

YOUTH POINTS OUT SCENE OF MURDER

Prisoners Will Be Taken to Clackamas for Plea.

BRAKE STILL IS SILENT

Lad Accused by Pal as One Who Actually Committed Crime Refuses to Talk.

Russell Brake and George Moore, the two youths who have been implicated in the murder of Harry Dubinsky, Portland taxicab driver, by the confession of Moore, will be taken to Oregon City tomorrow to be arraigned on charges of murder. This was announced late yesterday after the place of the murder was definitely fixed as near Boardman station about two miles this side of Oregon City and in Clackamas county. Moore, one of the two youths charged with the murder, was taken over the scene of the crime yesterday afternoon and he reiterated to officials every detail of the murder of the taxi driver. He told again how in a lonely spot in the road near Boardman station they had stopped the car and he had left on some errand. Again he related how his companion had twice slugged the unsuspecting driver from behind with the automobile chain.

Body Dropped From Bridge.
He told how he had returned to the machine and assisted his companion in putting the body in the rear of the car. Then he showed the point about the middle of the north side of the suspension bridge at Oregon City from which the body was dropped into the Willamette river. "I don't know whether he was dead or not when we threw him into the river," said Moore. "He was unconscious and didn't seem to breathe, but I didn't investigate further," Moore said.

Under the direction of Sheriff Wilson, efforts to find the body of Harry Dubinsky were started at Oregon City, but up to a late hour last night the search had been unsuccessful. After Moore had told the police the body was thrown from the bridge, several grapplers were sent out in the hope that the body might be recovered. The work is rendered extremely difficult, however, owing to the large number of piers and the strong current. At the point where the body was thrown over the water is said to be 60 feet deep. Moore was taken over the scene of the crime by Lieutenant Golts, Inspector Hellyer, District Attorney Evans, of Portland, and District Attorney Hedges, of Oregon City. After it was definitely learned that the crime had occurred in Clackamas county arrangements were made by Portland officials to turn the two prisoners over to the Clackamas county officials Monday. Until that time, it was announced, the two will be held in the county jail here.

Trip East Planned.
Moore continued to hold yesterday to the story told following his arrest Friday night driving the taxi. He was slain that the two might take his car and take their girl friends out joy-riding. He said they had also planned on taking a trip east to see Brake's relatives.

Lieutenant Golts, who, with Lieutenant Noloney and Captain Circle headed the investigation which resulted in the arrest of the two lads surrounding the disappearance of Harry Dubinsky, said late yesterday that he was satisfied that the youths had to other motive than the theft of the machine. He said it was also apparent to him that Moore was now telling the truth about the crime.

Maps Long On Hand.
The story that the two boys intended to make a trip east in the machine of the dead driver is borne out by the discovery of a map of a road map of Montana, Idaho and Wyoming. This Moore said Brake had secured several days preceding the murder. He said that they had discussed getting a car in some way for some time preceding the murder of Dubinsky and that they had made plans for taking their girls out riding and also for the trip east.

A letter which had been written by Brake to his parents, but which had not yet been addressed, was also discovered in his effects. The letter told a story of his intentions to a girl who he said was the daughter of a wealthy government official here. He said that the girl's brother had given him a car and that he intended going east shortly with it.

Death Penalty Expected.
Police are of the opinion that this letter was written with the intention of delaying suspicion on the part of the judge's relatives in the east when he should arrive there with the car of the murdered driver.

Moore had lost his previous nervousness yesterday and had put on a sort of stoical attitude.

"I suppose it will hang me," he said, with a slight shrug and a half smile. Both he and Brake think that the statute provides for capital punishment is in effect.

Brake continued yesterday to maintain his attitude of silence when questioned relative to the murder of Dubinsky. He declared he knew nothing about the disappearance of the driver. With a smile and a contemptuous life of the head he faced the inspectors and declined to implicate himself in the murder.

Brake Still Reserved.
"I'll tell what I know when the time comes," he told Lieutenant Golts with a smile yesterday. "I'll tell my story to the judge," he continued.

This, however, was the nearest to a confession that he would come, despite of the fact that he had been confronted with the confession of Moore, who admitted the facts of the killing in his presence.

When Moore was led out of the room following his confession in his pale presence, Brake smiled a challenge to the inspectors to get him to confess.

