Democrats to Make Trouble for Senator Nugent.

NINE OUT FOR GOVERNOR

Republicans Warned Borah May Be Candidate for President.

Non-Partisan Stirs Trouble.

BOISE, Idaho, March 6.—The right of United States Senator John F. Nugent, junior member from Idaho in the upper house of congress, to succeed himself is being questioned by those in his party who have never been classed as his admirers and who believe that even if nominated he cannot be elected.

Democrats are greatly interested in a report that appeared in a recent issue of the Times-Pain Chronicle, edited by W. M. Stevenson, former state senator from Shoshone county, at one time editor of the Wallace Press-Times, and for many years closely identified with the interests of Harry L. and Jerome J. Day, prominent mining men.

Men Mentioned for Governor. State Chairman Day having issued the call for the state convention to meet at Moscow and the time and place for the state conventions having been fixed, democrats are casting about to get a list of names to present for the congressional and state offices. No less than nine men are mentioned for governor, which is not to be taken as an indication by any means that all of them will be in the race.

Republicans Get Warning. Any attempt made to pledge the delegates from Idaho to the republican national convention at Chicago in such a way as to embarrass or jeopardize the candidacy of United States Senator William E. Borah will be frowned upon in this state, friends of the senator have declared.

Not a Few Republicans are Hoping that Senator Borah may yet enter the field as a candidate for president. Let us see what the prospects are.
