

380 ELKS JOURNEY TO NORTHERN OASIS

Special Carries Delegates to Seattle Fete.

"MOONSHINE" IS RAIDED

Contraband Seized En Route, but Disappointment Not so Keen With Canada in Sight.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 21.—(Special.)—The "Royal Purple Special," handled by all-Elk crew, carrying 380 members of Portland lodge of Elks, No. 142, augmented by small delegations from Vancouver and Centralia, Wash., arrived in Seattle at 6 o'clock tonight.

The Portland delegation was greeted at the O. W. R. & N. company's station in Seattle by a large delegation of Seattle Elks, headed by the drill team of Seattle lodge No. 92, and the Elks' band. The Portland and Seattle Elks, led by Mayor Fitzgerald, Chief of Police Joel B. Warren and Exalted Ruler Charles Davis of Seattle lodge, marched through some of the principal Seattle streets to the Elks' temple where the Portland officers conducted the initiatory ceremonies admitting more than 200 candidates into the mystic shrine of Elkdom.

Trip First "Dry" One.
The trip today was the first "dry" excursion ever conducted by Portland Elks to Seattle, but was a decided success, nevertheless. A delegation composed of Exalted Ruler Berg of Portland lodge, Joseph Mauck, William McKinney, Harry G. Allen and George O. Brandenburg constituted the "moral squad" delegated to search all baggage for any contraband. In the few instances where such material was found it was confiscated and presented to a special committee chosen by election conducted in one of the nine coaches of the special.

At Centralia 50 members of Centralia lodge met the Portland delegation and took the majority of the lodge men in machines on a short sightseeing trip of the city.

Entertainment Staged.
With the exception of Vancouver and Centralia, Wash., no stops were made by the Elks' special train. The trip was made in six hours, with Conductor G. E. Holliday in charge.

Following the initiatory ceremony conducted tonight the Seattle committee staged an entertainment at the Elks temple.

At 9 o'clock Sunday morning the Portland delegation will join the Seattle Elks on a trip to Vancouver, B. C., leaving Seattle on a special chartered steamer, stopping at Victoria for an hour and a half.

A special train over the Canadian Pacific will bring the "Bills" back to Seattle Monday night and the great majority of the Portland lodge men will leave Seattle at midnight for home.

"Oasis" Looked For.
Although no formal announcement has been made concerning the entertainment features to be presented to the Elks of Portland in British Columbia, the majority seem to look upon the northern regions as a sort of an "oasis."

Announcement was made tonight that the Seattle Elks will return the visit by a trip to Portland on March 9, when officers of Seattle lodge, No. 92, will conduct the initiatory ceremony for a large class of candidates seeking entrance into Portland lodge.

According to Exalted Ruler Berg, arrangements have been made for the use of the public auditorium for this special occasion, with an entertainment at the Elks temple following the regular session.

BAD CHECKS CHARGED
TRAIL OF PAPER LAID TO PAUL C. DORMITZER.

Furniture House Declares That Paper for \$50 Is Worthless and Warrant Is Asked.

Paul C. Dormitzer, a Portland attorney, who has figured in numerous recent actions in the circuit court, was being sought yesterday by deputies from the office of Constable Peterson on a charge of passing a check on a local furniture store for \$50 without funds in the bank with which to redeem it. The warrant was issued by Frederick M. Dempsey, deputy district attorney, after six complaints had reached the ears of District Attorney Evans involving checks to the total of \$217 returned from a Vancouver bank, stamped "insufficient funds."

The specific complaint against Dormitzer was filed by L. R. Tollenaar of Calef Brothers, a furniture firm, alleging that Dormitzer cashed a check for \$50 there on February 4 which was returned by the bank. According to Deputy District Attorney Dempsey, Dormitzer passed two other checks on the same concerns on February 7, one for \$40 and the other for \$15.

Records in the district attorney's office also indicate that three checks cashed by Dormitzer at Penn's cash market, 230 Alder street, by Landor Penn, one on January 2 for \$20, one on February 11 for \$10 and one on February 13 for \$50, all have been returned for lack of funds. All the checks are on the American Security bank of Vancouver, Wash., and are signed "Paul C. Dormitzer, trustee."

