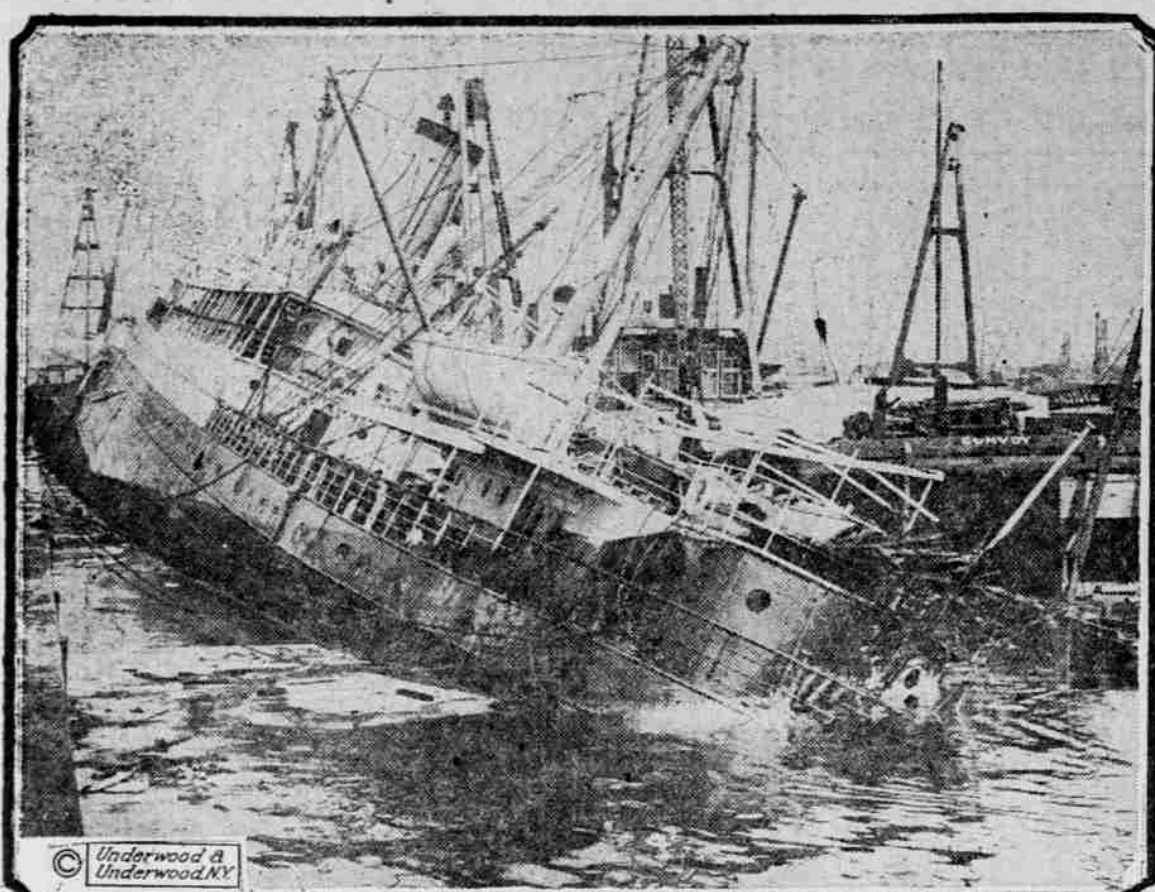
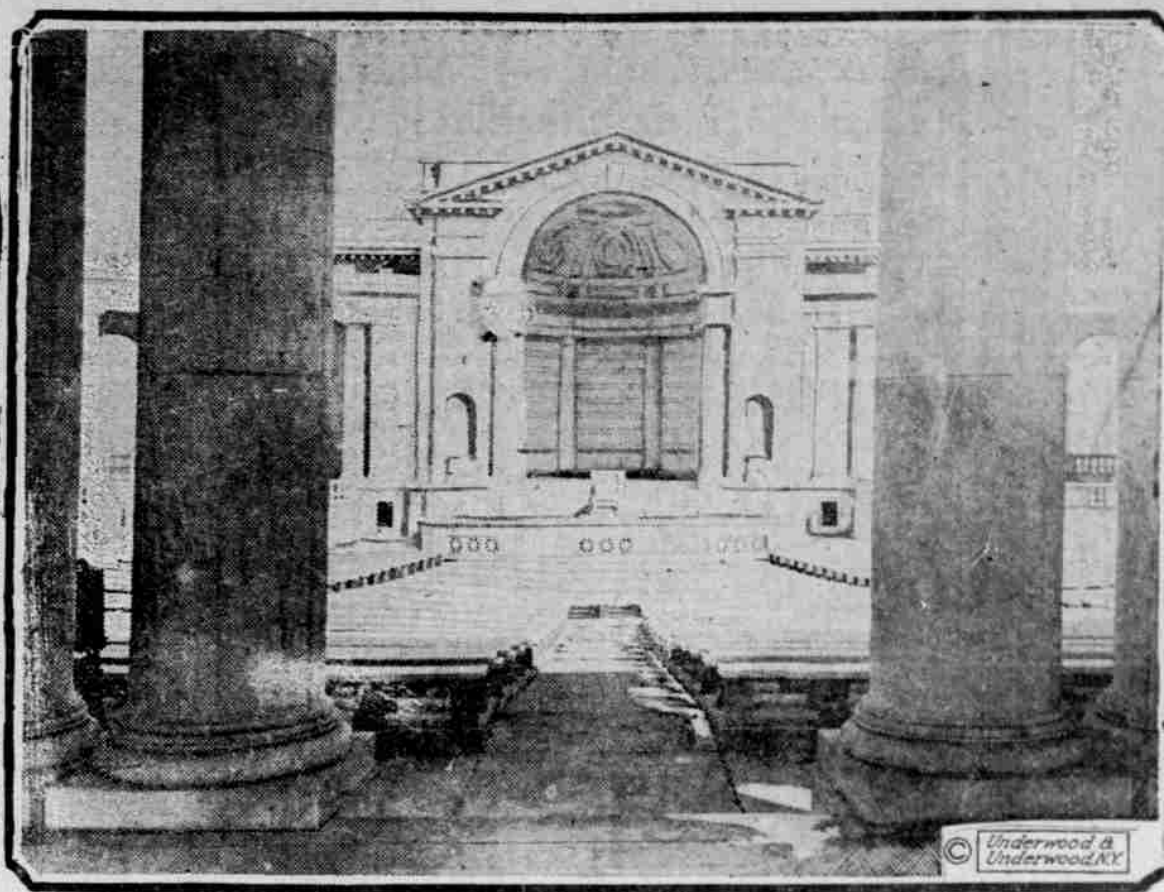

