

HARDING TOO BUSY TO TAKE VACATION

Series of Conferences With Leaders Begun.

MANY SEND ASSURANCES

Ex-Rivals for Nomination and Publishers Join in Promising to Support Senator.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Senator Harding, republican presidential nominee, abandoning plans for a vacation at a seaside resort, today decided to remain in Washington until the middle of July, when he will go to his Marion, Ohio, home for the formal notification ceremonies.

Immediately on announcing his decision to forego a rest, the nominee began a series of conferences with party leaders which will continue throughout the preparation of his acceptance address.

Assurances of support were received during the day by Mr. Harding from Senator Poindexter of Washington, who contended with him for the nomination at Chicago; from Governor Allen of Kansas, who placed the Chicago convention and who himself was put before the convention as a candidate for the vice-presidential nomination; from A. P. Moore, publisher of the Pittsburg Leader, and from John C. Shaffer, publisher of the Chicago Evening Post, the Rocky Mountain News of Denver and several mid-western newspapers.

Polindexter Leads Ticket.

Senator Poindexter issued a formal statement tonight saying that Senator Harding and Governor Coolidge presented a "typically American ticket" for the election of which he expected to do all that he could. Governor Allen, in a letter to Senator Harding, said: "It will be a pleasure to do anything I can at any time to further the cause of your election."

After calling on Mr. Harding, Mr. Moore said he "could not be a very good American and not be for him."

He added that while he was not authorized to speak for Senator Johnson of California, he could say that the California "was" "100 per cent American, from which you can draw your own conclusions."

Conferences between Senator Harding and former Senator Beveridge of Indiana, Theodore Roosevelt Jr. and other men prominent in the "progressive wing" of the party, were arranged today, largely, it was said, through the efforts of Mr. Moore. Mr. Shaffer, both of whom were leaders in the progressive party of 1912.

Ex-Senator Weeks Also Met.

In addition to seeing the two publishers, Mr. Harding held a conference today with ex-Senator Weeks of Massachusetts. It also became known that a dinner was conferred at his home last night with Chairman Hays of the republican national committee, and Harry Daugherty, his pre-convention campaign manager.

Mr. Harding had lunch with Samuel Adams of Chicago, who is a republican candidate for vice-presidential nomination at the Chicago convention. Mr. Adams, who is a republican candidate for vice-presidential nomination at the Chicago convention, was seen by Mr. Harding at his home last night with Chairman Hays of the republican national committee, and Harry Daugherty, his pre-convention campaign manager.

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Representative Sitton, republican chairman of the house public lands committee, discussed with the senator proposals surrounding the public lands reclamation projects.

Senator Poindexter, in his statement, said: "I expect to do everything I can to aid in the election of the republican ticket. It is a strong ticket and deserves the support of the republican people. Both Senator Harding and Governor Coolidge, by the conduct of their private and public duties, have demonstrated the highest level of efficiency, integrity and business efficiency. Both have had the experience of typical, hard-working, patriotic, public-spirited American citizens."

"These experiences have inevitably shaped their character, which, in turn, will direct and govern their actions in public office. There will be no danger under the administration of these men, of American independence or honor being compromised or bartered away."

TICKET DECLARED BEST

HARDING NOMINATION PLEASES W. L. TOOZE JR.

Delegate to Convention Says Talk of Nominees Being of Bosses "Pure Political Junk."

"The nomination of Senator Harding and Governor Coolidge by the republican national convention at Chicago was the very best that could have been made," said Walter L. Tooze Jr., who arrived in Portland yesterday afternoon on his way home from Chicago.

"It is a strong ticket and will sweep the country," Tooze said, "and all this talk about it being the ticket of the bosses is pure political junk. I never saw a body of men more free from dictation in my life than those men who sat in that convention. It is true there were leaders, but without leaders any body would soon be a howling mob. I am mighty well pleased with the ticket."

"I was one of the five who stuck by Johnson to the end, even after we knew our man had no chance. But those of us who so voted considered the substance as well as the form of our pledge, and at the same time by taking this action, we did not provide Senator Johnson or his friends with an excuse for complaint. We were in Chicago to nominate a president, not a candidate, and to that end everything had to be taken into consideration; and particularly was it important for those of us who more than all else, a sweeping republican victory, not so to conduct ourselves as to bring disruption into the republican ranks. We must all get together and elect our ticket; in my humble opinion, we have a ticket we may well feel proud of. Senator Harding is a great man and will make a great president."

