

SALEM SHRINE CLUB TO BE HOST JUNE 23

Trip From Portland to Be
Made in Autos.

1000 MOTOR CARS NEEDED

Highway Commission May Make
Special Effort to Eliminate
Rough Detours.

SALEM, Or., May 29.—(Special.)—Letters to 150 Shrine potentates throughout the United States went out this week from the Commercial club here at the instance of the Arabian Knights Shrine club of Salem calling attention to the day when Salem will pay its respects to the mystic organization—June 23.

Through this method of sending the letters to the potentates, members of every temple will be apprised of the Salem Shrine club's enterprise and will be told that they will be taken through some of the finest loganberry sections, hop yards and prune sections of the United States.

That the motorists who contribute cars to the use of the Shrine club on their trip to this city, may have interrupted travel from Portland to Oregon's capital and not be bothered with detours at places where the highway is being improved, the state highway commission is considering plans to enable passage through on the Pacific highway without detour. This matter of eliminating detour when the Shrine caravan moves this way along the highway was taken up with the commission Monday.

Arrangement Believed Likely.
The commission would make no definite statement concerning the proposal, other than they believed it could be done and that it will arrive to make the desired arrangements.

Several auto owners in the city of Salem have not yet notified the Shrine club of their desire to register their cars for the use of the Shrine club, due to rough roads around Chemawa in making the detour around the scene of improvements, as now under way. It is believed that this assurance of the highway commission that something will be done, if possible, to eliminate this unsatisfactory condition will lend impetus to the registration of automobiles for use when the Shrine club comes here.

The commission has announced that the contract time for completing the highway improvements north of Salem to connect with the other pavement six miles north is August 15. It is believed that about two miles will have been paved by the time the Shrine club comes here in June. The commission stated that it is believed that the entire task of paving the stretch would be completed before the contract date.

1000 Autos Needed.
The Arabian Knights Shrine club aided by the Chemawa and other civic organizations, stands sponsor for obtaining 1000 motor cars in which to transport the thousands of guests from Portland to the capital city and return.

A luncheon will be served on the lawn of the capitol and the guests will be entertained in the city from the time of their arrival, about noon, until they leave for Portland on the return trip late in the afternoon. This trip is to be made June 23 for those guests who are not of the uniformed men, the patriots, bands and chasers, who are to be the guests of Portland at the Oaks amusement park, where will be held the water sports of the Shrine programme. There will be surf boat riding, high and fancy diving and the bathing girls' parade.

CATTLE TOUR ARRANGED

Linn, Benton and Lane Breeders to
Visit Shorthorn Herds.

ALBANY, Or., May 29.—(Special.)—Arrangements are complete for the tour through Linn county next Tuesday when the leading Shorthorn herds of the county will be visited. Breeders from Lane and Benton counties

will join those of Linn county on the trip. A. E. Lawson of Spokane, an officer of the American Shorthorn association, and members of the faculty of Oregon Agricultural college will make the trip.

The farms to be visited follow: C. C. Bryant, near Albany; Curtis Cole, near Albany; McCormick Bros., north of Lebanon, where the herd of R. C. Burkhardt as well as of McCormick Bros. will be inspected; O. K. Blatchford, near Plainview; W. C. Obermeyer and John Grell, who reside on adjoining farms east of Tangent, where the caravan will stop for lunch; J. B. Cornett, east of Shedd; C. Davidson, south of Shedd; George N. Auman, south of Tangent; Feiler Bros., between Tangent and Albany.

At the Davidson farm the herds of Mr. Davidson and T. J. Dannen and Ralph Dannen will be inspected and a beef cattle judging demonstration will be conducted by Professor Nelson of Oregon Agricultural college. The Boys' and Girls' Shorthorn Club of Shedd will exhibit calves to the tourists at the Davidson farm also.

LABOR OUT \$725,000,000

STRIKES DURING SINGLE YEAR
PROVE EXPENSIVE.

Candidate Denounces "Scorpions"
Stirring Up Envy and Hate
Throughout Country.

TACOMA, Wash., May 29.—(Special.)—Statistics to show that labor in the United States has lost \$725,000,000 in one year through the activities of agitators within the union ranks, were quoted by Colonel Roland H. Hartley, Everett lumberman, candidate for the republican nomination for governor, at the Pierce county republican club Friday. Colonel Hartley was speaking on what he termed the necessity of combating the "scorpions" from stirring up envy and hate in the rank and file of organized labor. Industry lost \$1,250,000,000 on account of agitators, he declared.

"It is the business of the agitators of this state to misrepresent me," Colonel Hartley said. "They say that I am a 'labor hater.' We have between 1100 and 1200 lumbermen and loggers employed in our camps and I haven't an enemy among them. I want to say that between 70 and 80 per cent of the members of organized labor in this state are loyal to their country. We have union and non-union men in our employment and I demand the right of any man to work for me whether he belongs to a union or not."

