

RETAIL LUMBERMEN CLOSE CONVENTION

B. J. Boorman of Montana
Elected President.

FRESNO CHOSEN FOR 1921

Reclamation and Reforestation In-
dorsed—Zone Associations to
Be Established in Northwest.

BOISE, Idaho, Feb. 21.—(Special.)—After electing officers and directors for the ensuing year, choosing Fresno, Cal., as the convention city for 1921, and adopting resolutions calling for the formation of zone associations subordinate to the parent body and endorsing energetic reclamation and reforestation work in western states by the federal government, the Western Retail Lumbermen's association adjourned its three-day convention at noon.

One of the resolutions adopted by unanimous vote was that giving the association's endorsement to the plan for \$250,000,000 appropriation for reclamation work in western states, presented to congress on behalf of the west by Governor D. W. Davis, on his recent visit to Washington.

Another resolution of almost revolutionary importance in the organization itself was the one calling for the establishment of zone associations within it. The board of directors was empowered to draw boundaries for districts within the 10 states covered by the western association, and assist each one to organize locally. The zone associations when formed will have their own officers and pass upon their own territorial problems, but will not interfere in any way with the authority or working of the parent association.

B. J. Boorman, president of the Boorman Lumber company of Great Falls, Mont., was elected president of the association for 1921, to succeed F. E. Connor of Sacramento, Cal.; C. W. Gamble of Boise, representative of the Boise-Payette Lumber company, was chosen vice-president, from which position it is assumed he will succeed to the presidency in 1921.

A. L. Porter of Spokane, who had held the office for several years, was re-elected secretary and treasurer. On the board of directors were chosen the following: W. W. Landrow of Merced, Cal., and F. H. Harris of San Francisco, Cal., to serve for two years; C. W. Miller of Seattle, Wash., J. H. Baker of Richfield, Utah, and C. J. Baldwin of Bridger, Mont., to serve for three years.

DAVIS CANDIDATE AGAIN

IDAHO GOVERNOR ANNOUNCES
CAMPAIGN FOR RE-ELECTION.

Executive to Make Fight for Second
Term on Record Made by First
Administration.

BOISE, Idaho, Feb. 21.—(Special.)—Governor Davis will be a candidate to succeed himself as chief executive of the state. He authorized this announcement today, thereby putting at rest many rumors and reports to the effect there was a possibility that he might enter the republican senatorial race. This was current talk during the recent republican conference in Boise.

Governor Davis said that he is according to the wishes of many of his friends. However, in making the announcement he said he had no intention of opening the campaign at this time.

RAIL UNTANGLING IS ON

Northern Pacific Takes Steps to
Open Coeur d'Alene Line.

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 21.—(Special.)—The unscrambling of steam railroads operating into and through Spokane has begun. Within another week wholesale evidences of the return of the railroads to private ownership March 1 will be manifest.

The first step in Spokane, so far as the operating department of any railroad is concerned, was taken yesterday by the Northern Pacific when officials visited Coeur d'Alene and inspected the line and the station there with a view of opening immediately to the Idaho lake city.

Coincident with this was the move made by the traffic department of the O.-W.-R. & N. with a view to the immediate resumption of separate freight terminals here.

At the same time that the Milwaukee and the O.-W.-R. & N. were making preliminary arrangements with a view to opening separate freight offices and the Northern Pacific officials were inspecting their Coeur d'Alene line. Regional Passenger Director Eustice of Chicago was in conference with Northwestern railroad officials with a view to unscrambling the consolidated ticket office business.

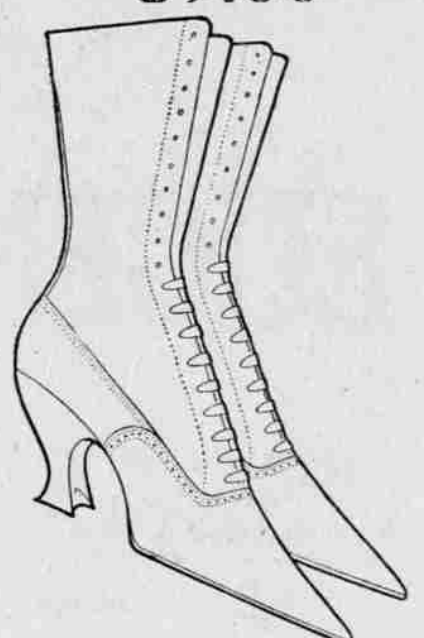

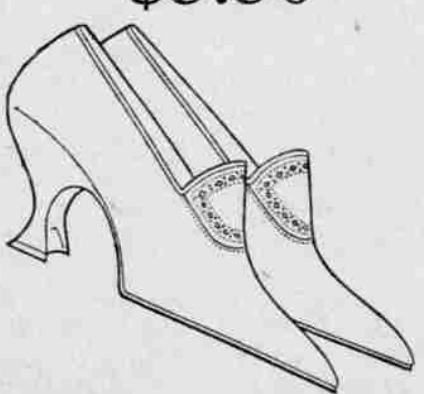

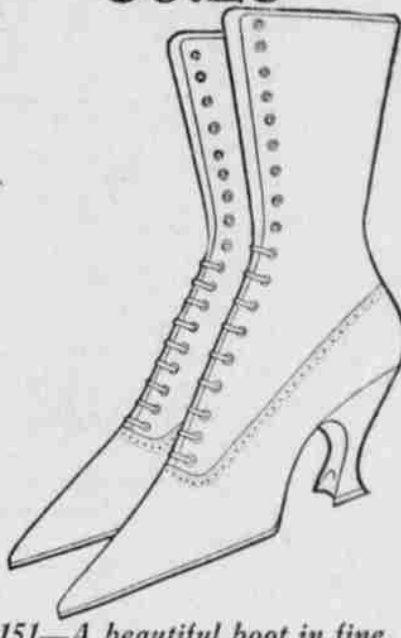

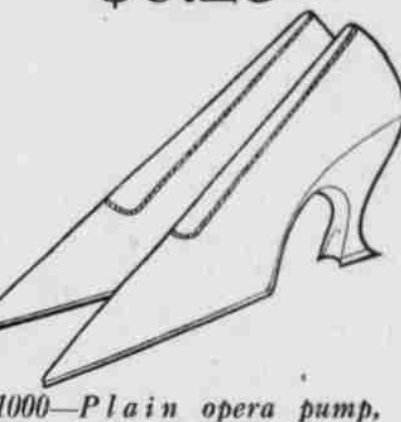

DEFENSE FUND IS RAISED

Shoe Store Employees Contribute
\$125 for Harold Howell.

To assist O. O. Howell in the defense of his son, Harold Howell, who is accused of the murder of Lillian Leutold in the woods near Bandon, Or., last July, employees of the Walkover boot shop of Portland have raised \$125 and are encouraging contributions to a fund being provided at the store, 342 Washington street.

Residents of Bandon claim that the boy has not been receiving a fair trial, that he is being tried in the circuit instead of juvenile court, though only 14 years old. The jury has disagreed in two past trials and he is being held in jail for his third trial. His father lost his left hand prior to the trouble, his finances have been exhausted and he has received no aid from the county court, it is said.

The Walkover employees say that they simply seek a fair and impartial trial for the lad, which is held

possible unless a defense fund is raised.
