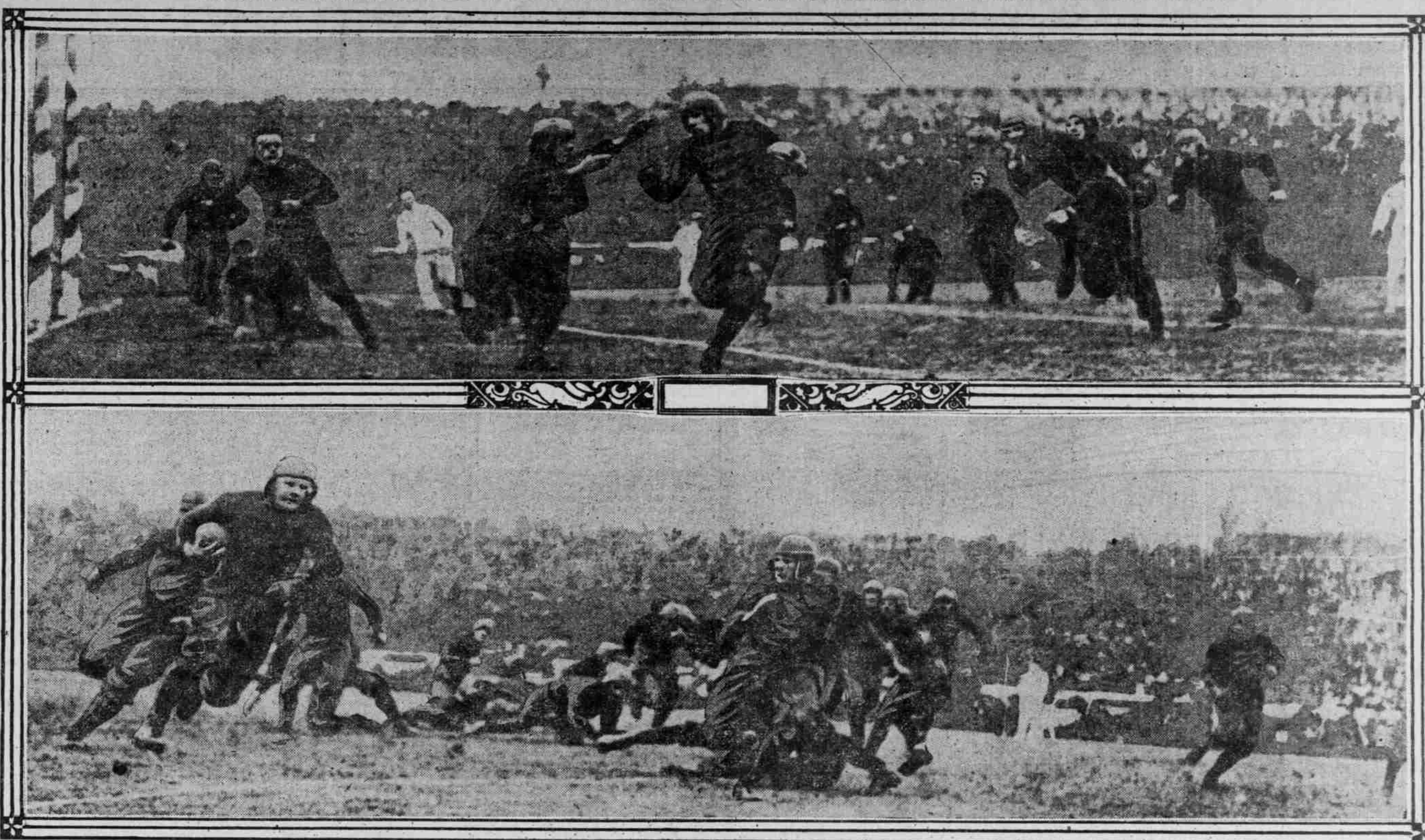
Southern California High School

BOWLING RACE TO START

SECOND TELEGRAPHIC TOURNAMENT BEGINS TODAY.

M. L. Kline Team Will Open 12-Game Series Against Portland Alley Bowlers Tuesday.

Bowling in every large city on the Pacific coast will be the alert today as it will mark the start of the second telegraphic bowling tournament of the season conducted by the Pacific Coast Bowling association with nearly 75 five-man teams striving for highest honors. The tournament will be conducted by telegraph from the Maryland alleys of Oakland, Cal.

The M. L. Kline team of Portland will be one of those entered in the affair as will be teams from Seattle, Tacoma, San Francisco, Los Angeles, San Diego, Oakland, Salt Lake, Spokane and numerous other cities. The M. L. Kline team will bowl its games this afternoon at 3 o'clock on the Oregon alleys.

Tuesday evening, January 13, at 8 o'clock the M. L. Kline team will start a 12-game series against the Portland alley team on the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club drives.

The teams will bowl three games each week until the series is completed. The first set Tuesday night will be on neutral alleys. The second and third series will be played on the Portland and Oregon alleys respectively.

The last three games making the win of the match will be rolled again on neutral alleys. The Multnomah team, Woodmen of the World, drives will be the choice. The exact date of each of the series following Tuesday night's will be announced later.

The Northwest International Bowling association will hold its ninth annual championship tournament in Seattle on the ideal alleys about the second week in April. Portland will be represented by at least four and perhaps six teams.

The United States National bank will bowl a return match with the Equitable Savings & Loan association last Saturday on the Oregon alleys. Ladd & Tilton are holding fast to second place in the Bankers' league. United States National is in the lead by four games.

In the Rose City league bowling on the Oregon alleys, Speedwell Tire is

In first place, with Victoria Shoe Shop a close second. Imperial Hotel, St. Nicholas cafeteria and Pacific Coast Electric company are all tied for third place.

In the Commercial league, the Willys Overland and Multnomah hotel teams each had a bad night by dropping three straight to Oregon alleys and Tokyo Point Oyster grille.

Acme butchers is leading the Zellenbach Paper company house league, with the Oak Bonds and Sterling Manilla tied for second place.

Teams bowling in the Swift & Co's league on the Oregon alleys are pretty evenly matched as the Produce team is only one game in the lead with Bi-Products, Sales and Plant teams tied for second.