"The man who belongs to the Triple alliance or the Non-partisan league, whether he is a bolshevik, socialist or anarchist, who says he is going into the primaries to attempt to capture the republican party, is in my judgment, no better than a thief who goes under cover of night and steals money from your home. He lies to himself, his God and the people of his state."

"CHEATERS" ARE OUSTED

Washington Students Found Guilty
of Exam Offense Suspended.

UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON, Seattle, May 29.—(Special.)—John T. Condon, dean of faculties, has approved the recommendation of the student discipline committee that certain students who have been found guilty of cheating be suspended for the remainder of the quarter. The students were suspended Wednesday. The campaign to force the honor system in examinations was begun by student leaders of the campus. Seven organizations have voted to uphold the system and "call" any student whom they catch cheating.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 29.—(Special.)—The latest in journalistic instruction in the industrial department here is the publishing of a real newspaper by students in the courses. Arrangements have been made for the students to publish one issue of the Gazette-Times and the entire issue will be in their hands, advertising, headlines, make-up, editorials and all. Professor F. L. Snow and J. McIntosh of the department of industrial journalism have secured the co-operation of the management of the newspaper and will let the students do the work.

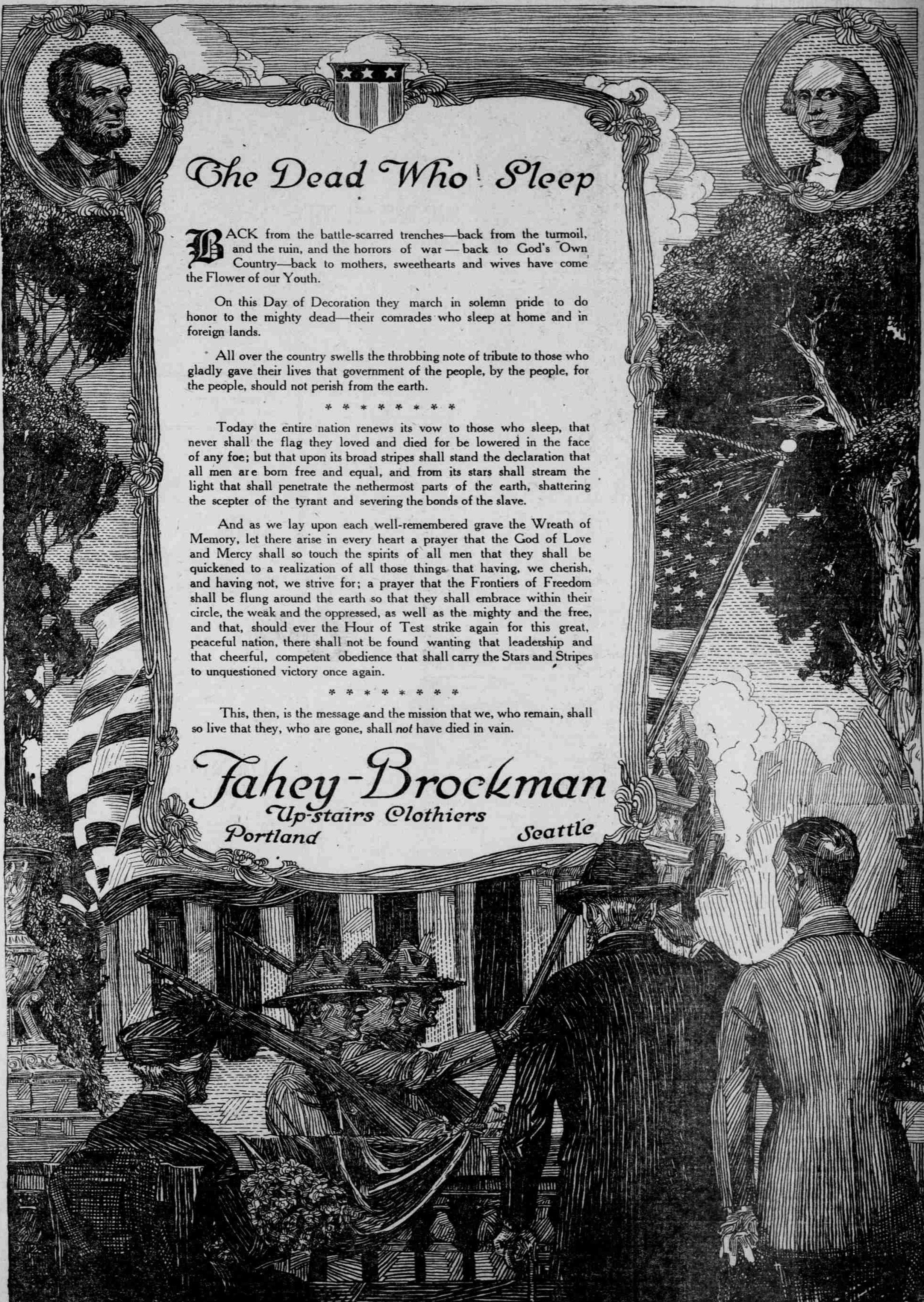
