

PARTY CHIEFS PLAN TO NOURSE WILSON

Cummings Says Convention Will Approve Course.

PRESIDENT IS PRAISED

National Committee Chairman Declares Republican Stand on League Is Dishonest.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.—(Special.)—Cummings, chairman of the democratic national committee, declared today that the democratic platform would endorse President Wilson's course in regard to the league of nations and that the league plank adopted would be the one incorporated in the Virginia platform.

The president, Cummings said, at all times, had agreed to any suggestion the league provisions and his opposition to some of the so-called reservations were that they violated the document.

Republican Stand Rapped.

"The stand of the republican party on the league was a dishonest statement," Cummings said, "a premeditated and calculated attempt to satisfy irreconcilables. At no point did it suggest ratification of the league treaty. It was made up of vague promises of some other kind of league. I feel that the republican position will not deceive anyone."

Cummings also declared that while the republican convention had not disposed of the issue, the party candidate himself already had voted for a league with reservations.

Campaign Hearings Stated.

In regard to Herbert Hoover's statement that he was in accord with Harding's candidacy, Cummings said that was a matter Hoover would have to fight out with his own conscience.

"I consider it a rather sad episode in American politics," he added.

Full hearings of all campaign issues will be held by the resolutions committee, it was announced today.

Ray T. Baker, director of the United States mint and a close friend and supporter of William G. McAdoo, announced today that he would support Attorney-General Palmer, now that his first choice had withdrawn from the race. His announcement was made after receipt of a telegram from McAdoo advising him that he would not be a candidate for the nomination.

CLARK TO BE OFFERED

Missouri Delegate Promises to Propose Nomination.

MONTGOMERY CITY, Mo., June 19.—Representative Champ Clark of the ninth Missouri district, who is in nomination for president at the democratic national convention, it was announced here today.

The announcement was made by Judge Emil P. Rosenberg, delegate to the convention from the ninth district, before leaving his home here for San Francisco.

In the event Clark's name is not presented before the national convention is reached, Judge Rosenberg asserted he would place the ex-speaker in nomination.

Clark, who has represented the ninth district in congress for 26 years, so far has refused to enter the race formally.

Daniels Starts to Session.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Secretary Daniels left tonight for San Francisco to attend the democratic national convention. Assistant Secretary Roosevelt will leave New York tonight as a delegate from that state.

Indianapolis Delegates Leave.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 19.—Approximately 150 persons left Indianapolis this afternoon on the Indiana Democratic club special to attend the democratic national convention at San Francisco.

Maine Delegation on Way.

BOSTON, June 19.—The Maine delegation to the democratic national convention at San Francisco left here today. The party numbered 20.

LAWMAKERS START WEST

House Members to Inspect Parks and Reclamation Projects.

CHICAGO, June 19.—Members of the appropriate committee of the house, headed by Representative James W. Good of Iowa and accompanied by officials of the reclamation and national park service, will leave Chicago tomorrow night on a tour of 18 national parks and reclamation projects in the west.

The party expects to be gone six weeks. This will be the first time in five years that the committee have made a personal inspection of these districts.

The parks and projects to be visited are:

- Nebraska—North Platte reclamation project.
- Colorado—Rocky mountain national park.
- Nevada—Newlands project.
- California—Sequoia national park; Oregon—Crater lake park, Columbia river highway and Umatilla project.
- Washington—Mount Rainier park, Yakima project.
- Idaho—Boise and Minidoka projects and Arrowrock dam.
- Wyoming—Yellowstone park and Shoshone project.
- Montana—Gallatin park and Huntley and Milk river projects.

STORE HEAD ARRESTED

GIMBEL BROTHERS CHARGED WITH PROFITEERING.

Huge Firm Alleged to Have Taken

as High as 275 Per Cent Gain on Clothing.

NEW YORK, June 19.—The arrests here today of Frederick Gimbel, member of Gimbel Bros., which operates large department stores in several cities, and a merchandise manager and clothing buyer of the establishment, will be followed by similar action against a number of other alleged profiteering department store merchants of like importance, it was stated at department of justice "flying squadron" headquarters here tonight.

Other department stores as large as Gimbel's already are under investigation, and federal warrants will be requested as soon as inquiries are completed, Special Agent Price stated.

