

SICK JUROR IN I. W. W. CASE HAS INFLUENZA

Trial at Montesano Put Over to Next Tuesday.

ALIENISTS SEE ROBERTS

Conclusion Not to Be Made Known Until Court Reconvenes; Fourth Week of Trial Ended.

MONTESANO, Wash., Feb. 21.—Influenza has invaded the jury room in the case of ten alleged I. W. W. on trial here for the murder of Warren O. Grimm, Centralia, Armistice day parade victim. The illness of Edward Carr, Houlihan, which caused postponement of the trial Friday, was today diagnosed as influenza and court was again adjourned.

Fear that other members of the panel, even including the two alternate jurors, all of whom have been exposed, might be stricken was expressed today when it became known that at least four others had been reported as "not feeling well." The jury was removed from its quarters in the courthouse today and placed in a large room in the city hall, a block distant.

Even the sick juror was moved. The law prohibits the separation of the jury, and Judge Wilson was loath to discharge Carr at this time and wear in one of the two alternates in his stead. The possibility that Carr may have recovered by Tuesday morning, when court again convenes, was given as a reason by the court for refusing to discharge Carr at this time.

Parr's Condition Not Alarming.
Court session Tuesday, with Parr still sitting, probably will depend upon the condition of Parr as reported by County Health Officer Fitz. Parr's temperature today was reported to be 104 by Dr. Fitz, but he said his condition was not alarming.

The selection of an alternate, in case it should become necessary to discharge Parr and send him to a hospital, would be by ballot. The alternates are James A. Ball, blacksmith, Montesano, and A. H. Johnson, cigar dealer, Houlihan.

Defense counsel today asked that Carr be discharged, but Judge Wilson decided to deny the request in view of the possibility of the juror's recovery by Tuesday. The state objected strenuously to such action at this time. Although there was no session of court today, attorneys for both the state and defense remained about the courthouse until noon.

Judge Wilson definitely decided to place the jurors in more commodious quarters.

Insanity Roberts Defense.
The defense had expected to begin today its defense of Loren Roberts, one of the ten defendants, in behalf of whom it has entered a plea of insanity. Three alienists have examined Roberts, two of them for the state, but any conclusions they have reached were to become public only when they became a matter of court record. The state has announced that it would resist the plea of insanity throughout the trial. The defense maintains that Roberts is suffering from hallucinations, delusions, dementia, and that he was so suffering at the time of the shootings in Centralia and at the time he made the alleged confession, which has been placed in evidence.

The fourth week of the trial ended today, the state having concluded its case last Wednesday and the defense having introduced evidence in behalf of one defendant, Eugene Barrett, in an endeavor to prove an alibi. The defense contends that Barrett was in the lobby of the Roderick hotel during the shooting. The state has insisted that Barrett was in a room at the Avaton hotel from which the shot was fired which caused the death of Grimm. Bert Faulkner, who went to trial when the case opened on January 26, was discharged last Wednesday, Judge Wilson ruling favorably on a motion of the defense for dismissal on the grounds of insufficiency of evidence.

WHEAT SCARCITY IN SIGHT

Governor Davis Urges Development of American Falls District.

BOISE, Idaho, Feb. 21.—(Special.)—Within three years, unless there is a tremendous increase in the production of wheat, the United States will be importing that grain, Governor Davis told the state farm bureau in an address delivered this week.

Governor Davis was instrumental in the development of the American Falls district, one of the greatest wheat producing sections in the west. He is thoroughly familiar with the grain situation in the country. It is his contention that the United States is living from hand to mouth and the present conditions cannot go on.

Greater production of all foodstuffs contributing products is his solution of the situation. For this west he told the farm bureau this could be brought about through the irrigation of now rich but vacant lands which must have water to make them productive.

Antelope Refuge Proposed.
A request that Lake county lands be set aside by the department of the interior as a refuge for antelope and grouse, both nearly extinct, has been made by Senator John Gill, one of the new members of the state fish and game commission. The request was originally made by the American Bison society, which also asks for a similar refuge in Washe county, Nevada.

Two Corporations Are Sued.
The Standard Oil company and Portland Railway Light & Power company are co-defendants in a suit filed in the circuit court yesterday by Catherine F. Bradley, seeking \$5000 damages for injuries received December 20, 1919, in a collision between a street car and automobile truck at Eugene and Sacramento streets.

FOURTH SUIT REBUFFED

MRS. IONA DAVIS' EFFORTS TO GET DIVORCE IMPEDED.

Judge Kavanaugh Refuses Hearing Until District Attorney's Office Files Answer to Complaint.

Attempts of Iona E. Davis to get a divorce from Walter J. Davis met with a fourth rebuff yesterday when Circuit Judge Kavanaugh refused to give her a hearing until the district attorney's office could file an answer to her complaint. In this answer, which is being prepared by Earl Bernard, deputy district attorney, her three previous suits are recited and the contention made that failure to get a decree before one judge does not entitle a litigant to make a similar attempt before another judge.

The Davis marriage was solemnized in Oregon City on October 23, 1915. Mrs. Davis declares in her divorce action that they had nothing in common, that her husband was overbearing and accused her of being "no good" and smoking cigarettes. She asks alimony of \$50 a month. Davis is not contesting the last suit, though he did former ones.

That her husband, Frederick Bradley, has absconded with their two minor children, Larkin, aged 12, and Lillian, aged 9, is the contention of Mrs. Lillian Bradley in a divorce suit filed in the circuit court. Other divorce actions filed were: W. E. Maxwell, Daisy L. Sutter against Wallace W. Sutter, Naomi Elizabeth Oliver against Wadsworth W. Oliver, and G. R. Purdy against Margaret Purdy.

JAIL GETS ORCHESTRA

Bootlegger Is Leader of Musical Trio at Oregon City.

OREGON CITY, Or., Feb. 21.—(Special.)—An orchestra has been formed by prisoners in the county jail here. The orchestra was organized last week and consists of three pieces, a violin, guitar and mandolin and is led by Glavich, the famous bootlegger of Portland. Other members of the organization are Orth and Karjala, who are awaiting action of the grand jury. Although these young men are confined in the county jail they are a happy bunch and have made many friends who have called on them and donated magazines and music.

ROBBERS ASK NEW TRIAL

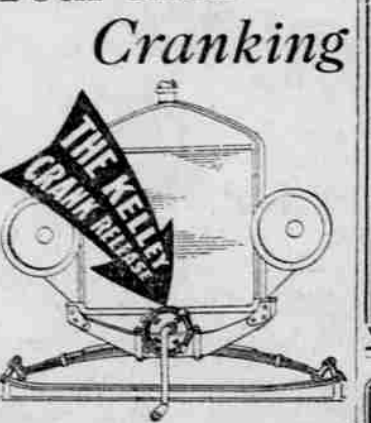
Men Given Sentences in Penitentiary Want Case Reopened.
