Frocks for Indoors Bright.
Besides the boardwalk raiment there must be several dainty frocks for indoor wear, for luncheon and dinner hour and for the evening. Most of the hotels feature dancing in the evening and the big Saturday night balls demand very smart dance frocks. Here are three ready to be packed for a sojourn at the Easter Mecca.

One is of peachblow chiffon taffeta with a bodice coming over the skirt, basque fashion, and the skirt all tulle with tiny chiffon ruffles, pleated edge. Another is of black satin with a tie-around basque that drapes at the waistline and descends almost to the hip, tying in a sashbow at the back. At each side of the skirt are bouffant draperies of black tulle, and across the front of the skirt is an apron of cream lace weighted with jet fringe. From side-to-side this frock has a wide silhouette because of the extended tulle draperies, but from back to front the silhouette is extremely flat and narrow.

The third evening frock is of soft, ribbed silk in a delicate jade tone. The bodice, suspended from shoulder straps of jet beads, drapes low over the waistline and, under the bodice edge at one hip, amusingly reminding of the tucked-under handkerchief that old ladies used to display beneath the basque-edge, is thrust a tuft of black netting. The skirt is draped in long folds that give width at the hip but swathe the ankles closely and at the back the drapery descends in a narrow train.

Many of the afternoon frocks have quite a decided decoletage which is usually relieved by a narrow collar of white lace or of eyelid embroidered linen in white or pale ecru. Chiffon taffeta is the favored material for these frocks, for georgette with narrow pleatings of the taffeta on tulle, skirt flounces and elbow sleeve. Always the elbow sleeve and its length may be just below the elbow, covering the joint or several edges short of the elbow—depending on the beauty of the arm.

Long Collars Being Used on New Blouses.

Sometimes Vest Effect Is Added to Square Neck Opening in New Type of Apparel.

IF YOU make your spring blouses at home, remember to have the collar come well down at the front and keep it quite narrow at the top where it goes around the neck. These long, narrow collars are smart just now. Sometimes they give a square neck opening, a little vest effect running up between the sides of the collar. Sometimes they give a V-shaped collar meeting at the point of the V. New blouses of high distinction are of very fine handkerchief linen, sheer and delicate, but of course much more beautiful and lustrous in weave because of the linen threads and the long collars are of the same material, delicately edged with hand-crochet lace, narrow flit or a tiny hemstitched band of linen in color. When this dainty line of collar is used on the collar, it appears also on the cuffs and in small covered buttons down the front of the blouse. Such models, of tailored type, have long sleeves with cuffs at the wrist. Tunic blouses and kimono blouses with surplice fronts that tie around the waist in a sash often have loose elbow sleeves. Such blouses are made of printed crepe, of chiffon, of georgette and of dotted swiss trimmed with lace.

New Tablecloth Camouflages Square Table.

Circular Appearance Given by Use of Clearly Defined Design.

THERE is a new tablecloth for a square table that gives the effect of a round table. The design is circular, its edge coming just about to the edge of an ordinary square dining table, and the pattern is clearly defined, leaving just a triangular section at each of the four corners of the table in plain unpatterned damask. Candelsticks may be set in these plain corner sections and the circular design gives a round-table effect. Another new pattern shows the tablecloth well covered by an elaborate design which leaves a circle of plain damask in the center—like a centerpiece.

And no extra centerpiece of embroidered linen or lace is necessary with this handsome cloth. Indeed it would spoil the effect. This is the time of times to purchase table damasks, for stocks, so depleted during the war, are being filled up with new and beautiful patterns. To housewives who have been mending and mending their table linens and having their worn-out tablecloths laundered with greatest care, these fresh, beautiful new damasks, coming in so plentifully now, look very attractive indeed.

Small Breakfast Linen Set Cheery One.

Half-Bleached Art Outfit Is Most Attractive One.

For the small breakfast table in a three-and-bath apartment, when one does not want to lay a formal table more than once a day, since books and lamp must be removed from the large center table so that the damask sets cheerfully embroidered in bright color are delightful.

SELF-SUPPORTING STUDENTS ARE NUMEROUS AMONG GIRLS

Outside Occupations Not Regarded as Any Bar to Taking Prominent Part in Many Activities Connected With College Life.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, March 21.
(Special).—Whirr! Whirr! Whirr!
What is that rhythmic noise heard as she walks along the corridor? Only the whirl of an electric motor attached to a sewing machine and operated by a small, dark-haired girl with snappy black eyes, who makes and designs dresses for college girls who are too busy to do the work for themselves or who can afford to pay someone to do their sewing for them. She gets so much to do that she is dated up weeks in advance. This girl is only one of the dozens of young women who are earning their way through college either in whole or in part.
All of the dining room help in both Waldo and Cauthorn, the women's halls of residence, are students who receive pay in proportion to the number of hours they put in. The average for monthly checks to these girls is \$25.50. Other women take care of the halls and parlors. Some girls living in the halls work three hours a day for residents of Corvallis in return for which they receive their board.
Paper Revision Not Popular.
Who is the responsible-looking girl with the bundle of "blue books" under her arm making her way toward the hall? She is only one of the many students who earn considerable money revising and correcting "ex" papers of overworked "profs." For this she receives 40 cents an hour. It is hard to find students to do this work since, contrary to what might be expected, the work is not popular. Girls with a knowledge of stenography and typewriting find plenty of opportunity to turn their spare time into cash, receiving from 30 to 60 cents an hour. Downtown stores and offices furnish employment for a considerable number, especially on Saturdays. "Chem sharks" of a previous year help out not only their pocket-books but also help solve the problem of lack of instructors and assistants in the laboratories.
Down on the "press bench" during

the basketball game one woman is seen with the many men who are reporting the game for either college or Portland papers. She is the only woman sport writer on the campus and handles all of the college news for one Portland paper. She is a senior, president of her sorority, member of several important committees and last year was a vice-president of the student body. One other woman news correspondent handles general news for the Oregonian and makes more than spending money besides participating in other student activities.

Assistant From Senior Class.
House managers of the different sororities in almost every case receive their board in return for the work they do. Some houses follow the plan of having an assistant manager elected from the junior class who is getting ready for the manager's job the next year. In this case the financial returns are divided in proportion to the time put into the work. Trained stenographers have no difficulty in finding more work than they can do. One girl earns about \$20 by putting in her time and by working in the summer earns \$100 a month. Competent students to correct test papers are impossible to find in sufficient numbers. Residents of the city complain that they can't secure help from among the students in the amount desirable.