SKILL AS COMEDIENNE EXPLAINED BY MRS. FISKE

Popular Actress to Be Seen at Hellig in "Mis' Nelly of N'Orleans," Says Success Lies in the Gift Being Inherent.

WHAT is Mrs. Fiske's explanation of her skill as a comedienne? For years she has mystified the public, and now in "Mis' Nelly of N'Orleans," the latest comedy success of Mrs. Fiske, which opens at the Hellig July 1, the persistent query bobs up again. How does she provoke a laugh?

A theorist on humor asserted recently that the comedy in Mrs. Fiske's role was due either to a synthesis of opposition or was the result of a sudden perception of the incongruous by the audience. But this logic is inadequate as an explanation of the continuous waves of merriment that sweep through the audiences witnessing "Mis' Nelly of N'Orleans."

According to Mrs. Fiske, the comedy gift is a very definite thing, innate, born and inherent in the individual. It is the result of technical skill, not proficiency, nor long years of training—but is analogous to a sense of humor. Mrs. Fiske tells us, "Instantly alert, spontaneous and fervent, keen and alive at all times, constantly sensing the comic in every situation. And yet the intuitive comedy sense will attain no great heights unless it is supplemented by imagination and training."

WOMAN OUTLAWS' VICTIM

KENTUCKY MOUNTAINERS HELD FOR MURDER.

Feudists, After Becoming Intoxicated on Moonshine, Raided Young Woman's Home.

LEXINGTON, Ky., June 19.—(Special.)—As the result of a concerted attack upon a lonely home in the mountains of Owensley county, Miss Beulah Allen, aged 20, is dead and six mountaineers, most of them said to be feudists, are charged with murder. The accused men are Grover Gabbard, Harlin W. Baker, Robert Sandlin, Robert Clark, Charles Gabbard and Leonard Baker.

All were captured after a search except Robert Sandlin and Governor Morrow has offered a reward for him. The Baker and Gabbard families have been connected with feudist outbreaks in the mountains for many years. Reports reaching here tonight say that the desperadoes after becoming intoxicated on moonshine liquor raided the home where Miss Allen lived alone.

A general fight occurred and Miss Allen was shot to death. The five accused men captured have been held for trial all without bond except Charles Gabbard and Leonard Baker, who are said to be mere boys, who were allowed \$2000 bonds.

The scene of the murder is an almost inaccessible part of the mountains.

SAN FRANCISCO SWELTERS

City Experiences Hottest June Day Since 1912.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 19.—One heat prostration was reported here today, the hottest June day in eight years, according to the United States weather bureau. Frank C. Kingsland, 50 years old, a mining engineer, editor of the American Mine Reporter, was prostrated, according to reports at the central emergency hospital, where Kingsland was said to be in a serious condition.

The peak of today's heat wave was reached at 11:30 A. M., when the thermometer reported a temperature of 92.3 degrees.

SIGN CRAFTSMEN DINE

NAME CHANGED TO MAKE UNIT NATION-WIDE.

Reception Held at Benson—Mayor Baker Delivers Address of Welcome to Delegates.

One hundred and fifty members of the Pacific Coast Sign Craft association yesterday attended the reception in the Benson hotel which officially opened their second annual convention. George Weber, president, assisted by Walter Jenkins, vice-president, and A. G. Ramsay, secretary, welcomed the visiting delegates.

Mayor Baker delivered the address of welcome. He spoke on "Co-operation and Working with Organized Labor." The luncheon was presided over by George Weber. The old-fashioned "rollick" followed Mayor Baker's address. Several songs were given by Walter Jenkins, editor of Portland's community chorus. Miss Brown was accompanist.

Visiting delegates were taken for an inspection of sign shops, window displays at supply and material houses and later visited the headquarters of the Portland Sign Craft in the Chamber of Commerce building, where the workings of the organization were explained.

