AS SEEN BY CAMERA

THE U. S. S. Tennessee, now being completed at the Brooklyn navy yard, will be ready for commission during the present month. New designs have been adopted for the fighting tops, equipped with appliances found useful in the world war. It is the most powerful dreadnaught of the American navy and has a battery of 12 14-inch guns. The huge ship is scheduled to make a trip to the West Indies, through the Panama canal and possibly visit the Pacific coast.

General Dementz was the French commander of the forces that occupied Frankfort. The populace of the German city did not greet the troops of France with acclamations of joy, but no organized resistance was made.

Dr. Frederick H. Miller and Harvey L. Garmer were defeated in their effort to establish wireless connection with the residents of Mars. The apparatus was installed in the Garmer home near Cedar Creek, Neb., employing "dead" telegraph wires extending over many miles of territory as antennae.

When Signor Marconi sailed from England on his yacht to endeavor to solve the problem of mysterious sounds that have disturbed the wireless, he was accompanied by Lady Marconi. He declared that it was not in an attempt to communicate with Mars that he was making the experiments, though he has been quoted as regarding that there is a possibility of achieving such communication.

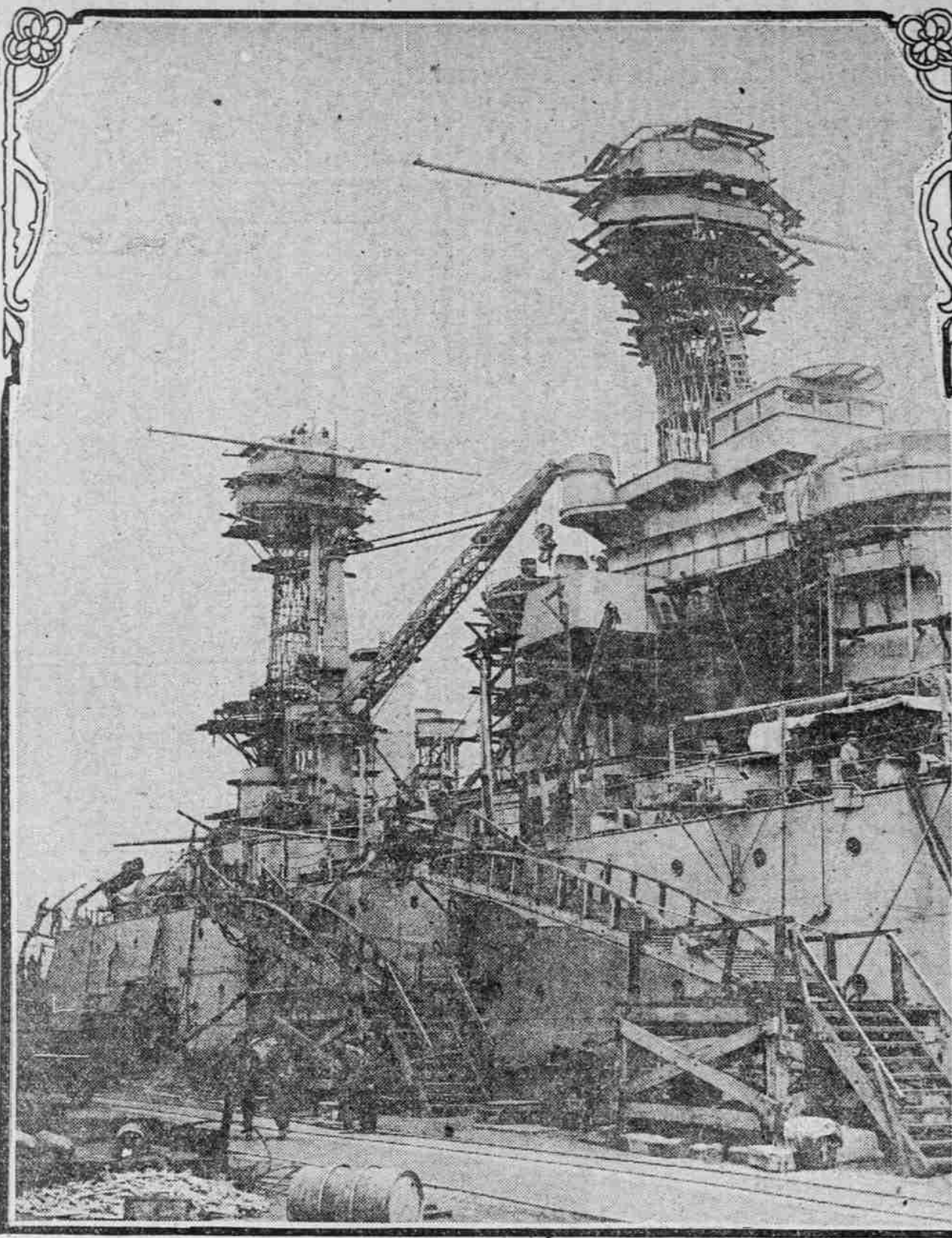

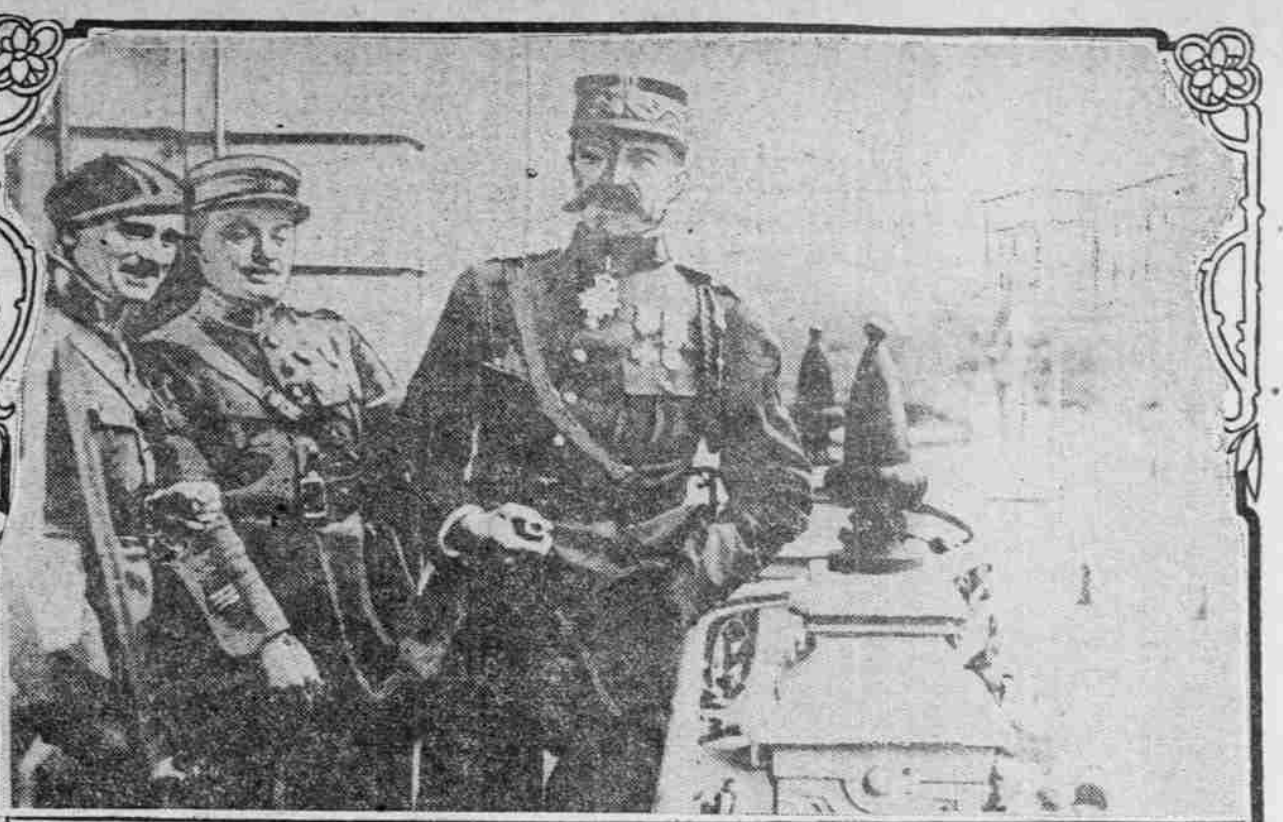

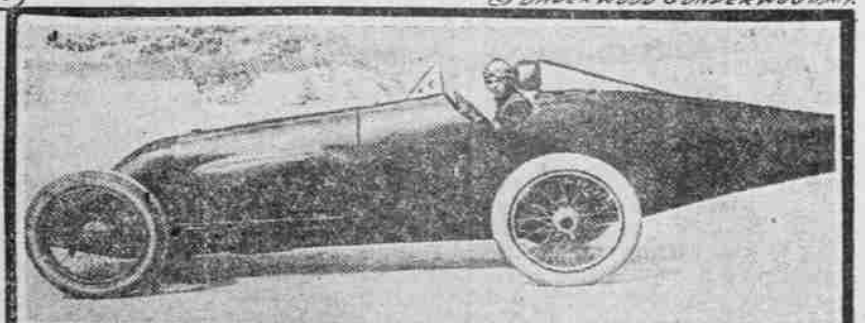