On Friday a similar check for \$12 was returned to County Clerk Beveridge's office from Vancouver with \$1 protest charges.

Several weeks ago a charge like the one made yesterday was filed against Dormitzer in the municipal court by Deputy District Attorney Delch. The overdraft was made good and the case has not been prosecuted, though attaches yesterday declared that the charge had not yet been dismissed.

Vocational Training Assured.
ASTORIA, Or., Feb. 21.—(Special.)—Vocational training in various branches is to be included in the course of the part-time school in Astoria. That was decided upon at a conference between school directors and Newton Van Dusen, representing the state board of education. The board announced that five-hours' instruction each week will be given in domestic science, carpenter work, telegraphy, automobile repairing and perhaps typewriting. Arrangement of details was left to Superintendent Hunsong and Mr. Dusen.

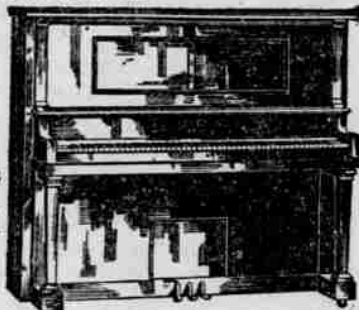

CITY TO BE BURNISHED

GALA ATTIRE TO BE PUT ON FOR SHRINE CONVENTION.

Every Resident Will Be Asked to Beautify His Home to Make Good Impression.

Every resident of Portland will be asked by the general committee handling details for the convention of the imperial council of the shrine, to be held here in June, to beautify the home for the occasion, to cut back the rose bushes so as to have ample blooms late in the month and to be ready to greet visitors with a "Glad to see you" whenever a fez-wearer is seen.

An organization of 4-minute men, similar to that which did so much to assist during the war, will be formed with Fred Carleton at the head, to carry the message into theaters, church and every place where people assemble, within the next few months. It is only through the cooperation of the public that the best results may be obtained, according to a statement given out at general headquarters yesterday.

One of the things the people of this city will be asked to do the week of the convention is to wash their own linden, so that the combined laundry forces of Portland may take care of the visitors from abroad. There is not enough capacity to handle local and special business, it was pointed out to the committee yesterday by the laundry people, hence it is up to the citizens to care for their own wash.

Just one item asked of the laundry proprietors is that they furnish 5000 first-class towels, to be used by visiting shriners, in addition to other supplies already arranged for. This is a contract at which they expressed considerable hesitation, because of the market situation, but they will deliver the goods, anyway, it is understood.

A special effort will be made to have the city in a most presentable condition at the time the things already taken up is the patching of pavements and clearing of streets that are in a rundown state. Attention of the city council has been called to this and no doubt is expressed about the fullest co-operation.

CAREY RAPS DEMOCRATS

ROOSEVELT REPUBLICAN CLUB ADDRESSED BY JUDGE.

Party Has "Frittered Away" Opportunity to Serve Mankind, Is Speaker's Assertion.

"The democratic administration has during the last two years had the greatest opportunity in American history to serve humanity, to serve civilization and to serve itself, and it frittered away the opportunity," declared Judge Charles H. Carey, in a strong address delivered at the luncheon of the Roosevelt Republican club at the Benson yesterday.

Speaking before more than 100 republicans, who frequently interrupted with applause, Judge Carey reviewed the history of the two principal parties; touched upon the acts of the present administration and asserted that if there were an election tomorrow the democratic party would be swept out of office by a republican landslide.

"The democratic party," said Judge Carey, "has always been a party of negation. Its leaders have evaded real problems and under the present administration, which has been notable for frequent shifts, we have seen the astounding example of an active organized minority by threat compelling the government to deliver legislation for their own special advantage."

"We are through with fritter. We need action. We must have it, and we will get it only through a party that follows principle and which stands for principle."

George A. Brown was chairman of the day and Harold Hurlburt sang several vocal selections.