Mr. Gimbel, merchandise manager J. J. Dowell and Clothing Buyer C. D. Slawter, who were arrested in the Gimbel Bros' cases, were released in \$1000 bail each, pleading not guilty to charges of profiteering on four specific counts alleging profits of 90 to 275 per cent in clothing.

how the money which will be available could best be spent to serve the needs of the community for permanent school buildings. While no definite plans have been drawn up as yet, it was indicated that work of planning the new structures would be pushed ahead rapidly, and that actual construction would begin as soon as the money is available, which will be after the first of next year.

The passage of the law will not prevent the erection of two dozen portables for which bids have already been called, which will cost in the neighborhood of \$50,000, as these structures will be needed to house the school children next fall.

It is conceded that a new high school for St. Johns is a necessity and also that something must be done to relieve the crowding of Jefferson high school. These two problems will doubt receive consideration. Completion of Rose City Park grade school, now pronounced by portables, and something must be done toward a permanent public school in the Buckton neighborhood, the present school building and grounds being privately owned and rented by the school board. These conditions will probably be remedied first and other action taken according to the sum of money remaining available.

The election yesterday was one of the heaviest school elections which Portland has ever witnessed. In spite of that fact, however, the total vote was small in comparison with the recent primary election and not more than 10 per cent of the registered vote came out. The polls were open from 10 o'clock until 8 P. M. and the heaviest voting occurred between 6 and 8 o'clock, when at some polling places voters were standing in line at closing time. All seven of the candidates had put up active campaigns and the interest aroused by the candidates was largely responsible for the vote.

Fourth Estate Editor Dead.

NEW YORK, June 19.—Edwin G. Heath, managing editor of the Fourth Estate and a well-known newspaper man of New York and Boston, died last night at his home in Richmond Hill. It was announced today. He had been ill for several months.

ELECTION CLAIM REFUSED

ATTORNEY-GENERAL DECIDES AGAINST SCHUYLEMAN.

Certificate Refused to Act as Delegate to Democratic National Convention.

SALEM, Or., June 19.—(Special.)—The secretary of state has no legal authority to issue a certificate to John L. Schuyleman of Portland, to represent the democratic party of Oregon at the national convention of the party to be held in San Francisco next week, notwithstanding that his vote was next to that polled by George T. Baldwin of Klamath Falls, who died recently, according to an opinion given by Attorney-General George M. Brown today.

It was held by Mr. Brown that Mr. Schuyleman's case was a proper one to be submitted to the lawful representatives of the democratic party for determination. While not set out in the opinion, the lawful representatives of the democratic party are believed to include the democratic state central committee and the democratic national committee.

Mr. Baldwin was a candidate for delegate to the democratic national convention from the state at large and received the fourth highest vote. He died soon after the primary election, and Mr. Schuyleman, who finished in fifth place, then presented his claim to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Baldwin's death.

Wife of Nominee Approves Campaign Lithographs.

CHICAGO, June 19.—Mrs. Warren G. Harding has personally approved the picture of Senator Harding which will be used by the republican national committee in the coming campaign.

Five million lithographs bearing the picture chosen by the senator's wife are being printed. Distribution will start Monday.

delay to be considered in the preparation of his speech of acceptance, which will be delivered about July 15.

"I was surprised at Senator Harding's wide knowledge of the questions affecting agriculture and was profoundly impressed with the man's sincerity," said Mr. Smith. "I told him that the future of agriculture in the west depended upon the reclamation of arid lands and that to a great extent the future of the entire country lay in that direction. I also set forth the necessity of an improved marketing system, particularly with reference to marketing information."

"Senator Harding paid special heed to what I said regarding reorganization of the department of agriculture. I told him that in my opinion the department should be placed upon a regional basis instead of operating as one bureau away off in Washington. The fallacy of having the agriculture of the country dependent upon bureaus in Washington, which could not possibly be in touch at all times with local agricultural conditions, was stressed."

"I told him of the ludicrous case of an experiment station chief in the northwest who telegraphed to Washington to ascertain if it was not about time to plant potatoes, and the candidate agreed that there was an opportunity for widespread reforms in the government's present executive organization."
