20 CITIES IN OREGON TO HAVE BOUTS SOON

Astoria Latest to Organize Boxing Commission.

INITIAL CARD IS STAGED

Koch, Who Won Decision From Joe Bonds in 10 Rounds, Has Bright Future.

The year 1920 should be the greatest year in clean professional boxing that Oregon fans have ever witnessed. Before many more weeks bouts will be a regular occurrence in nearly 20 cities throughout the state. Each week finds new commissions springing into existence and the game given impetus.

The latest city to make its debut with a municipal boxing commission is Astoria. The initial card of this thriving city's commission was staged Friday night with Oscar Koch meeting Joe Bonds in the main event of ten rounds. Koch won the decision and the credit of being one of the best appearing heavyweights in the northwest has been developed in the northwest in many years.

Koch is Fighter.
Koch is a protégé of Clet McIntyre, who is confident that Koch will be ranked with the leading heavyweights of the world, and many others who have seen the big Astorian under fire and that opinion with McIntyre. The former Seattle Athletic club instructor should be able to pick a heavyweight if at anyone can and one can rest assured that if a boxer does not show the goods McIntyre will not waste any time with him.

McIntyre is training Koch for all of his fights as well as looking after his business. Koch is really a likely appearing contender. He stands 6 feet, weighs about 220 pounds at the present time and is 22 years old and married. He has a fighting heart, which is essential for success, and has confidence. He is as shifty on his feet as a lightweight and hits with both hands.

Koch will meet Young Hector in the main event of Clay Hill's card in Seattle next Friday night, and when he disposes of Hector would like to battle in Portland and Milwaukee. The rest of last Friday night's card in Astoria was a "bear." Al Byers, former amateur featherweight champion of the northwest, battled six rounds to a draw against Billy Nelson in the semi-main event. Byers fought like a real boxer and on the strength of his shooting with Nelson was entitled to consideration for matches here against some opponents of high class. Byers fought like a new man and many Portland fans were treated to an agreeable surprise by his great work. Nelson outweighted Al 12 to 15 pounds, but was not in the best of shape, so that about even the score.

Battling Macke and Bud Stengel traveled six fast rounds to a draw, mixing hammer and tongue the entire distance. Macke was the better of the two, forcing Stengel all over the ring to the fifth canto, when Bud began to come to the fore with some hard smashes. Stengel finished strong in the sixth, with Macke staggering.

Mike De Pinto and Harry Davis fought a four-round draw in the main event. De Pinto hit Davis plenty, but the newboy champion took them all and earned a draw. Ed Shockey and Nace Grant were the main event of the program. There were no hitches or waits between matches and everything was up to snuff. WASHINGTON GETS DARTMOUTH GAME

New Hampshire Football Team to Play at Seattle.

DATE IS NOVEMBER 27

Sound College Highly Elated Over Acceptance by Easterners of Regularly Scheduled Contest.

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 31.—(Special.)—Dartmouth college, of Hanover, N. H., has been added to the 1920 football schedule of the University of Washington. Announcement of the game was made today as the result of several weeks' negotiations between the managers of the two institutions. The match will be played in Seattle the Saturday following Thanksgiving day, November 27, 1920.

For the first time in football history there will meet the west in a regularly scheduled game. Pasadena, which has boasted the distinction of being the only city on the Pacific coast to witness an intercollegiate gridiron match, now has a rival in Seattle, which will be the first western city to act as host to an eastern eleven appearing on a regular college schedule.

News that Washington's offer had been accepted by the athletic committee of Dartmouth was joyfully received by local football enthusiasts, who predict the coming classic will be the university's best ever had. The acceptance of the offer by such a noted institution as Dartmouth is considered here as establishing Washington in a high position in the athletic world.

BRITONS MAY ENTER RUNS

OXFORD AND CAMBRIDGE TO START IN RELAY EVENT.

Last Appearance of Englishmen in U. S. Track Contests Dates Back to Meet Before War.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 31.—Provisional acceptance of the invitation to compete in the University of Pennsylvania relay carnival at Franklin field on April 20 and May 1 has been received by the management of the games both from Cambridge and Oxford universities. Both institutions, Pennsylvania authorities said tonight, appear eager to send men to the relay events.

Should the two British institutions not be able to organize separate teams, it was said, they may send a combined team, which would compete both in the individual and relay events.

PAPER WASTE ASSAILED

ELIMINATE SPORTING PAGES, SUGGESTS SENATOR.

Prolific Output of Government Departments Characterized by Senator as "Wicked Waste."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The waste of white paper by government departments came in for another attack today in the senate. Senator Smoot, republican, Utah, opened the discussion and to prove that the senate's skirts weren't quite clear he lugged into the chamber a volume the size of a bushel basket with the explanation that it was a compilation of the speeches already made in the senate on the peace treaty and printed in the Congressional Record.

The book, said Senator Smoot, contained more than 2,000,000 words. He added that he had started, in committee, the separate articles relating to the treaty which had been inserted in the Record, but had given up because he found such a collection could not be brought together in any reasonable number of books.

Senator Smoot attacked government departments for what he characterized as a "wicked" waste of paper. Senator Sherman, republican, Illinois, said departmental mail had become a pest even to country newspapers, editor, the "knights of silencers" and "postscript" adding:

"They get so much of it they are unable to open it without the aid of private secretaries."

Senator Sherman, republican, Minnesota, remarked that the newspapers had no right to complain of the white paper shortage when they devoted 1-3 to three pages daily to publication of sporting news.

The newspapers ought to "eliminate their sporting news, and I am sure we could all get along better," he said.

Repeal of all tariff duties on print paper, wood pulp, and newsprint as proposed by a bill introduced today by Representative Connally, democrat, Texas, and referred to the house ways and means committee.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 31.—(Special.)—Wrestling aspirants are working out regularly at O. A. C. Three mats are now in use, and are crowded to capacity every night. Most of the material turning out is inexperienced, however, and prospects for a winning team do not seem bright.

With the first conference meet more than a month ahead, Coach "Jim" Arbuthnot is working hard with the squad, trying to whip it into presentable condition. Several of the men are out with injuries. Foreman, prominent contender for a place at 145 pounds, has a badly sprained wrist. Sam Armstrong, who has been going good for the 165-pound weight, fractured two ribs and the doctor has plastered him with a cast.

Morris, at 125 pounds, also had a badly sprained wrist.

Attempts are being made to work up interest in a student meet, and if the various alumni in the valley can be induced to enter will probably be held about February 20. Meets with the University of Washington at Corvallis on March 6, and with Washington State college at Pullman on March 13, are already scheduled. These Canadians have had experience in the northern circuit and surpassed their opponents in trickery and clever footwork.