U.S. Shipping Board Steamer Foundered At New York Pier



Great Arlington Memorial Amphitheatre Nearly Finished.

MYSTERY surrounds the sinking of the 10,000-ton shipping board vessel Moccasin, submerged at her dock in Brooklyn. The ship suddenly filled with water. Investigation revealed that the sea-cocks and scuttle were open. The ship was scheduled to sail for Rio de Janeiro.

The great amphitheater at Arlington, Va., built as a memorial to America's heroic dead, is nearing completion after five years of work. It is of white marble and crowns the eastern shore of the Potomac river and faces toward the Lincoln memorial on the opposite side. It was erected at a cost of \$525,000.

The hearse that conveyed the body of Gaby Deslys through the streets of Paris to its final resting place was covered with flowers. Thousands of people turned out to pay their last tribute to the famous actress who in life had won their esteem.

The famous mahogany furniture of the hilltop household of General Tom Thumb is to be preserved in a special museum at Middleboro, Mass. The miniature furniture constitutes a rare collection of choice pieces gathered from all over the world. Some of the pieces were presented to Tom Thumb and his wife during their European tour, with P. T. Barnum. Count Magri, second husband of the late Mrs. Tom Thumb, still lives at the old home.

The steamship Marne, named in commemoration of the heroic defense of the French at that river, has been made ready for launching at the Hog Island shipyards, Philadelphia. Mrs. Newton D. Baker, wife of the secretary of war, will be the sponsor and will christen the ship with a bottle of water from the river Marne.

Miss Noretta McCormick Smith is painting a portrait of President Wilson for the place on the wall of the executive offices with those of other presidents who have ruled there. Miss Smith made a sketch when the president was at the capitol signing bills after his return from the peace conference. She has painted portraits of several prominent men.

The annual winter carnival and ski races at Christiania, Norway, attract the populace of the city and many from afar. Queen Maud of Norway and King Christian X of Denmark occupied the rear seat and King Haakon of Norway and Prince Harold of Denmark the front seat of the royal sleigh in driving to the field.

