

SUPPORT OF WILSON HELD "LOYAL" DUTY

Secretary Colby Pleads to
End Hatred and Friction.

PARTISAN WARNING GIVEN

Well-Being of Country Must Be
Kept in Mind Is Declaration.
General Pershing Speaks.

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—Loyalty to America means "loyalty to her chosen servants, from president down," Bainbridge Colby, named as secretary of state, declared tonight in an address at a "loyalty week" meeting in the city hall. General John J. Pershing also spoke on Americanism and patriotism.

"We must stifle the voice of hatred and friction," added Mr. Colby. "We must realize that there is not a man in America who does not hold office as a result of the free choice of her citizens. It is a high patriotic duty that we should support and sustain the men who have been placed in positions of difficulty, burden, responsibility and even danger as the result of our suffrage."

"An intelligent and conscientious opposition is a part of loyalty to country, but we must not, if we are loyal, seek to dispense our energies in a partisan warfare that is waged without regard to its consequences to the well-being, security or honor of the country."

Pershing True American.

The speaker referred to General Pershing as the "true American" who is "a lesson in loyalty to country, which makes all spoken words seem weak and futile."

Declaring that the "social and industrial structure" of America is founded on "enlightened citizenship," Mr. Colby asserted he "was deeply concerned with the diminution of the teaching strength of the country, as a result of the disproportionately low salaries being paid to teachers throughout the country."

"We must look to this right promptly," he added, "it is a condition that must not be suffered to continue."

Illiterates Declared Dangerous.

In traveling about the country visiting the various army cantonments, General Pershing declared in his address that he had found "in the people the purest sort of patriotism," but "they have allowed a certain amount of ignorance to grow up." He said that this is a "dangerous thing," and must be eradicated.

"When the draft act was put into effect," he continued, "there was found to be about 25 to 30 per cent of illiteracy in the country. Now this number of illiterates is too great for our safety."

"I would insist that the English language be learned here in a given length of time."

"We can remedy conditions through education by communities, each community must be self-cleansing, self-purging."

"The greatest work America can do in the world is to make herself truly American. When that is accomplished then we can exert the greatest possible influence on the other people of the world."

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 28.—University of Washington defeated University of California at basketball here tonight by a score of 29 to 28. Cook, Washington guard and acting captain, making the winning point on free throw after five minutes of overtime play. The game was the last of a two-game series. California won last night, 22 to 15.

Accurate basket shooting featured the play of both quintets, and both teams checked closely throughout the game. At the end of the first half Washington led, 14 to 12.

VANCOUVER COUNCIL PLANS
TO RESTRICT PURCHASES.

SAND STORM IS ANNOYING

Clouds Hang Over Oregon Shore,
Which Is Hidden From Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Feb. 28.—(Special.)—The strong east wind, began early yesterday, continued all day, all last night and all day today. The sand storm on Columbia Beach on Hayden Island continued so that it was impossible for persons living on the Washington side to see across the Columbia river. Across the two long fills between Portland and the Columbia river interstate bridge the sand has been deposited on the west side to a depth of several inches in places.

SURGEONS ASK FOR RAISE

37c Per Patient Held Too Low
Rate by Railway Doctors.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 28.—Requests for increased compensation "that is at least approximately commensurate with the amount and quality of service rendered" were sent today to railroads of the west by the Pacific Association of Railway Surgeons. The request was sent to the Southern Pacific, Western Pacific, Northwestern Pacific, Santa Fe, Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake, Oregon Short Line, Arizona & San Diego and Oahu Railroad & Land company.

In the fiscal year 1919 surgeons employed by the Southern Pacific re-

ceived an average fee of 37 cents for each patient, according to a statement of Dr. F. K. Ainsworth, chief surgeon, of the Southern Pacific.

AL KADERS VOTE \$50,000
