

HOOPER'S NAME MAY BE ON BOTH TICKETS

Oregon Supporters in Two Parties Are Active.

VOTERS FACING DILEMMA

Chance of Mysterious Candidate Being Smoked Out Before State Primaries in May.

Comes now a republican Hoover club of Oregon. Oswald West, who is having petitions circulated to place Mr. Hoover's name on the democratic ticket as a presidential possibility, is to have a rival, for Chester G. Murphy announced yesterday that a republican Hoover club will be formed tomorrow for the purpose of placing the name of the former food administrator on the republican ticket along with General Wood. Senator Poinsett, Senator Johnson and Governor Lowden.

If Mr. West and Mr. Murphy have their wish, Oregon voters, whether republicans or democrats, will be confronted with the name of Mr. Hoover as the presidential primary ticket, the republican party apparently claiming him as a member, while Mr. Hoover artfully sidesteps admitting affiliation with either.

Student Friends Get Busy.
Mr. Murphy knew Mr. Hoover when they were students at Stanford. He says that a number of other former Stanford students, friends of Mr. Hoover, are interested in presenting his name to the republican voters of this state. These old associates will hold a meeting at the University club tomorrow noon to canvass the situation and organize the republican Hoover club of Oregon. Mr. Murphy's action follows closely upon the resignation of Ralph P. Merritt as secretary of the board of regents of the University of California in order to direct the Hoover movement among republicans in that state. It has been preceded also by the appeal issued by Ralph Arnold, chairman of the national Hoover club of New York.

On the petitions directed by Mr. West, Mr. Hoover is designated as a member of the party. Under the law the petition placing a candidate's name on the primary ballot must state that he is a member of the party on whose ballot his name is to appear. Therefore, Mr. Murphy's petitions will probably announce that Mr. Hoover is a republican, a claim which may be as sound as that of Mr. West in view of Mr. Hoover's silence on the matter.

Secretary Accepts Petitions.
The secretary of state accepts the petitions and places the name of the candidate on the party ballot indicated. Whether the secretary of state would place Mr. Hoover's name on the republican ballot and also on the democratic ballot is something for the future to develop. The secretary may take the stand that it is not his business to invent a party for political purposes.

By the time the primaries are held in Oregon in May, Mr. Hoover may be smoked out, so that everyone will know with which party he casts his lot. Such a clear-cut statement would settle the matter for the voters of one party or the other and he would be off one ballot.

During the interim, however, Mr. West is hoping to secure 500 names of democrats to embalm Mr. Hoover on the primary ballot, and the republican Hoover club of Oregon may be performing a like activity in the republican camp.

WILSON BLAMED FOR UNREST
Judge Corliss Rouses Audience to Applause in Speech.

In a speech which aroused the applause of his auditors Judge Guy C. H. Corliss, first chief justice of North Dakota and now resident of Portland, charged at the Roosevelt Republican club luncheon yesterday that Woodrow Wilson had done more to cause present world unrest than any other single individual.

"Grant even that he is sincere," said Corliss, "in large and frequent doses of his 'Extract of Europe' has created the false hopes of El Dorado in the minds of those who do not know that it is a mythical land, thus has he led a sick world on to acute mania."

"While the fall of Woodrow Wilson from his high pinnacle attained in Europe a year ago is one of the painful things in world's history, still we cannot escape the fact that he is responsible for it."

"And back of it, in my opinion, is the probability that Wilson let his vanity get the best of him. He had the idea, long before last October, that he would dominate the world. When he called upon the nation to elect a democratic congress on October 28 he did so with this idea in mind. He wanted to go to Europe as America's 'unembarrassed spokesman' so he could return and force down the nation's throat a combined treaty with league of nations and a peace treaty that he could not be 'separated by any political knife' to use the words of his New York speech."

"Charge he was repudiated by more than 1,000,000 majority. Even then he defied the expressed will of the people. Warned by the senate that it would not accept what he had framed into the treaty he still refused to seek the 'advice and consent' of the senate in the grave work of mending a war-torn world as the constitution of America provides."

THEFT CASES ARE SET
Two Accused of Taking Clothing to Have Hearing on Wednesday.