The confession of Moore and the other evidence collected indicates that Brake was the stronger willed one of the two. He said that as his companion told him. The two said they had been companions from the time they met in Oregon City while working in the paper mills three months ago.

Inspectors late last night that no further effort would be made to get a confession from Brake.

She was brought back to the county jail at Portland for safe keeping following their arraignment at Oregon City. There will probably be some delay until the trial can be started and during that time the officials consider that the prisoners would be safer in the city jail.

Brake gave his age as 20 years when he was booked on a charge of murder at the police station. Moore said he was 19. Both men gave their occupation as that of laborer.

Girl May Get Reward.
Police are of the opinion that the greater portion of the reward of \$1000 which was offered for the recovery of the body of Dubinsky should go to Miss Bertha Shodahl, 221 Irving street, who gave the information leading to the clearing up of the mystery. It was doing my duty in giving the authorities what I knew."

"At that I didn't think such a thing possible of Brooke," she said.

Meetings Said to Be Frequent.
Miss Shodahl and her chum, Miss Winnie Peterson, who is employed in an establishment in the Pittcock block, first met Brake when they were out strolling one Sunday afternoon. Later he seemed to become quite attached to Shodahl and often called at her home.

Miss Shodahl told of how Brake called her to the car last Sunday morning before she was dressed and how he waited for her and took her out for a ride. She also told of not knowing the body in the machine which he declared to be his.

In the evening of the same day after he had a blowout and the machine down home, Brake called at the Shodahl home. He was without the machine although he had previously promised to take her out in the car. Miss Shodahl said that Brake told conflicting stories when he called that evening.

Girl Gives Information.
Brake also told Miss Shodahl that he was afraid to bring the car out because he had seen a man in it. This fits in with the story told by Moore, who said that he and Brake returned twice for the automobile after it had been abandoned. The first time he said that they saw it was watched and the second time there were a number of policemen about it.

When Miss Shodahl read the story in the newspapers of the disappearance of Harry Dubinsky and his supposed murder, she told what she knew of Brake's new machine to her mother and brother. They insisted that

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EDUCATORS MEET JUNE 25

ANNUAL STATE CONFERENCE TO BE AT UNIVERSITY.

Two Sessions Will Be Held—Afternoon Programme to Be Devoted to Surveys.

"UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 19.—(Special.)—The 12th annual state educational conference under the auspices of the University of Oregon will be held Friday, June 25, on the campus. There will be two sessions, one in the afternoon and the other in the evening. The afternoon session will be devoted to tests and surveys. Reports will be given by the following speakers: Chester Carlisle on results of state survey he has been conducting of the state's educational system; G. H. Ruch, assistant professor of education here, on synthetic survey of the campus high school; Dr. B. W. DeBusk, professor of education, on mental survey of the Eugene school children; H. R. Douglas, professor of education here, on projected algebra test.

Dr. Edgar Dawson of the University of California, will open the evening session with a talk on "The Next Move in the Civics Problem." Miss Ethel Wakefield, senior in the department of education, will read "Some New Work in Oral Expression," and Mrs. Margaret Goodall, teacher in the campus high school, will have as her subject, "Teaching Appreciation of Nature in Literature." Victor Morris, instructor of the campus high school, will speak on "Project Method Applied to Local and Oregon History," and John C. Ahnack, acting director of the extension division, will report the progress in the local history programme.

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NOTCH SHOWS IN CRATER

Mount St. Helens' Outline Looks Changed.

Crumbling Rim Thought to Have Fallen in Slide Underneath Glacier Cap.

Has the hand of time fallen heavily on the symmetrical crown of Mount St. Helens? Portland lovers of the towering peaks that stand sentinel over the Columbia basin yesterday centered their gaze on the snow-capped eminence of northern Skamania county and noticed that for the first time they could view the sunshine inside the great crater.

Mountain-loving citizens whose attention was called to the changed appearance of the great white cone yesterday were inclined to think that a piece of the rim has broken away, as quite a decided notch is observable from the distance of this city. There appears to be a sharp and pronounced peak on the eastern side of the rim, where before it was a continuous smooth cap. Also, there are two ridges visible on the eastern slope a little below the apparent notch, and it is the opinion of one observer who studied the mountain closely yesterday with the aid of a powerful glass that the crumbling rim of the crater is now visible beneath the glacial cap which now, with the melting of the outward crust,

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