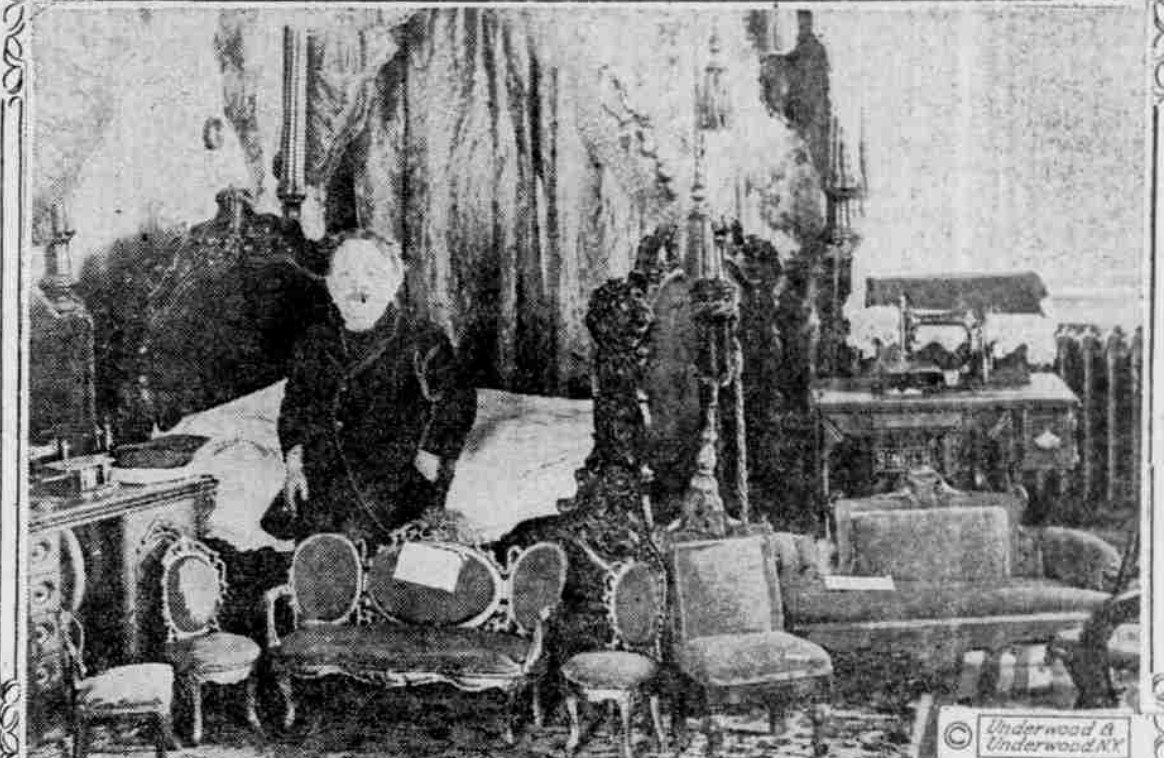
William Partridge of the naval bureau of yards and docks has perfected a model of the navy's giant new hangar for trans-Atlantic airships to be erected at Lakehurst, N. J. The model is built on a scale of 1-16 inch per foot. The hangar will be 800 feet long, 329 feet wide and 174 feet high and will hold one 10,000,000-cubic foot airship in the center with space for many smaller planes on each side. The shed will be spanned by trusses of the three-hinged type and the total steel tonnage will be \$500.

Admiral Benson, as head of the United States shipping board, appears in Washington in the garb of civil life. His figure in the uniform of his rank as a naval officer has long been familiar in Washington.