The inspectors picked the two up when they were seen crossing the Burnside bridge carrying clothing. In addition Martinez had on two coats and an overcoat. Nantis later identified clothing found in the possession of the two as his.

Sergeant George Hoban was named secretary and Corporal A. W. Boston treasurer. Another meeting is to be held in the same rooms on Friday, April 2, when further plans will be made for perpetuation of the organization.

Major Dougherty, Captain James F. Alexander, Lieutenant Fred Mahneke and other old-time members of the company were present, offering cooperation and urging that the organization remain intact. All former members of the company are especially invited to be in attendance at the next meeting. HOOD RIVER, Or., March 20.—(Special).—Miss S. Frederick, 20, of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Frederick, has just returned from a three-year service with the British army, accompanied by a winsome English bride. The romance began when Mrs. Frederick

formerly Miss Jeanne Sudell, met her future husband at a hospital at Preston. She was visiting the wards distributing cigarettes and flowers to the wounded men. The wedding occurred at Preston January 2, 1919.

Mr. Frederick entered the British service with the royal engineer corps but was transferred to the royal field artillery. As a summer holiday he spent three months on the Belgian front. Then his regiment was transferred to Italy where he participated in the Plave campaign. Here he simultaneously sustained 11 wounds from bursting shrapnel.

Mr. and Mrs. Frederick returned to New York last week. Mr. Frederick was delayed for a time as a wounded alien. He was made to produce his birth certificate and other documents before officials at Ellis Island would pass him.

The introduction of the president's possessions is a letter from King George, which reads:

"The queen and I wish you God-speed and a return to your home and dear ones. A grateful mother country in proud of your splendid services, characterized by unsurpassed devotion and courage."

DR. HOPKINS LAYS BLAME FOR UNREST
Desire of Workers for Individuality Held Cause.

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Dartmouth College President Declares War Has Created Dissatisfaction With Old System.

That the desire of workers for self-expression and realization, rather than for more pay and shorter hours, is the basis of a great deal of the industrial unrest throughout the country, was the declaration of Ernest Martin Hopkins, president of Dartmouth college, in addressing the Oregon Civic league at its regular weekly luncheon yesterday noon. The present tendency in industrial development, the speaker pointed out, is towards quantity production and scientific management, and an inevitable monotony and routine result for the worker. The man who completely submerges himself to the machine is valuable, he said, while individuality is a positive handicap.

President Hopkins, together with Lewis Parkhurst, a life member of the board of trustees of Dartmouth, are making a tour of the Pacific coast in order to meet Dartmouth alumni, and arrived from San Francisco yesterday morning. They leave this evening for Seattle. While here the men are the guests of the Portland Dartmouth alumni association, of which John A. Lehigh is president, and last night were honored at an informal dinner by the association at the University club.

Business Man Elected.
Dr. Hopkins, who graduated from Dartmouth in 1901, is known throughout the east as a student of industrial affairs, and prior to his accepting the presidency of the college he was associated in executive capacities with the Western Electric company, Curtis Publishing company and other large eastern concerns. Turning aside from a time-honored tradition that every president of Dartmouth must be a minister or a man of letters, the board of trustees in 1916 elected Mr. Hopkins, a business man, to this position. During the war, Mr. Hopkins served as assistant to the secretary of war, in charge of industrial relations. Mr. Parkhurst is a member and treasurer of the publishing firm of Ginn & Co., and manager of the Athenaeum Press of Cambridge, Mass.

At the luncheon yesterday Bishop Walter Taylor-Sumner, a graduate of Dartmouth college, acted as chairman of the day, and called upon both Mr. Parkhurst and Dr. Hopkins for addresses. The college president's address, however, was the feature of the luncheon, his talk dealing with industrial problems.

History Reviewed Briefly.
History of past generations was reviewed briefly, the speaker showing how the absolutism of church had given way to that of state, and that how in comparatively recent times the autocracy of the state had been succeeded by an absolutism in industry. The introduction of machinery and quantity production has tended to make the individual worker but a single cog in the vast machine, who in most cases has no opportunity to develop or use his own individuality and frequently does not even know the purpose of the small article which he is making with his machine.

