

4 MORE FILE FOR MULTNOMAH RACE

Korrell, Wells, Hindman and Katz Seek Election.

ENTRIES ARE ANNOUNCED

Declarations as Candidates for Legislature Are Forwarded to Secretary of State.

Four more candidates for the legislature appeared from Multnomah yesterday. These have forwarded their declarations to the secretary of state and each of the four seeks nomination in the republican primaries. They are Franklin F. Korrell, Harvey Wells, Charles Hindman and Alma D. Katz. Mr. Korrell, ex-service man and vice president of the Multnomah Bar association, announced his slogan as "Will support laws which develop the state, promote education and lower taxes. His platform said he would "vote and work for the enactment of laws which tend to develop the natural and agricultural resources of the state, improve roadways, encourage and establish of new industries and aid those which are here, which invite the investment of capital and operation of factories; which give a square deal to the laboring men, women and children; which safeguard the investment and use of public funds; which promote education; which preserve Americanism, and which reduce the taxes in the interest of real economy. His platform said he would "vote and work for the enactment of laws which tend to develop the natural and agricultural resources of the state, improve roadways, encourage and establish of new industries and aid those which are here, which invite the investment of capital and operation of factories; which give a square deal to the laboring men, women and children; which safeguard the investment and use of public funds; which promote education; which preserve Americanism, and which reduce the taxes in the interest of real economy.

Wells Thinks He is Qualified.

"For a greater Portland and greater Oregon," was given as the slogan of Mr. Wells. Mr. Wells was formerly state insurance commissioner. In his statement he said that his past experience in state office has qualified him to distinguish between the legislation that is imperative and measures that should not be passed. "I pledge myself," said Mr. Wells, "to the voters to represent their interests and the welfare of the people of Multnomah county and the state of Oregon. I will give no consideration to the merits of any issue placed before me and will support the proper economic development of the resources of the great state of Oregon. I will render all possible assistance to the enactment of safety first legislation and thereby preserve and protect the lives and safety, not only of children, but adults as well.

Mr. Katz Insurance Man.

Mr. Katz, insurance man and president of the Oregon Dairymen's league, takes the slogan, "Justice to the business man and the farmer alike." In his platform he said the next legislative session would have important duties in straightening out tangled taxation problems. "It will be concerned," said his platform, "with questions vitally affecting business, agriculture and, particularly, dairying. As a business man and a farmer who owns a large dairy ranch, I believe that I can be of service to the people of Oregon in the state legislature. I have, therefore, decided to become a candidate. I favor a divided session of the state legislature. I believe there should be more business and less politics in administering state affairs.

Hindman Deputy Attorney.

Mr. Hindman, ex-deputy city attorney and former deputy district attorney, was born in Pennsylvania and has been a resident of Portland for 10 years. He obtained the first and only conviction in the state of a person on a charge of assault and battery for injuring another person by reckless driving of an automobile and obtained the first conviction in Oregon of a person charged with manslaughter by driving an automobile when intoxicated, and killing another person. He fathered the recent act regulating operators of motor vehicles to be licensed. In his platform Mr. Hindman promises to vote against "last-minute legislation" not carefully considered and to vote against measures of doubtful merit. He said he favors a budget system for state offices and favored a law enabling the state to purchase bonds of its subdivisions from any private bidder.

CHURCH PENNIES STOLEN

PASTOR REPORTS \$200 IN SMALL CHANGE MISSING.

Easter Contribution at St. Mark's. Left for Time in House Adjoining, Disappears.

Easter contributions at St. Mark's Episcopal church, Twenty-first and Lovejoy streets, last Sunday estimated at \$200, were taken from the desk in the study of Rev. J. G. Hatten, 235 North Twenty-first street, adjoining the church. The police have been advised and inspectors are endeavoring to find the thieves.

Rev. Mr. Hatten told the police that he left the contributions wrapped in a paper on his desk when he went to the church for the 9 o'clock service. When he returned at 11:30 the money was missing.

Several members of the church were in the house at the time the minister returned to the church. He said he suspected none of them. The money included \$50 in small change and about \$150 in envelopes.

Burglars entered the home of Mrs. C. Campbell, 1250 Thurman street, Friday night or yesterday morning and escaped with clothing and other articles valued at several hundred dollars, according to report yesterday. The stolen articles included five suits, a suitcase and a pair of shoes.

Someone broke into a skee-ball parlor at 422 Union avenue, but nothing was missed. The police were advised that a house at 921 East Franklin street was broken into. The intruders were frightened away.

CONRAD P. OLSON IN RACE

CHOICE AS REPUBLICAN DELEGATE IS SOUGHT.

Declaration Contains Promise to Support Candidate Carrying State of Oregon.

Conrad P. Olson yesterday announced his candidacy as a delegate to the republican national convention, from the state at large. Since coming to Portland Judge Olson has taken an active part in republican politics. He served two terms in the legislature as a representative from Multnomah county and one term as a state senator from Multnomah. In the legislature he was one of the leaders. The late Governor Whytcomb appointed him justice of the supreme court to fill a vacancy caused by the death of Justice Moore. He was appointed by the supreme court to codify the laws of Oregon. Born in Wisconsin, Judge Olson was the principal of a high school and

Sportsmen Declare War and Drive Takes Place Today.

"Shags," a species of cormorant, are invading the territory around Ten-Mile lake in such numbers this year that they are taking thousands of young trout daily and sportsmen of Coos county are coming to the rescue. Deputy Game Warden Thomas yesterday wired the fish and game commission office to ask if financial assistance would be given for the purchase of ammunition. He was allowed \$50 for this purpose. Boats on the lake will be free for the first drive, to be held today. Although shags have always been plentiful along the coast, it is unusual for the sportsmen to unite in ridding any district of them.

FLYING FIELD WANTED

Baker Proposes to Have Landing Places for Planes.

BAKER, Or., April 10.—(Special.)—The board of directors of the Baker county chamber of commerce discussed the matter of securing a flying field for use by cross-country airplanes of the government and of private individuals, at a regular meeting last night. Several good fields are in view, and the necessary steps will be taken when the proper time comes. The secretary of the chamber was instructed to try for a better train service from the east. The chamber was asked to send a suitable lumber exhibit for the Oregon exhibition in Portland, and the Baker lumbermen have all pledged their support to such an exhibit.

Engine Victim Unidentified.

HOOD RIVER, Or., April 10.—(Special.)—The body of a man who was killed Thursday afternoon by a switch engine remains unidentified. The man, about medium height, seemed about 40 years old. From the description it is thought perhaps the victim may have been a man recently held in The Dalles for a time because of queer actions that indicated insanity. The Dalles authorities have been asked the name of the recent prisoner and an effort will be made to reach his relatives. The accident victim was well dressed. The only clew that might lead to an identification was the perforated monogram, "J. D. McL." in his hat band.