In the evening the women visited the "Oaks," in charge of a committee headed by Mrs. George Weber, while the regular business meeting of the craft was held in the Benson hotel. It was unanimously decided by those present to change the name of the craft to the Associated Signcrafts of North America, making the body nationwide instead of sectional. Before making the change, letters from all parts of the country were read complimenting the Portland body on their efforts to standardize the craft and organize into one body. George Weber opened the meeting with a few remarks and A. G. Ramsay, secretary-treasurer, read telegrams and letters.

VENIZELLOS IN ENGLAND

ARRIVAL OF GREEK PREMIER OCCASIONS SURPRISE.

Visit Interpreted to Mean Intended Protection of Greek Gains From Turk Empire.

FOLKSTONE, England, June 19.—The arrival here this evening of the Greek premier, Eleftherios Venizelos, occasioned considerable surprise. He was accompanied by the Greek minister of London. Officials do not deny that the presence of M. Venizelos was unexpected, some, even among the entourage of the informal conference, talk of the "unbidden guest."

It can hardly be supposed, however, that the visit of the premier was a surprise to the inner circle and it is held to prove that in addition to the questions of the Turkish indemnity and the carrying out by the Germans of treaty obligations, an important point in the discussion will be the Turkish settlement, and the visit is interpreted to mean that M. Venizelos intends to protect the Greek gains from the Turks in any possible modification of the Turkish treaty, which has been suggested.

Premier Lloyd George tonight sent M. Venizelos an invitation to lunch with the premiers at Sassoon tomorrow.

Bonus Campaign to Start.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 19.—The campaign for state bonus legislation for ex-service men will be started in earnest today by Henry A. Wise of this city, campaign manager for the 6th congressional district. The expense of the campaign is to be borne by former service men, it was stated, and no campaigners are to appear in uniform.

BENEFACTOR IS SOUGHT

After 67 Years Man Who Was Helped Starts Search.

SHREVEPORT, La., June 19.—Sixty-seven years ago while in Shreveport, C. F. Roberts, a young engineer of Columbus, Ga., borrowed enough money from E. O. Snow, stage line driver, to return home. He is trying to locate the heirs of his benefactor in order to repay the loan.

The story is related in a letter received today by Dr. G. S. Sexton, pastor of the First Methodist church here, whose assistance in seeking Snow's heirs is enlisted by the borrower, writing from his home in Lotohachle, Ala.

WHALE FOSSIL IS FOUND

Oregon Professor Finds Relic of Early Age Near Newport.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 19.—(Special.)—The fossil of a prehistoric whale, relic of the Miocene period, has been found on the Oregon coast near Newport by Dr. Earl L. Packard, professor of geology in the University of Oregon. This specimen, found on the cliffs, Dr. Packard believes, is the finest specimen of a fossil whale yet found in North America. Such petrified skeletons are rare, and the extreme age of the geologist's find makes it of particular interest to scientific men.

IMPEACHMENT IS SOUGHT

Wilson, Burleson and Palmer Are Attacked by Socialists.

WAUSAU, Wis., June 19.—Impeachment of President Wilson is demanded by one of the planks in the "14-point" platform adopted here today by the state convention of the socialist party. Impeachment of Attorney-General Palmer and of Postmaster-General Burleson also is demanded.

Every plank in the platform read by Victor Berger affirmed belief in international socialism. One plank placed blame for the world war on "big business" and demanded that "business must pay for it."

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, June 19.—(Special.)—Arrangements have been completed for caring for at least 400 or 500 summer school students. A large attendance is expected because of increased funds for elementary and higher education.

Cal., Regun by Honing Birds.

SALEM, Or., June 19.—(Special.)—Between 70 and 75 pigeons sent here by the Pacific Homing Pigeon club of Oakland, Cal., were released here at 8 o'clock this morning and started on their flight south. Because of the ex-

cellent weather conditions the pigeons were expected to reach Oakland tonight and lower all previous records. Among the birds released was "Prince Germany," world's champion message carrier of the Sperry Flour company of Oakland. This pigeon has the unique record of having traveled more than 2400 miles through the airlines and has carried 107 messages from the mayors and other city officials throughout the state of California. On July 4 these racing homers will be released at Seattle, in an endeavor to lower last year's record of 16 hours in their home flight to Oakland. Salem is approximately 500 miles by air line from Oakland.
