 Tour of 36 Musicians Under Director Will Include Stops at Several Valley Points.

CHARLES REED IS ESCAPED—Charles Reed, who is said to be an escapee from the Washington state insane asylum at Steilacoom, Wash., was turned over to the county authorities yesterday following his arrest at Fifth and Hall streets by Police Sergeant Burke and Officer Crane. Reed has a wife and three children at Fifth and Hall streets in this city. He is an ex-serviceman and spent 17 months in France. Members of the man's family were afraid of him and for that reason the police were asked to take charge of him.

CHINESE DUG UP FINES—Five Chinese were asked to contribute \$5 each to the coffers of the city by Municipal Judge Rossman when they appeared in court yesterday morning to answer to a charge of being behind barred doors where gambling was going on. The five were arrested in a raid on an establishment at 80 Second street by Police Sergeant Burke and Officers Riggs and Crane. Those paying fines were: Ah Jow, Krug Wing, Ah Hong, Ah Ding and Jim Kong.

LATENT CHARGE PREFERRED—George Sam, arrested on a charge of larceny by Lieutenant of Detectives Moloney and Inspector Van Deusen, was held to answer to the charge by Municipal Judge Rossman yesterday. Sam is said to have taken two watches valued at \$95 and \$120 from a friend, Theo Dunsen, 406 Stark street, last November. On his return to Portland he was picked up by the officers. Judge Rossman placed his bail at \$150.

CHINESE TO SERVE SENTENCE—Joe Fong, a Chinese prisoner who made his escape while working with a gang of prisoners at the Cedar Ridge prison, and who was recaptured later in the night in the north end, was remanded to the city jail to serve out the remainder of his sentence. CHEAP APPLES IN SOUTH AMERICA No Cause for Alarm.
HOOD RIVER, Or., March 20.—(Special.)—The report from New York City that apples have been selling in South America for less, at retail, than domestic wholesale prices, local shippers declare, should not disturb apple growers. South American markets as well as those of the orient are declared peculiar. The high freight rate, approximately \$1 per box, has resulted in negligible shipments to South America for the past few years.

Y. W. C. A. READY FOR DRIVE
PREPARED TO RAISE \$10,000 FOR LOCAL WORK.

Organization Conducts Twelve Different Departments for Benefit of Girls in Portland.

Preparations are now well under way for the \$10,000 budget campaign of the Young Women's Christian association of Portland will launch the first week in April to supply funds for the coming year. Mrs. F. W. Stephenson, campaign director from national headquarters in New York, is here to assist in the drive.

The organization, which has a birth over 50 years ago, has an active branch in Portland that is doing a big work, addressing 12 different departments covering a wide range. These include girls' work, swimming, employment, commercial school, religious work, physical training and gymnasium, industrial, cafeteria and dining rooms, arts and crafts, travelers' aid, rooming and membership.

More than 400 grade school girls between the ages of 10 and 16 are taking advantage of the Girls' Reserve activities and another big group of high school age make up the Tri-L department. For the girls' classes in designing, painting, weaving, pottery and basket making are provided by the arts and crafts branch. The travelers' aid is another active one, providing care for over 8000 men, women, girls and children while close to 4000 women and girls secured employment for 1919 through the employment department. Over 7000 girls, 300 of whom were without funds, secured rooms at the Y. W. C. A. building.

PILGRIM DRIVE SUCCEEDS
Congregational Churches Raising Quotas Without Difficulty.

The pilgrim memorial drive of the congregational churches of Portland and vicinity went over the top when Dr. William S. Beard and his seven associates quickly raised over \$22,000 in pledges.

The First Congregational church raised more than its quota of \$15,000. The Sunnyside church gave several hundred dollars more than its quota of \$3000, as did the Waverly Heights and Highland churches. Very few of the churches are behind what is expected of them, and in a few days they will have subscribed their apportionments.

While still maintaining an office with Rev. C. H. Harrison in charge in the First Congregational church, the tactical workers have moved on to Salem. There Thursday night they were guests of the First Congregational church. Dr. Kantner of the Salem church presided and Dr. William S. Beard of New York city delivered the principal address. Today they will visit a dozen churches in the vicinity of Salem, from which they expect to glean \$15,000.

One feature of the pledges in the First Congregational church was the creation of a number of memorials. A number of the members made their gifts in memory of the Rev. Luther

MRS. M. L. RUNYAN IS 95
 Woodland, Wash., Woman Celebrates Birthday With Daughter.

WOODLAND, Wash., March 20.—(Special.)—Mrs. Martha Luella Runyan of Woodland celebrated her 95th birthday here on March 6 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. C. Swart. Mrs. Runyan was born at Buffalo, N. Y., on March 6, 1825. She moved with her parents to Indiana at the age of 11 years, coming down the Ohio river on a log raft on which there was a fireplace of mud built in a cabin, where the cooking was done. She was married to Isaac Runyan at Greencastle, Ind., in 1844 and 11 children were born to them, of whom five are surviving, these being: J. Fletcher Runyan of Ariel, Covington county, Washington; Lulu Painter of Pratt, Kan.; Emma Higdon of Orchard, Clarke county, Washington; Segal Runyan of Garland, Kan., and Hattie M. Swart of Woodland, Wash. There are 31 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren. With her husband and part of the family Mrs. Runyan arrived on Lewis river 28 years ago, and here her husband died in 1888. She has made her home on Lewis river since that time, and until recently lived on the family farm 16 miles from here, now making her home with her daughter, Mrs. Swart. Mrs. Runyan has been in good health until the last winter, but is not well at this time. She was well enough on her birthday, however, to get outside and have her picture taken.