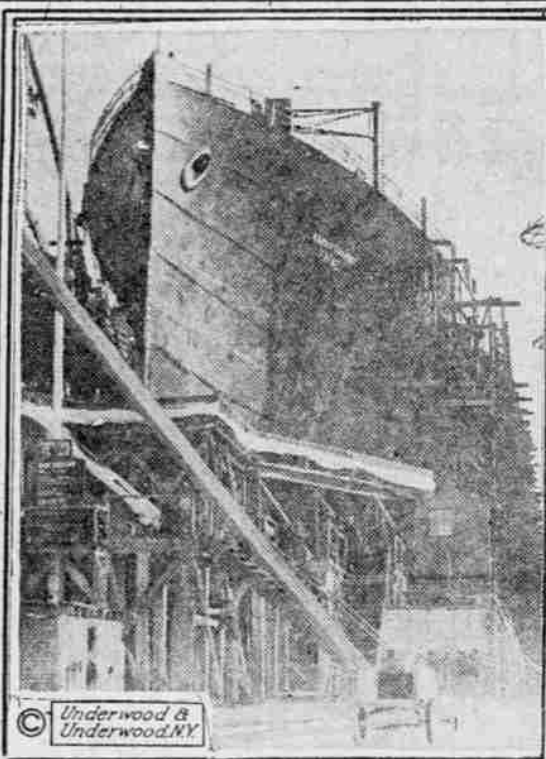

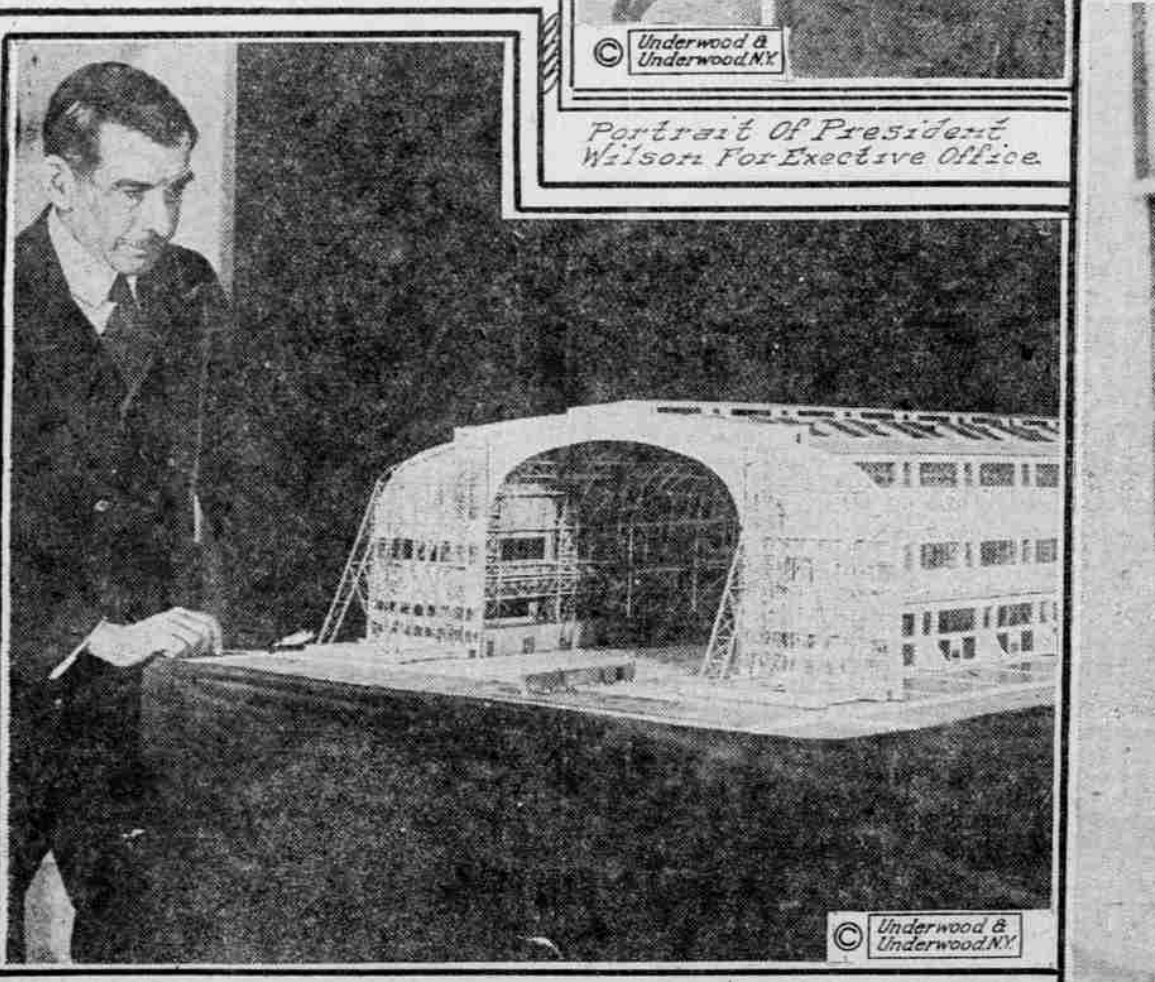
