The marriage of Miss Luwemma Ryan and George W. Miller was solemnized on Saturday of last week in the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Ryan, Rev. J. J. Staub officiating.

The first organized work for the children of Serbia was begun last week, when Mrs. A. Morrison, state chairman, and Mrs. Edmond C. Giltner, executive chairman of the Serbian Child Welfare association, took first steps to form a committee of 100. Each member of this committee is being asked to pledge herself responsible for the adoption of three Serbian orphans. Mrs. Oliver Harriman, national chairman and known as the American godmother for Serbian orphans, has given each state its proportionate share of the work. Oregon, according to her reckoning, must be responsible for 300 of the 70,000 Serbian children who are today without either fathers or mothers and the 300,000 who are fatherless. It is hoped that Portland women and those living throughout the state will recognize the need of sending aid to these children and will voluntarily become members of the committee. Already checks are being received. Those who would care to work on the committee or to aid by sending smaller checks should communicate with either Mrs. Morrison or Mrs. Giltner.

Efforts will be made to have women who have time and inclination earn the money for this cause by their own efforts, such as giving a series of teas or banquets with others and giving a bazaar or benefit. Later the cause will be presented to Sunday school and educational organizations. The cost of keeping a Serbian orphan during the year which started June 1 is \$75. This money goes directly to the children, as the cost of organization and operation has been subscribed through personal gifts. Edward Cookingham is treasurer for the Portland activities and will care for all money subscribed in the state. The movement has been endorsed by the United States government, the Hoover food administration and the Red Cross.

With the organization of Oregon in this national movement it is the first work which this state has officially done for Serbia. The one possible exception to this is the work which Mrs. A. Morrison carried on during the war, personally directing the gathering and making of 15,000 blankets.
