Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Leonard entertained informally Tuesday evening at the Hotel Portland with a small dinner party. Covers were placed for seven.

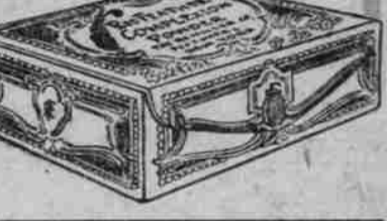

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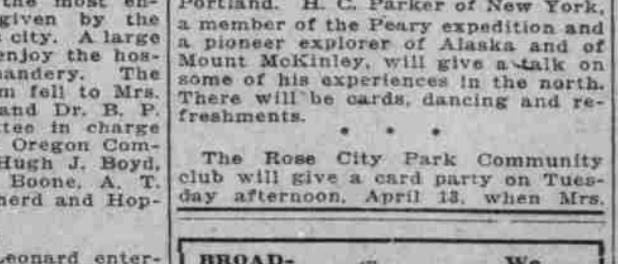
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
