

NEWBERRY GUILTY; FACES PRISON TERM

Two Years and \$10,000 Fine
Is Senator's Sentence.

CASE WILL BE APPEALED

Brother and Fifteen Campaign
Managers Share in Fate of Con-
victed Michigan Lawmaker.

Contractor who was to South America on business before government officials could serve him with a warrant.

Ninety days was granted the attorneys for the convicted men in which to perfect an appeal. Then court adjourned.

Judge Sessions overruled a motion for a new trial pending an appeal.

Defense Testimony Decides.
Testimony offered by the defense was the determining factor in bringing the jury to the verdict of guilty.

Without Paul King's testimony that he told Senator Newberry the campaign would cost \$5,000, the government had a weak case, and without the King-Newberry letters no case at all. "I said one of the jurors 'We could find no other way, however, after the defense itself had supplemented the scanty government proof that Newberry had taken an active part in the campaign and shown by his own writings that he directed almost every important move.'"

"We are all with you, senator," said several freed defendants as they crowded around him. The chief figure in the trial grasped their hands. His wife, brother and son were with him. Mrs. Newberry, showing the effects of the verdict only the determined composure with which she met the tearful condolences of wives of other defendants.

"Fight Has Only Begun."
What tears there were appeared in fact only among the wives of men who had been freed.

"The fight has only begun," said Chief Counsel Martin of the defense, and his thought was echoed by Martin W. Littleton of New York. The eastern attorney added that the finding had been "a great shock" to him.

The verdict was described as almost exact justice by Frank C. Bailey and W. H. Elchorn, attorneys who have been in charge of the defense since the case. In addition Mr. Bailey announced that the second indictment returned by the special grand jury last November would not be pressed. This true bill charged a conspiracy to commit perjury in connection with the statements filed by Senator Newberry with the secretary of the senate before and after the primary election.

Senator Not Ashamed.
The senator said: "I am proud of the fact that the record in this case contains nothing of which I need be ashamed."

"No proof of fraud, bribery or other despicable crimes was produced, and I am convicted under a law that is not thoroughly understood and whose interpretation by the court is open to further adjudication. Under the law I was made a conspirator if I had knowledge that my campaign was going to cost others more than myself more than \$500. That, to my mind, is the nub of the whole thing."

"Being conscious of no criminal conduct, unless after conference with my senatorial associates, they deem it inadvisable, I will continue to represent in the United States senate the people who elected me. I have no personal wish to crowd myself into the senate, but I will continue to hold my membership until the senate itself or the highest court in the land decides otherwise."

Truman H. Newberry was elected United States senator from Michigan by a majority of 757 votes over Henry Ford, according to the official report of the state canvassing board. The figures announced were: Newberry, 229,551; Ford, 212,487, one of the closest races ever recorded in a Michigan senatorial election. First formal charges of irregularities in the 1918 campaign came January 6, 1919, when Henry Ford filed with the senate an appeal for a recount. He alleged improper use of the mails by the Newberry campaign committee, intimidation of voters, improper rejection of ballots, and charged that at least 16,000 ballots were unlawfully counted for Newberry. He charged that many election boards included intense partisans of Newberry.

Charges of "fraud and corruption" also were made by Lieutenant-Governor L. D. Dickinson, and it was on these charges, according to the federal department of justice, that the grand jury inquiry was ordered.

The jury returned the indictments November 19, naming Senator Newberry and 154 others, including virtually every man connected with the campaign. This list, however, was narrowed down to 85 after the trial got under way, more than eight weeks ago.

Testimony was concluded one week ago, the prosecution having occupied five weeks in presenting its proofs, while the defense used less than two. Court stenographers reported when the case went to the jury that the record contained 512 pages averaging 240 words a page.

Ford Makes No Comment.

DETROIT, Mich., March 20.—(Special.) Ford, democratic opponent of Truman H. Newberry in the 1918 senatorial campaign, declined to discuss the conviction of Senator Newberry and his associates tonight. Asked for a statement, Mr. Ford said he had nothing to say at this time, either as to the Newberry case or the forthcoming recount of ballots cast in the election.

Government Timber Desired.

EUGENE, Or., March 20.—(Special.) Application for the purchase of over 1,250,000 feet of timber in the Sitka national forest has been received by R. S. Shelley, supervisor of the forest. The timber lies 12 or 14 miles above Gardiner on Snake river, and consists of 1,224,000 feet of Douglas fir, 66,000 feet of cedar and 46,000 spruce. The applicants are W. Wagoner and H. Hudson, who are said to be contemplating logging as soon as they obtain possession.

