**SYNDICALISM DEFENSE INSISTS
ON HAVING VANDERVEER.**

**Postponement of Trials Until Attorney
Returns to Portland
Is Petitioned.**

Twenty affidavits were filed yesterday by Industrial Workers of the World, indicted under the criminal syndicalism act, asking for the fourth time that their trials be postponed to permit them to be represented by Attorney George F. Vanderveer and none other. The cases were set for May 29 but they have not been called because it was known the affidavits were in course of preparation.

In these affidavits the I. W. W. ask that their cases be not set by the presiding judge until after June 15, because Attorney Vanderveer is now in Chicago and will be unable to appear in their defense before that time. Since the affidavits were prepared, word has been received from Attorney Vanderveer that he cannot possibly arrive in Portland before June 20.

It has been the intention of Presiding Judge McCourt to hold no more jury trials after June 17 until the fall term in September but if the I. W. W. cases are ready, special venire may be called during the summer months. About 12 of the I. W. W. making the affidavits are still in the county jail, where they have been since the first of the year awaiting trial. All the delays in getting early hearings have been on their own motions. It is expected that those still in jail will be able to furnish bail by the end of this month. The affidavits were filed by Attorney H. M. Esterly, who is not appearing in the cases. "I do not desire to appoint any attorney to defend me," read all the affidavits.

COURTESY WINS ESTATE

**Samuel Nudelman, Expressman, Is
Remembered in Will.**

Constant acts of courtesy endeared Samuel Nudelman, an expressman, to the late Hans Anderson, with the result that the will of Anderson, filed for probate yesterday, leaves his entire estate of \$5000 to the expressman after the life trusteeship of the widow, Mrs. Johanna Anderson. The will refers to Charles J. Schnabel, attorney, as "my friend," and advises the widow to consult with him on legal matters.

Mr. Anderson met Attorney Schnabel in a court action in which the lawyer appeared for the other side. His courteous treatment of Mr. Anderson won him regard to such an extent that the attorney later received a gold-headed walking stick from Mr. Anderson.

PASTOR GOING TO LONDON

**Rev. R. H. Sawyer to At-
tend World Congress.**

**Trip Being Made in Response to
Request Received to Address
Anglo-Israel Gathering.**

Rev. R. H. Sawyer, pastor of the East Side Christian church, and his elder daughter, Miss Jessie Lynne Sawyer, will leave Wednesday for New York, whence they will sail June 12, aboard the White Star liner "Lapland."

The trip is to be made in response to an invitation received some weeks ago by Mr. Sawyer to be one of the speakers at the first Anglo-Israel world congress to be held in the Kensington town hall, London, opening July 5 and continuing throughout that week. Mr. Sawyer has made a long and concentrated study of prophecy and the Anglo-Israel question and has spoken and written on the subject to a considerable extent. He is among the prominent contributors to The Watchman of Israel, a New York periodical published in the interest of this movement which is widely read throughout the world and it is through his writings in this magazine that the invitation came

to speak at this world congress. Mr. Sawyer's subject will be "The Coming Anglo-American Alliance," of which phase of the Anglo-Israel movement he has made a profound study.

Miss Jessie Sawyer, who is a gifted singer, will contribute to the programme. On their return to this country Mr. Sawyer will deliver several lectures in Boston and New York, before returning to Portland. They will be absent from Portland two months. The members of the East Side Christian church gave Mr. Sawyer and his daughter a large reception Thursday evening.

Government Market to be Opened.

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 29.—(Special.)—A government meat market is to be established in the Washington public market, Sixth and Washington streets, where frozen meat will be sold at cost plus overhead expenses. This meat will be secured from the Portland area to be operated by the government. The actual price to be charged is not yet known here.

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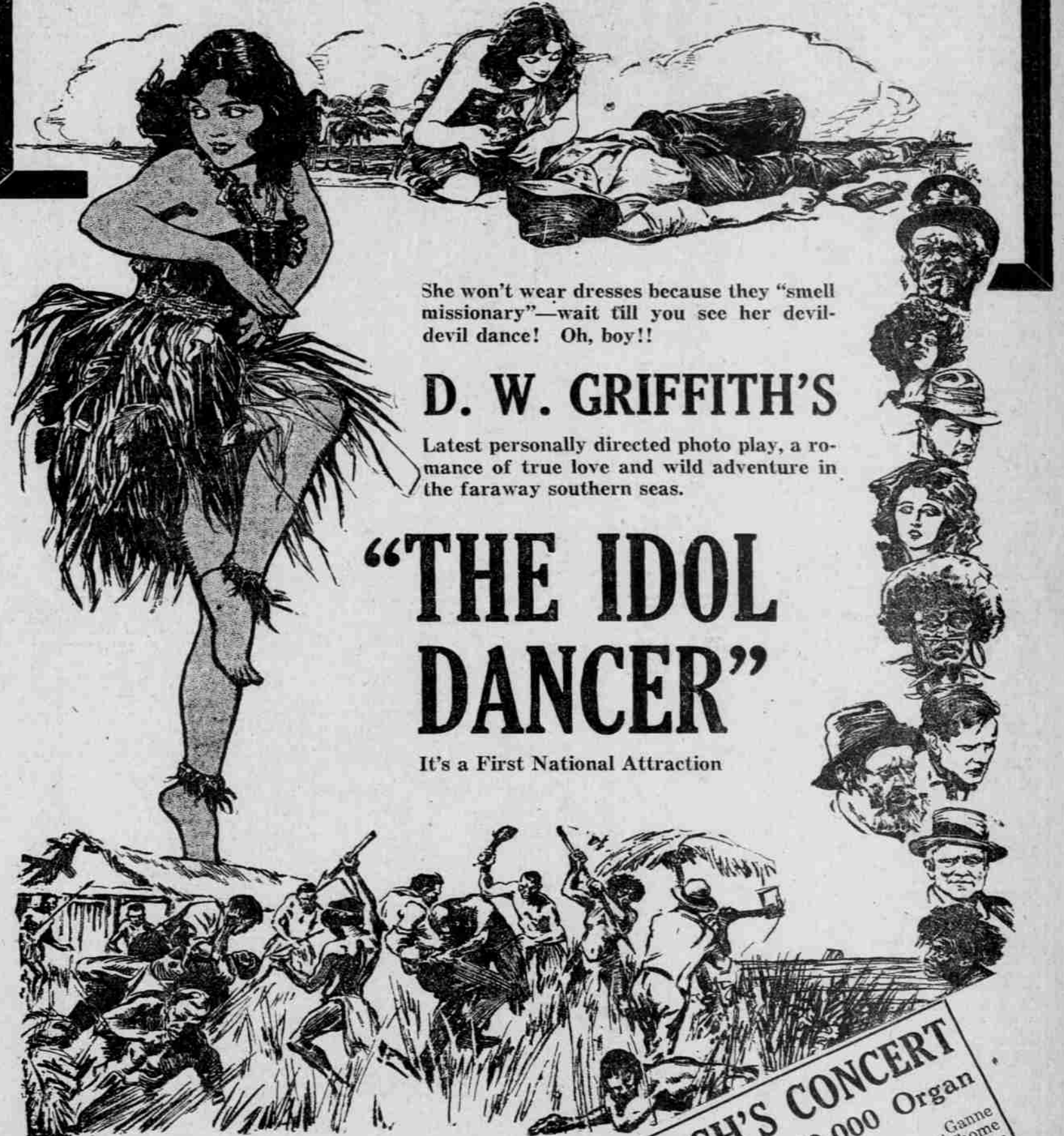