As a result of the war, hundreds of thousands of men have returned, dissatisfied with a system which crushes their individuality and makes them a mere cog in the machine, he said, and if the present industrial system is to continue unchanged then the country must expect a continuation of demands for shorter hours and higher wages, for it will be in their hours away from work rather than at work that the men will find room for the play of their own personalities.

That the industrial methods of the country can be so changed as to allow greater play of individuality was the belief of the speaker. He cited many instances in which eastern concerns have tried methods of giving the employee a closer interest in and a closer knowledge of the business, with great success.

Oil Held Necessary Evil.

Portland can never be a commercial port without oil in the river, according to Harbormaster Jacob Speller yesterday.

Complaints coming to the mayor concerning the constant oily appearance of the Willamette river were referred to Harbormaster Speller for investigation and report. According to the harbormaster, the only manner in which to keep the river free from oil is to close the port, which he advised would be a poor policy. His report has been accepted by the mayor.

NEW CHURCH DEDICATED

Rev. William W. Youngson in Charge of Services.

WHEELER, Or., March 20.—(Special).—The new Wheeler church was dedicated Sunday night by Rev. William Wallace Youngson, district superintendent of the Portland Methodist district. Services were conducted in the morning when Rev. M. B. Parsons, again, Sunday school missionary for Oregon. Rev. E. E. Gilbert, superintendent of the Salem district, and Rev. J. J. Hickerson, local pastor, each delivered a short sermon.

Nearly \$400 was subscribed at the time of the dedication. The balance of indebtedness against the church, Special music both morning and evening added much to the services. The new church is located on Nehalem boulevard and is 40 by 60 feet, bungalow style, the windows being art glass. It was constructed by Contractor Ward Mayer. The new church is the culmination of a plan by Rev. H. J. Hickerson, the pastor.

NOTABLE EDUCATORS VISIT

OPEN ASSEMBLY TO BE HELD AT REED COLLEGE.

Dr. Hopkins of Dartmouth, Dr. Neilson of Smith and Dr. Millikan of Chicago, Speakers.

Reed college will be visited this week by three notable educators, all of whom are to address open assemblies at the college. Dr. Ernest Martin Hopkins, president of Dartmouth college, Dr. William Allen Neilson, president of Smith college, and Dr. R. A. Millikan, professor of physics at the University of Chicago and the California Institute of Technology at Pasadena, will be the three speakers.

Dr. Hopkins of Dartmouth will speak this afternoon at the Reed 4 o'clock evening service under the auspices of the Portland alumni of Dartmouth. A buffet supper will be served in the Reed commons to members of the party and Reed faculty. Dr. Hopkins has had wide experience in commercial, industrial and general education work. During the war he was in charge of industrial for the secretary of war.

Dr. Neilson, former Harvard man and well known as the president of Smith college, will address an open assembly at 4 o'clock Tuesday. Dr. Neilson is the author of several books dealing with literature and will be a welcome speaker at the assembly. The third noteworthy assembly will occur Thursday morning at 10 o'clock, when Dr. Millikan, regarded among scientists as the leading physicist of the country, will speak on some phase of science and inventions during the war and after. Dr. Millikan's researches upon the nature of matter are among the most important carried on by any scientist. He rendered great service during the war as vice chairman of the national research council and as member of the munitions board and naval consulting board. Later as a colonel in the signal corps of the army he was employed largely in the assignment of problems to particular groups of scientists. He probably is credited with having possessed more knowledge than any other mind in the country concerning the solution of scientific problems during the war.

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GYMNASTIC SHOW COMING

Elaborate Programme Arranged for Night of April 9.

Members of all gymnasium classes conducted by the bureau of parks in the community houses in Sellwood and Peninsula park, as well as extension classes conducted in school gymnasiums of the city, will appear in annual exhibition at the auditorium Friday night, April 9, according to announcement by Park Superintendent Keyser yesterday.

The programme will include the little ones of the kindergarten classes, six institute of folk and acrobatic dances; the juniors and seniors, who will perform in callisthenics, and members of the women's class, who are being featured in gymnasium work.

According to Playground Supervisor Knapp, in charge of the exhibition, the performance will be the most elaborate one ever attempted by the park bureau. Special settings to conform with the various dances have been obtained and excellent music is assured.