Runaway Boys Are Caught.

Elmer Sterns and Jack McCusky, two 14-year-old boys, who are said to have admitted taking money from their parents at Eugene for a runaway trip to Portland, were arrested at the union station yesterday by Patrolman Cameron. "You have seen about everything outside of the jail here now, so you might as well see that," the officer is said to have told them. They were turned over to the juvenile court.

ELKS LIKE NEW HOME SITE

ERECTION OF TEMPLE TO COST
\$500,000 IS FORECAST.

Acquisition of Joseph Schemanski
Property, Corner Morrison and
Eleventh Streets, Undecided.

Almost universal satisfaction is expressed by members of the Portland lodge of Elks with the purchase of a new site at Eleventh and Alder streets, according to members of the special committee that had this matter under its charge, and erection of a new temple, at a cost of more than half a million dollars within the next few months is forecast.

No plans have been made toward building, and probably nothing will be done until it is decided whether the Joseph Schemanski property on the corner of Morrison and Eleventh streets is to be added to the plot of three lots on Eleventh street, including the corner at Alder, purchased last week. The lodge has an option on the Morrison-street corner until April 1.

It has already been virtually decided that the lodge will erect a combined club and business structure of five or six stories and work of preparing plans will start shortly. The old-filling station occupying the Corbett property purchased by the club last week has a lease demanding 30 days' notice, so actual building construction cannot start before expiration of this period. Otherwise the land is free of incumbrances of this nature.

That the site is an unusually choice one was the opinion of members of the building committee, who felt that the new Elks temple will stand in the line of expansion of the retail business district. With the purchase of the property the work of the special committee on a site comes to a conclusion and a new committee will probably be named to have charge of building plans and construction.

Articles of Incorporation Filed by

Formation of the board of directors and election of officers of the Portland Service league was effected yesterday, following the filing of articles of incorporation under which will be organized and put into working shape a comprehensive plan for promoting civic activities. The plan for the league grew out of experience in community work during the period of the war. A year ago it was proposed by H. W. Kent, who gave to a few friends the outline of the idea, and thereafter leaders in the various civic organizations became interested and joined in perfecting the outline until it has become an accomplished fact.

The officers heading the corporation are: George L. Baker, mayor of Portland, honorary president, Ira L. Roseburg, president, and a number of other prominent citizens.

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WOOD LOUISIANA'S CHOICE

LOWDEN SECOND IN PRESIDENTIAL POLL TAKEN.

Casual Reports Indicate Informal
Character of Republican Or-
ganization in State.

NEW YORK, March 20.—(Special.) Major-General Leonard Wood received a majority of all the "first choice" ballots returned to the Sun and New York Herald in its poll of the parish chairmen of the regular republican organization in Louisiana. His percentage was 60. The state is divided into parishes instead of counties.

Frank O. Lowden came out in second place with some interest shown in Pershing for first choice. Of the "second choice" votes cast Lowden got 50 per cent and Wood 20 per cent, while Senator Borah was also mentioned.

Louisiana was the only state so far where the percentage of returns received was not satisfactory, indicating the highly informal and casual character of the regular organization. Special correspondents indicate that the leaders have not shown any particular leanings toward any candidate, but the candidate who can promise the most federal patronage will be likely to attract the interest of the delegation, it is intimated.

The delegation of 12 which the regular organization will send to Chicago is composed of six white men and six negroes. They were elected at a state convention, which gave no instructions for president, but provided that Walter Cohen, a negro, should be chairman of the delegation and Emile Kuntz, a white man, should be returned to the national committee.

The convention, which was held in New Orleans, was attended by about 150 negroes and less than one dozen white men, according to reports from correspondents.

A tiny white republican organization was formed in Louisiana 10 days ago made up of some of the leading men in the state and it is possible that it will send a delegation to Chicago to contest for the seats with the old organization, which is known as the "black and tan" group.

Under the title of the National Republican League of Louisiana the organization was perfected last week, with Pearl Wright, a leading business man of New Orleans, at its head. Mr. Wright says the National Republican league has no decided course of action. Nor has it decided on a choice for the presidential nomination.

Frank H. Hitchcock, the newly appointed head of the Wood boom, who is credited with having considerable strength in some of the southern states, has little influence in Louisiana it is reported.
